1. The decision of the judges will be final, as will that of the Committee on any complaint or protest.
2. The Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage.
3. Exhibitors are limited to TWO entries in any one class.
4. All grown exhibits shall have been the exclusive property of the exhibitor for at least 3 months.
5. Complainants must deposit £1 with Show Secretary; this will be refunded if the complaint is upheld.
6. Entries must be made on the entry form accompanying the schedule.
7. Staging of exhibits to be completed between 7am - 10am and may only be removed on completion of the prize giving. Any exhibitor who removes exhibits before the stated time will forfeit their prize money. Only officials are allowed in the hall during judging.
8. The Novice Cup applies to entrants of Sections V, F, S, C, E, & P only.
9. Apart from section Y, all sections of the schedule are open to all age groups. All points count towards cups.
10. Entries in section P (Handicrafts) must not have been exhibited at the Cheriton Bishop Village Show in a previous year.
11. **New rule: Each exhibitor will only be allowed one exhibit in collection classes in all sections.**
12. **New rule: In Section V, class Nos. V25 & 26, Exhibit to be displayed on and within the display cloth provided by the Society, approx 60cms x 60cms.**
13. The Banksian medal (given by the RHS) is awarded to encourage 'plantmanship'. It will be presented to the person gaining the highest points total in sections F and V of the Summer Show. The same person cannot win the medal more than once in any three years.
14. No late entries will be accepted.

SHOW ELIGIBILITY: Open to anyone who lives within 5 miles of the parish of Cheriton Bishop OR who is a member of the Cheriton Bishop Horticultural Society.

Section F. Flowers

N.B. The judges will be instructed to use metric measurements; imperial sizes are given for guidance only.

- F 1 (**Collection**) Collection of **named** flowers, 3 species, 3 stems per vase, 3 separate vases. (1 exhibit per exhibitor)
- F 2 Bowl or vase of mixed garden flowers (not shrubs), 6 stems, 6 separate species.
- F 3 Vase of sweet peas, mixed 6 stems.
- F 4 Vase of sweet peas, 3 colours, 2 stems of each colour.
- F 5 Sweet pea, to be judged on scent, 1 stem.
- F 6 Vase of roses, 3 stems, 3 distinct varieties (some varieties of roses are multiheaded).
- F 7 Vase of one rose, to be judged on scent, 1 stem.
- F 8 Cycle of Blooms: 3 stems of 1 variety in one vase, one bud in colour, one specimen bloom, one out in full bloom.
- F 9 Vase of 3 flowers grown from a corm, tuber or bulb. 1 or more varieties.
- F 10 Vase of lily, 1 stem (may have one or more flowers on the stem).
- F 11 Vase of Dahlias, 3 stems, 3 distinct varieties.
- F 12 Vase of annual flowers, 3 species, 3 stems of each.
- F 13 Vase of perennial flowers, 3 species, 3 stems of each.
- F 14 Vase of 5 pansies or violas, 5 blooms, 1 or more varieties (please supply your own small vase).
- F 15 Vase of Dianthus (pinks), 5 stems, 1 or more varieties.
- F 16 Vase of Dianthus (pinks), 3 stems, 1 variety.
- F 17 Vase containing 3 stems of 2 or more different species of shrubs grown for foliage (3 stems in total).
- F 18 A display of 7 individual Fuschia blooms (shown on a display board provided in the hall on the morning of the show) 3 or more varieties.
- F 19 A Spectacular Weed in flower - an exhibit for the Joker's Cup.**
- F 20 A Fuchsia (pot not to exceed 25cm (10") in diameter).
- F 21 A Geranium or Pelargonium (pot not to exceed 25cms (10") in diameter).
- F 22 An orchid grown in a pot not to exceed 20 cm (8") in width.
- F 23 Flowering indoor or outdoor pot plant; plant up to 50cm (20") in width and depth.
- F 24 Foliage pot plant. Judged on foliage alone. Pot not to exceed 25cm (12") in diameter.
- F 25 (**Collection**) A CONTAINER. A floral display of plants to be judged on appearance only. Plants need not be grown by the exhibitor, just potted on. (Hint: make sure container isn't too heavy to move!) (1 exhibit per exhibitor)

Hints for exhibiting flowers

There must be the specified number of blooms in each exhibit.

