Parish Council Meeting – 8th February 2016

Public Open Session - Report by Toby Russell from Devon Air Ambulance Trust (DAAT)

Until now DAAT has only been able to fly in daylight hours but is looking to introduce night-time flying through the mobilisation of a community helipads project.

The project involves communities offering land that can be assessed for its suitability of becoming a helipad for use by DAAT when attending emergencies in the vicinity. During extended daylight hours in the summer of 2015 DAAT attended 53 patients who, if their accident or illness had happened during the winter, the air ambulance wouldn't have been able to get to.

Night time helipads will be furnished with the necessary infrastructure including electricity, LED lighting, a column on which to place the lights and the technology to enable remote switching of the lights from DAAT's central control centre. The cost of adapting potential sites is dependent on the ease of installation of these components. For example, a site with an existing electricity supply and a suitable platform on which to place lights would provide a relatively cheap option.

At this stage the Parish Council asks for feedback on two points:

- 1. Individual views regarding the potential of having one or more community helipads in Cheriton Bishop.
- 2. For parishioners and landowners to suggest/offer potential sites. Sites should be at least 25m x 50m and can be privately or publicly owned. Any suggested sites would be thoroughly surveyed by DAAT to assess suitability.

Public Open Session - Report by a member of the public regarding the Moor Park development

There are a number of unsatisfactory factors regarding the manner in which the development is being undertaken. It appears there is no drainage on the site resulting in excess water overflowing onto both the main road and the Dunsford road. There is also an unsatisfactory amount of noise coming from the site and an apparent lack of health & safety. Members of the public are advised to contact the Environmental Health department at Teignbridge District Council if issues persist.

FROM THE FLAGMASTER – AN EXPLANATION!

We know that seeing the Devon Flag flying on the flagstaff sends many Villagers to look up "what's on" in the Parish Newsletter, and it is this feedback that makes the job worthwhile! However, there are occasions when it is not practical to raise any flags, however much we want to and that's usually down to the weather. When it gets really cold overnight (sub zero) the halyard inside the pole gets frozen like a rod and just won't go through the top pulley wheel. The key portal also gets frozen and cannot be unlocked, but usually this can be fixed with a warm hand applied!

Sometimes a "risk assessment" is necessary. The main road, as many will know, can be like a wind tunnel and on rare occasions we have to judge "will the flag survive?" (they cost £90.00 each). An example: on the 6th February the Union Flag was raised for the Queen's Accession Anniversary and suffered damage. Our Village seamstress, Jean Martin, has agreed to repair it otherwise on its next outing it would be torn to tatters!

So, if your event is not ushered in with a proud Devon Flag aloft... don't call us. Sorry!

From the Rector

Mercy is at the heart of Easter

I was listening to a Pause for Thought on the radio by Cardinal Cormac Murphy-O'Connor.

I was so impressed with it, I thought I would pass on some of his wisdom and how it resonated with me. Cardinal Cormac started by quoting his favourite passage from William Shakespeare, from the Merchant of Venice,

'The quality of mercy is not strained; it droppeth as the gentle rain from heaven upon the place beneath. It is twice blest; it blesseth him that gives and him that takes.'

Shakespeare reminds us that there is blessing in forgiving. That when we offer forgiveness to those around us, then we are blessed by God. The same is true when we take the forgiveness that has been offered to us, then we are blessed by God too. The process of offering and receiving forgiveness always starts to heal broken relationships, allows restoration and also brings God's blessing. Returning to the quote, it remind us that the quality of mercy drops like gentle rain from heaven to us below here on earth. It is an interesting picture that Shakespeare draws about falling rain. There is nothing we can do to stop rain, it just falls, we have no control over it, and we just get wet when it rains. The only thing we can do is avoid the rain by staying in or using an umbrella. So if mercy drops like rain from heaven, we have a choice to receive it or try to avoid it by taking shelter. If we avoid mercy we also miss out on God's blessing. We appear to be living in a time where people are saying that God is missing or nonexistent.

We are coming to the end of Lent and the beginning of Easter in this month of March. It is a time when God's love is made visible in the life of Jesus. Jesus' life was an example to those around him, that God loves and accepts each and every one of us. God was not missing and was certainly not nonexistent at that time, although many thought he was! The heart of Easter is not to be found in Easter Eggs or the Easter Bunny, they are meant to point to new life and new beginnings. The heart of Easter is forgiveness and mercy, it came to us at the terrible price of Jesus' death on the cross on Good Friday. God restores Jesus' life on Easter Sunday. 'The quality of mercy is not strained' but as abundant as rain falling gently. We are left a simple choice, do we get wet or take shelter from God's mercy. The surprising gift of mercy and forgiveness is it blesses both those who offer it and those who receive it. Surprisingly, mercy and forgiveness are also at the heart of happiness and joy. Without mercy we are doomed to failure and despair, through forgiveness we are transformed and restored to wholeness and joy. Easter becomes happy through transformation by God's love and mercy. Are you willing to get wet or just keep taking shelter?

DON'T READ THIS IF YOU ARE SMUG ENOUGH TO THINK YOU COULDN'T BE TAKEN IN BY A SCAM!

An intelligent mature lady, who used to live in the Village and now lives a few miles away, sent us the following:

"An Indian lady, who knew my name, called saying she was from Openreach checking computer download speeds in preparation for my new fibre optic Broadband Package. She passed me to a so-called engineer who said he needed to connect to my computer to resolve the problems. I told him to ring next day. I immediately rang BT and talked to a person in an Indian Call Centre who told me it was quite likely the engineer would need that information. So I felt assured all was well when, next day, the engineer rang again and told me to download a "join me" website so he could connect to my computers and solve issues of security and internet speeds. He was connected for one hour, forty-five minutes and clearly looked at and copied all he needed from my files. He told me it was essential to do a lot of work to sort out problems and a payment of £254.90 must be paid up front. This would be repaid to me by £25.00 monthly credits on my BT account. Stupidly, I paid by Credit Card. Fortunately this payment was denied by my credit card company as the payment was to Western Union who they don't support. I worry about the information they have. I know that two of my family and a neighbour, who are in my contacts list, have already been called by these horrible people within 24 hours of stealing my details. I feel so annoyed especially as I checked with BT to see if the call was from them; they actually had that call logged".

The very day after we received this, the writer received a call from an Indian call centre following the same line of enquiry. The caller was lead on to check this was indeed a similar scam, then they were told: "I don't have a computer!"

"Forewarned is Forearmed" – a slogan of Neighbourhood Watch. The punch line – members received this information some three weeks ago by e-mail, so wouldn't fall into the trap. By joining NHW, you too could be forewarned. Call Jean Martin (24586) or the writer – 'phone number at the foot of the page.

Neighbourhood Watch is not just about helping to prevent and solve crime – it's about the community's safety and wellbeing as well.

At the February Parish Council Meeting, Toby Russell of Devon Air Ambulance gave an interesting informative talk on their service being extended to night-time flying. Currently the Air Ambulance can only operate in daytime – and this Village has had two call-outs to the writer's knowledge. We are reminded that the Air Ambulance does not just take patients to RD&E, but to a specialist hospital if required. So it is vital to a community like ours. Alas, there were only two members of the public at the Meeting! Funds will need to be raised to prepare landing spots – watch this space and the Parish Council Meeting minutes.
