#### From the Rector

#### Are all infections bad?

We said goodbye to Canon Geoffrey Moore and his wife Ann in the summer as they moved to the Lake District. Geoff was a great help to me taking services, when I was away on holiday or at a meeting.

More importantly, he was greatly loved by the congregation he served. He always had a smile on his face and enjoyed a laugh. He thought this poem would be a suitable addition to my article. I think he is quite right. The author is unknown, but it was passed on to Geoff by a member of St Thomas's church.

Smiling is infectious, you catch it like the flu. When someone smiled at me today, I started smiling too. I passed around the corner and someone saw my grin. When he smiled I realized I'd passed it on to him. I thought about that smile, then I realized its worth. A single smile, just like mine could travel round the earth. So, if you feel a smile begin, don't leave it undetected. Let's start an epidemic quick, and get the world infected.

Infections normally have negative connotations, especially when as recently we have been worried about the possibilities of epidemics and pandemics of flu, Ebola, Zika and infectious diseases. The threat that they pose to so many people means that they are taken very seriously. The counter argument is made well by the poem and when we say that laughter is infectious. I must admit that laughter has often taken me out of stressful and difficult situations. It sometimes has the ability to press the reset button and put things in a better more realistic perspective, especially if you have the weight of the world on your shoulders.

There is a parallel process that runs with our relationship with God. It is easy to get a sombre and serious picture of God. A lot of people think of God as someone who judges our wrong doing. But just as importantly there is the counter balance that God delights in our successes and triumphs. He encourages us to have a go and trust in him. We are told that if we want to know more about God we need to look to Jesus. There is a sense that Jesus was much loved and cared about people and their troubles. This concern was infectious and brought more people in contact with Jesus. They were often transformed by that encounter with Jesus for good.

I suspect that like laughter, the good qualities of relating to others and bringing out the best in those around us, are what is required to banish the gloominess and the hopelessness that often pervades how we look at life. I am sure that is what God wants us to do and I can guarantee it will bring many smiles to faces. It is good to know that good things can be caught and passed on to one another just like a smile!

## NO NEWS IS.....!

Our article in the March edition concerning "scamming" and the reality check reported in July's Newsletter has been reiterated by the National Media ever since! Did you see the Barclays Bank advertisement on TV – not encouraging people to switch accounts but to warn their existing customers not to give out personal detail, including passwords, on-line or on the 'phone? Scamming is now BIG business for criminals and suddenly the Banks, Police and others are looking at protecting the public, seriously!

There is NO NEWS on the Police investigation into our Villagers' plight (reported last month) but the investigation is on-going and at least the victims are being kept "in the loop" with frequent up-dates. And, they have been inundated with recent press-cuttings of similar scams from friends wanting them to feel not alone in their dilemma.

#### **POLICE EMERGENCY NUMBERS**

The 101 number has come under much criticism of late for the delays in calls being answered. So the Police have issued a new contact – here is a summary of their numbers:

- **999** is top emergency. Call this number only if you see a crime in progress or you see someone suspected of a crime nearby or there is a danger to life or violence is being used or threatened.
- 101 use for example if your car is stolen; your property is damaged; you suspect drug use in the neighbourhood; you want to give the Police information about crime in this area or you have a general Police enquiry.

#### <u>101@dc.police.uk</u> is the new on-line method of calling the 101 number .

#### SPEEDING IN THE VILLAGE

The face of our Community Policing is changing! Lisa Cocker is moving into Crediton and PCSO David Waring is taking over our area. He is aware of our failed attempt to get a Neighbourhood Speed Watch up and running in Cheriton Bishop **so far**, but is asking Villagers to contact him direct to report their experiences of dangerous speeding through the Village.

Our aim was for our community to be able to check excessive speeds of traffic on the C50 (the main road) and Church Lane. The Police's own checks, taken we think, fallaciously near the Shop (on road parking slows traffic down there) did not indicate "excessive speeding". We were asking for checks near the Bus Stops on the fast stretch of road and where most people cross the road!