Flower petals must not be faded.

There must be at least 3 flowers on each stem of sweet pea.

New class F6, may include climbing, shrub, as well as bush roses, but only one main stem which may be multiheaded.

Vases are provided except for the smallest flowers when the exhibitor may use his or her own.

Hints for exhibiting vegetables and fruit

The judge may pick up your exhibit to examine it.

Vegetables should be clean, pest free and fresh.

Potatoes should be washed, taking care not to break the skins, and should be uniform in size and variety.

Beans and peas should be picked with stems attached, and should be straight, and match in colour, length and size.

Lettuces and cabbages should, ideally, be lifted the day of the show and have their washed roots left on.

Tomatoes should have their calyx left on.

Cucumbers, with a short stalk, should be uniform in colour size and variety and if possible with the wilted flower on the end.

Marrows should be young, tender and uniform, no longer than 38 cms (14") long or 50 cms (18") circumference for round varieties.

Courgettes should be 8 to 15 cms long (3" to 6" long). They should not have flowers on.

Carrots and beetroots should have the base of their stalks left on, about 2 to 3 cms (1"), washed with all roots left on.

Onions V9 should be well ripened, and have all their roots and leaves left on.

Onions and shallots from setts V10 and V11 should be well ripened, roots cut off, 10 to 15 cms (4" to 6") of tops left on, to be turned over and tied, and set in a small dish of sand or sawdust to sit upright.

Garlic V23 should be left whole, well ripened, soil removed, and tops cut to about 10 to 15 cms (4" to 6").

Section V. Vegetables

N.B. The judges will be instructed to use metric measurements; imperial sizes are given for guidance only.

- V 1 Potatoes, white (Hint: to be evenly matched in size) **3**
V 2 Potatoes, coloured or partly coloured **3**
V 3 Display of potatoes, classes V1 & V2; 3 of each **6 in total**
V 4 French beans **6**
V 5 Runner beans **6**
V 6 Broad beans **4**
V 7 Peas, stump ended or pointed **6 matching pods**
V 8 Carrots, any type (Hint: leave with the base of the stalk on) **3**
V 9 Onions grown from seed, washed, complete with tops and roots **3**
V 10 Onions grown from sets, trimmed **3**
V 11 Shallots **6**
V12 Beetroot, any cultivar (Hint: leave with the base of the stalk on) **3**
V 13 Cabbages (Hint: show with their roots on) **2**
V 14 Lettuce (Hint: show with their roots on) **2**
V 15 Tomatoes, ordinary cultivars (Hint: show tomatoes with calyx still in place) **5**
V 16 Tomatoes, small-fruited and novelty cultivars (Hint: show tomatoes with calyx still in place) **9 of one variety**
V 17 Vegetable marrows, fit for the table **2**
(that means young, tender, uniform fruits less than 38cm long or 50cm circumference for round cultivars)
V 18 Cucumber, greenhouse variety **2 (a matched pair)**
V 19 Courgettes (Hint: should be between 8–15 cm) **3**
V 20 Any vegetable without its own class in this schedule **2 (a matched pair)**
V 21 Peppers **3 of one variety**
V 22 Chillies **3 of one variety, named if possible**
V 23 Garlic **3 bulbs**
V 24 Container of **6 named**, fresh, cultivated herbs chosen from the following list: basil (any one variety), bay, bergamot, borage, coriander, dill, fennel, lemon balm, lovage, marjoram (any one variety), mint (any one variety), parsley, rosemary, sage, tarragon, and thyme (any one variety) **1 stem of each**
NB: Should be suitable for immediate culinary use!
V 25 **(Collection)** A collection of **4 salad vegetables, 2 of each kind to be displayed on cloth provided**
(1 exhibit per exhibitor)
V 26 **(Collection)** A collection of vegetables, **4 kinds to include not less than 2 kinds from the schedule**
Numbers of each vegetable as given above for veg classes **to be displayed on cloth provided**
(1 exhibit per exhibitor)
V 27 **Longest Runner Bean – exhibit for the Joker’s Cup**
V 28 **Basil in a pot, grown from seed purchased from the Society, up to 3 plants in any one pot – exhibit for the Joker’s Cup**
V 29 **Home-made Compost in a bucket – exhibit for the Joker’s Cup**
NEW **Trug of fruit and veg in Floral Art section E1**

