Public Open Session

Report by Nick Creasy, Devon County Organiser of the Devon Young Farmers Club. Building work at the old Mulberry site is underway to convert the property into meeting areas and a number of individual offices. There is a clause at present that states that occupants of the individual offices must, in some way, be connected to either the agriculture industry or the charity sector. For the purposes of sustaining the financial feasibility of the estate, this clause may need to be relaxed to accommodate other small local businesses.

Councillors' Reports

- The owners at Higher Eggbeer Farm have been contacted regarding complaints relating to noise disturbance. The owners are making a number of alterations in an attempt to reduce noise disturbance created by guests. In addition they are exploring potential options with the planners for sound insulation at the site.
- Councillors raised the potential for installing a pavement between the GP surgery/village hall and the village. This is seen to be a benefit for safety reasons and to reduce car park congestion. It is unlikely that either the space or the funding is available to achieve this at present.
- A discussion took place regarding the installation of a handrail at the steps between Hescane Park and the Old Thatch car park. Councillors will engage contractors to quote for this work.
- The potential for replacement bus shelters was discussed. It was agreed that quotes would be obtained for varying specifications and once received would enable the funding to be sought.
- Councillors reported that details available on the Mid Devon planning website are not fit for purpose. District Councillors to raise this as a complaint.

District and County Councillors' reports

- District Councillor confirmed their new membership of a committee that looks at areas of council business not picked up in other committees. It was suggested that this committee would be an ideal forum to raise the issue regarding the road condition between 4 Cross Ways and Hole Well.
- There has been a one off report from residents in Hittisleigh of all-night noise coming from Thorne Cross.
- District Councillor confirmed that the new recycling process continues to be a success with recycling going
 up and landfill going down. There is still some way to go in order to meet targets and therefore Mid Devon
 Council is going to introduce, in line with some other councils, some form of statutory recycling. Details are
 still to be confirmed but it is likely that some form of penalty scheme will be introduced following sufficient
 warning and support to those not recycling correctly/adequately.
- District Councillor reiterated the garden waste scheme that is chargeable and voluntary. Bins will be collected fortnightly and can be shared by up to 3 households.

In 2015 the winner for the category 'Outstanding Community Contribution' was Cheriton Bishop Community Land Trust. Gill Westcott accepted the award on behalf of the Trust from Lord Richard Best OBE at the Rural Futures Conference on 1st October at the Met Office.

Auction Results

The auction of Promises and Paintings at Woodleigh Café was a great night. It raised £2710 towards the repair of the church roof. A big thank you to Sue and Allen Bloomfield and their helpers for organising the event. Also our thanks go to Michelle for hosting us at the Café and everyone who came to bid on the lots. The total in the Fabric Fund now stands at £14,914.83, which means we have reached our target!

However, our target was based on the estimated cost of the work. We are waiting on quotes to find out the actual cost so we still may need to raise some more money towards the roof repair. I have been heartened by people's generosity and willingness to help the church.

From the Rector

Many Anniversaries to Remember

The national Remembrance Day on 11th November and Remembrance Sunday on 8th November will be looking back at the significant end of World War Two in 1945, seventy years ago. We have also remembered the seventy-fifth anniversary of the Battle of Britain and the hundredth anniversary of the Gallipoli campaign in World War One this year. These different remembrances highlight different aspects of war. One common thought is when will this end? It was hoped by Christmas, sadly it is often many Christmases before that hope is realised. The seventy-fifth anniversary of the Battle of Britain reminds us that there would be four Christmas days in wartime before the first peace time Christmas Day of 1945. Wars start quickly but never seem to end as quickly as hoped for. As we remember World War One where the armies were entrenched against each other, we remember how we can become metaphorically entrenched and very hard to dislodge from a particular view or opinion.

The last anniversary is one hundred years since Gallipoli. British and Allied troops landed at the Gallipoli peninsula, on beaches including Anzac Cove, intending to occupy Constantinople (now Istanbul), the capital of the Ottoman Empire. A long and bloody stalemate with Turkish defenders ensued, until troops were successfully evacuated in late 1915/early 1916. The Gallipoli remembrance reminds us of a thwarted attempt to change the course of the war. It serves to remind us of the dreadful cost of lives lost in wartime and the many injured soldiers and affected people that wars bring. If we turn our attention to the present day, we are still confronted by the human cost of the civil war in Syria and there being no end in sight to this war, which is in its fourth year. It is estimated that 11 million people have been displaced and 4 million of these people are now refugees in different countries.

The church has another dimension of remembering in November, which is called the Kingdom season. This starts on All Saints on 1st November and ends on Christ the King on Sunday 22nd November. This period marks the end of the church's year. In essence, our goal is heaven and the kingdom season celebrates that life long journey to heaven. It finishes with Jesus as our King in heaven. It is always important to know where we are going, or else we can easily get lost. The Christian life aims for a relationship with God that transcends our earthly life into an eternal life in heaven. It is worth remembering the cost of this to Jesus. This was brought about through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

We can draw several parallels by remembering those who have given so much for us, the need to use that gift wisely for the benefit of others and to keep focused on our aim in life. In God's economy peace and justice are central to establishing a sense of heaven on earth.

North East Dartmoor Care – which includes Cheriton Bishop

NED Care is a new, not-for-profit project aimed at addressing the dire lack of social care in our area. North east Dartmoor is described as an area of 'market failure' in adult social care by Devon County Council and many of us have struggled with the consequences of this challenging state of affairs.

Moretonhampstead Development Trust began work on the NED Care project last January and has since come across many cases of a break down in care locally - for people coming out of hospital or residential care after a short stay, for those who need extra support to stay in their homes - and many others struggling to find the support they need.

The situation in social care is complicated and will require a range of creative and community-led solutions. We are aiming to begin delivering new, locally-based and CQC registered care services in 2016, but are also working in the meantime on a range of support for people who need care *now*. Please get in touch if you are looking for care for yourself, a friend or relative. We can help you to find, check and employ carers, and support them in their work with you.

We will soon be launching a local Carers Register and are really keen to hear from anyone who is working in care, is interested in care work, or is an unpaid carer. We can help through funding for professional development, access to free training and support networks. We are also looking for volunteers to support the project in a variety of ways and would really like to hear from anyone with experience of caring, to help in designing services.