With eighteen new homes soon to come on stream at Moor Park, the risk to life and limb from fast moving traffic will increase.

So, if speeding traffic frightens you, get in touch with:

If enough people complain, we might just get our own Community Speed Watch up and running. We have the volunteers to man the cameras, all we need now is commitment from the Police!

Well, lookee here, the school calendar for this edition remains the same as last month :

#### 7th September - First Day of the Autumn Term

Do I hear a little cheer go up from the parentage? I expect some will be cheering after the long summer holidays. What a mixed bag of weather we have had. I trust holidays were not spoilt but, in the British Isles, the vagaries of the summer weather have, nearly always, called for a certain amount of fortitude. Those who holidayed abroad had boring sunshine all day - but how exciting is that? Despite the above, I hope the children will be keen on getting the new term underway. A big welcome is given to all the new children joining the school for the first time. Also, we must not forget those who go to their new secondary level of schooling, be it at QE or Okehampton. Once again, here's wishing Good Fortune to them all! It's a big step up from primary to secondary schools.

And that's all I've got from the school.

Now, an admission. I don't have access to my main computer this time so Snippets is being written on my laptop computer for the second time this year! It means that there might well be some mistakes in my efforts. I am used to the Word program for writing Snippets and the like. I don't really like Apple Pages. I don't know too much about it, hence mistakes. Can you guess that I am not too computer-literate?

Last month I brought up my experiences of winter 1977/78 when I had difficulty getting out of Cherry B to get back to my ship in Devonport. There have been worse winters. My mother moved down to the village from our old home in Islip in Northamptonshire in the autumn of 1962. I had, in the meantime, joined the Royal Navy at Britannia Royal Naval College, Dartmouth, in September of that year. So it was that I left Islip in September to join the RN and came on my first weekend from BRNC in November to the village of Cheriton Bishop. I digress a little. Although there was a little snow around by Christmas, the heavy falls came after I had returned to Dartmouth. On the coast the weather was far more benign than that experienced on the northern flanks of Dartmoor. My mother's photographs taken at that time show quite deep snow where the path to the front door had been dug out. What is more, the snow hung around until April/May time. That winter must rank as one of the most severe in the area.

On, then, to another little anecdote about winter in Cheriton Bishop and the RN. I think it was the winter of 1982/83 when I was on a weekend's leave from my ship, *HMS Londonderry*, in Portsmouth. I went up to Checkers to pick up my newspaper on the Sunday morning. As I walked there was a feeling of some slight dusty snow in the air. Up at the shop people were talking about Sticklepath and South Zeal being snowed in already. As I walked back down the lane I sensed that the snow was beginning to get heavier and I got back home to telephone my nephew John, who lives in Exeter, to ask him if he would come out and take me into St. David's Station, I having no car at the time. By the time he got out to me the snow was beginning to lie on the ground and I was grateful to get on my way! Once in at the railway station, I sorted out the train times and caught the train for Salisbury which would connect with a Portsmouth train and get me back to the 'Derry in good time, I thought. But it was not to be. We got as far as Chard Junction before we pulled up in the passing loop there. It was announced that the telegraph wires had been blown down further up the track and we would have to await the arrival of another engine to haul us back to Exeter. I don't know if you are acquainted with the layout at Chard Junction but there was a pub just across the road from the old (ex) station. By this time it must have been

3 o'clock and, it being a Sunday, the landlord of the pub was just sitting down for his own Sunday lunch. Very graciously, he agreed to re-open the pub, once he had finished his lunch, so not all was lost. In due course, the engine from Exeter arrived and everybody climbed back onto the train and we set off back to the fair city. I, having a little bit of knowledge about the railways, decided that I would try going up to Westbury to catch a Bristol–Portsmouth train there. My sense of duty drove me on! The weather was not improving as we got into Westbury. The Portsmouth train duly arrived and the train crew were determined to make it to Pompey. So we set off to that great naval city. True to their word, the train crew got us to our destination through some fairly wicked conditions and I was able to rejoin my ship before the end of the day.