Section S. Fruit

- S 1 A specimen Top Fruit (Tree Fruit e.g. Apples, Plums etc) **1 Fruit**
S 2 Another other specimen fruit (such as a melon etc) **1 Fruit**
S 3 Cane Fruit (raspberries, blackberries, loganberries etc) **6 berries** Stalks must be left on the fruit
S 4 Another other fruit without a class of its own **5 of one variety**
(redcurrants, blackcurrants, gooseberries, strawberries etc) Stalks must be left on the fruit
S 5 **(Collection)** ‘A Bowl of Fruit’ **1 filled bowl (1 exhibit per exhibitor)**
The exhibit must not exceed 35cms in any one direction

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Section C Cookery/Preserves

- C 1 1 loaf, of any size, shape or flour
- C 2 5 ginger nut biscuits, any recipe
- C 3 Swiss Roll, jam filled
- C 4 1 round of shortbread, 5" to 6" diameter, marked into 6 portions
- C 5 1 vegetarian quiche, no bigger than 9"
- C 6 Jar of jelly
- C 7 Jar of jam
- C 8 Jar of curd
- C 9 Jar of pickle, any variety – best if matured for some time
- C 10 Jar of chutney, any variety – best if matured for a few months
- C 11 Upside Down Cake – recipe given below
- C 12 **(Collection)** The Queen & Duke of Edinburgh come to Tea!
With a minimum of 5 home-made items, which may include some of the above
- C13 5 Jam Tarts – exhibit of the Joker's Cup**

Hints

All exhibits must be cold.

All foodstuffs should be covered where possible.

Cooked exhibits should be shown on a doyley-covered plate, and covered.

(Paper plates and cling film will be available in case you forget to bring your own!)

Traditionally all preserves were covered by a wax disc and then sealed with a cellophane jam pot cover held in place with a rubber band.

Jars should not bear trade labels.

Metal lids (if used) should be new; chutney and pickle lids should be vinegar proof.

Jars should have a display label stating type of preserve and date.

Judges look for culinary skill, so, for example, flavour can be more important than appearance!

Given Recipe: Upside Down Cake

Sponge mix 125 gms (4oz) butter softened
 125 gms (4oz) castor sugar
 2 eggs, beaten
 175 gms (6 oz) self-raising flour
 1 tsp baking powder
 18 cm (7") round cake tin
 Approx 2 tbsps of fruit juice.

Fruit glaze 60gms(2oz) softened butter
 60 gms (2oz) light brown sugar
 No more than 400gms of suitable fruit (fresh, tinned or ready to eat)
 maybe all one variety or two to be arranged for decoration and presentation

Lightly butter the tin and line the tin with baking parchment.

Cream together the butter and sugar to make the glaze, then spread on the parchment and place the chosen fruit on the glaze with an eye to presentation (when the cake is turned out).

To make the sponge:

Put the butter, castor sugar, eggs, flour and baking powder, with a tablespoon or so of juice into a bowl.

Beat for 2 minutes or so until the mixture is smooth and well blended.

Spoon the mixture on top of the arranged fruit and level the surface.

Bake in a preheated oven at 180C 350F Gas 4 for about 45 minutes until the sponge is well risen and springy to the touch.

Invert onto a cooling rack.