Monday saw me with one of my Leading Hands missing. He had phoned the ship to say he was unable to get back due to the bad weather. Later on that day he did manage to return and he told me what had happened. He lived in Exmouth and he had been on the Exeter–Salisbury train which had only got as far as Chard Junction......!! On return to Exeter he had carried on back to Exmouth and spent an extra night with his family. He was quite taken aback when I told him that I was on that same train but I had still managed to get back OK. He got off without punishment because I had experienced the problem and had a certain sympathy with him. It was only my understanding of the railways that got me back on the Sunday. Life can be quite intriguing at times!

Staying with railways, the Dartmoor railway had a special train to run on 1st August. Graham Isom, a very experienced railwayman had, that day, reached the 50th year of working on the railways. He is a well-respected man and he thought he was at Okehampton station to undertake instruction of a makee-learnee driver. He got a great surprise when the train rolled in from Meldon with a special headboard "Graham Isom 50 years Man and Boy" on the front of the locomotive. Not only that but the train was carrying erstwhile colleagues, family and friends to celebrate with him. They had been rounded up from all over the country. How it was kept secret from him involved a lot of subterfuge and discreet planning.

A quick mention of Mariners Away to round up this month's Snippets. We had a great time at the King's Arms, our 'home port' in South Zeal, on the Saturday of the Dartmoor Folk Festival. #### Wooston Castle

Wooston Castle is an Iron Age hill fort currently hidden amongst the trees within Fingle Wood. The deep ditches and high earth ramparts are all that remain of what would have been much more impressive structure, with its snaking entrance trackway through impressive lines of deep ditch and ramparts likely topped by wooden palisades enclosing an area likely holding roundhouses that would have been settled for at least some of the year. The earthworks now defining Wooston Castle in its dramatic position in the valley are now hidden by trees some 2000 years on. Over the years the native trees have naturally regenerated or conifers have been planted, making it difficult to see, but maps of these mounds indicate the large size of this hill fort, which is in close proximity of those found at a mile or so along the Teign Valley (Prestonbury Castle and Cranbrook Castle).

Wooston Castle is a Schedule Ancient Monument. The structure is extremely unusual because it has a complex array of outworks. It contains important archaeological and environmental evidence, which we hope to study over the next few years as part of the Heritage Lottery Funding. However it is at risk. The roots from the trees and bracken that grow here are slowly destroying the archaeology beneath the soil. Therefore we need to intervene to preserve the archaeology found here. Over the summer we have had the working horses out rolling the bracken to weaken this plant and in the autumn a large area of conifer trees in the Wooston Castle area will be felled. We will be carrying this work out as sympathetically as possible and we will be bringing back working horses to move the felled trees rather than heavy machinery.

#### Local talent on show at Stone Lane Gardens

Stone Lane Gardens is delighted to welcome back the Stallcombe House Weavery to exhibit their beautiful textile and ceramic work in The Barn Gallery. From now until the end of September you can admire and buy pieces from this exciting new exhibition of work designed and made by residents and day placement guests in the Weavery.

Stallcombe House is a residential community for adults with learning disabilities, based in Woodbury near Exeter. Residents are provided with a home for life and a happy and safe work place, with a holistic and organic approach to personal health and the living environment. As part of this many of the residents and day placement guests choose to develop their creative talents in the Weavery.

Guided by Weavery Co-ordinator Sam Smith and her team, they produce a beautiful variety of pieces using the tactile mediums of felt and clay. Residents and day guests are involved in all aspects of the work; contributing to the design as well as the creation of finished items ready for sale.

Many of the felt items include wool from the Stallcombe alpacas and angora goats, so the residents who work mainly in the animal centre contribute to the work of the Weavery as well. The Barn Gallery exhibitions are a relatively new addition to the artistic side of Stone Lane Gardens, running alongside the annual 'Mythic Garden' sculpture exhibition of over 100 sculptures sited in the wonderful 5 acre woodland garden until the end of October. The exhibitions and gardens are open every day from 10am to 6pm and visitors can purchase and take home their own Stallcombe creation or sculpture.