Section E. Floral Art

- E 1 **(Collection)** 1 Basket or trug containing garden produce (vegetables, fruit, edible leaves and flowers).
All items must be grown in the exhibitor's garden or allotment
The exhibit must not exceed 60cm (24") in any direction. (1 exhibit per exhibitor)
This will be judged on appearance only
- E 2 Table decoration for a Tea Party 'The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh come to tea!
Space allowed 25 x 25cm s (any height)
- E 3 An Arrangement of seasonal flowers: Space allowed 40 x 40cms (any height)
- E 4 An arrangement with no flowers or flower buds, using leaves, twigs, seed heads, ferns, wood or bark, etc.
no accessories, space allowed 40 x 40cms (any height) Remember no flowers or buds of flowers
- E 5 Harvest time: Space allowed 50 x 50cms (any height). Accessories may be used (any height)
- E 6 **'Here's one I didn't make earlier'..... an exhibit for the Joker's Cup**
An arrangement completed at the Show Bench in the Village Hall on Friday 11th between 7.00 and 7.30pm, using only the materials supplied, each exhibitor having the same materials.

Hint

Flowers and foliage may be bought for classes E2, E3, E4, E5.

Accessories are permitted in all classes unless otherwise stated.

Any oversized arrangement will be disqualified.

All arrangements will be viewed from the front only.

Use new oasis, and ensure that it is covered by foliage, flowers or accessories.

Section P Photography, Art & Handicrafts

N.B. Competitors are reminded of Rule 10 - exhibits must not have been exhibited at the Village Show in a previous year.

Photography

- P 1 Photograph: "Vegetation" (Unframed and no bigger than A5 including mount, if used).
- P 2 Photograph: "Local Place" (Unframed and no bigger than A5 including mount, if used).
- P 3 Three Photographs: "Transport" (Unframed but to be mounted on one piece of card, no bigger than A3).

Art

- P 4 A picture titled "Summer Time", any medium (not photography) (No bigger than A3 if mount and frame are used).
- P 5 A drawing, in charcoal, pencil, ink or can be computer generated.
(No bigger than A4 including mount and frame if used)
- P 6 **'It did not go according to plan!' a cartoon in any medium (not photography)**

- P 7 Bunting, no more than 2 metres
- P 8 Jewellery, any material
- P 9 Something made using wool, this could be knitting, crochet, felt, embroidery, etc.

- P 11 **'There was an old couple? a limerick. An exhibit for the Joker's Cup**
- P 12 Something made using any recycled materials since last year's show. Suggested size within 50cm, but please let us know the size if you want to enter something bigger and we will try to accommodate it!

Y 5 Miniature garden, made in a seed tray roughly the size of A4 or smaller

Y 6 A picture of A Summer's Day

Y 7 A No Bake Cake, 3 portions or slices

Y 8 Something edible you have grown yourself.

8 – 11 YEARS

Y 9 A Birthday card

Y 10 A poem about an animal

Y 11 1 photograph of an animal

Y12 3 fruit scones

Y13 Something edible you have grown yourself.

12 – 14 YEARS

Y 14 A Birthday card

Y 15 A poem entitled 'Growing up'

Y 16 1 photograph 'A Selfie'

Y 18 A plant you have grown yourself, not necessarily edible.

Hints:

Suggestions for easy things to grow –

Instant germination within a week before the show: mustard and cress; leaf salads; pea shoots; bean sprouts.

Longer term: French beans; bush tomato in a flower pot; potatoes in a container; courgettes; marrow squash.

Look at the seed packet, patio varieties grow quicker and can be grown in a bucket or large flower pot, more easily watered, fed and weeded than if the plant is in the open garden.

Look on the internet for recipes for a no bake cake

Miniature Garden

Consider how heavy and stable the container will be to transport to the Village Hall.

A rigid seed tray (roughly A4 size) is ideal.

Small objects as well as plant material may be used.

Y10 and Y15 to be written in your own handwriting and then may be illustrated or decorated, page size A4.

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
