Cheriton Bishop Parish Council Report

Meeting Monday 12th December 2016

(Compiled by Tim Vooght)

Public Open session

Members of the public spoke about the use of the Village Green, as the Parish Council had asked about future usage at the previous meeting. A member of the public suggested using it as a dog walking area as there are no safe areas in the village to walk dogs. The village Plan was quoted where 65% of respondents had wanted a dog walking area. It was also suggested that the dog walkers could manage and oversee its usage. Other members of the public said it should continue to be used as a play area for young people and had been well used until the grass cutting had ceased. They suggested that the area needed further play equipment and some goal posts. The need for maintenance of the fence area was also discussed.

Future use of the village green.

It was decided to bring this item forward in the agenda, as it had been raised by members of the public. Mid Devon District Council has provided quotes for grass cutting of the village green. After discussion and taking into account what the members of the public had suggested and the content of an email received by the Clerk against using the area for dog walking, it was decided to proceed with 10 grass cuts per year at £40.50 per cut and continue to use the area as a public open space with no access to dogs. It came to light that another area of the village could be used for dog walking. Councillors suggested that perhaps a dog walking group could get together with the custodian of that land and come to some agreement.

The land agent for the village green had supplied a copy of the licence with regard to the rent increase for the village green in which it was requested that the amount be back dated to March 2016. There was no indication in the licence that back dating of the rent was justified so, it was agreed that this would be challenged. It was also noted that whilst checking the licence, that it does not permit dogs to use the area.

The District Councillors would ask whether Section 106 money could be used for some enhancement of the village green.

Councillors made reports on:

No progress had been made on the Checkers Store planning application for the lean-to at the rear of the building.

A Councillor had attended a Highways Presentation Day at Kennford and reported that there was an enhanced Website for reporting highway and associated matters:

new.devon.gov.uk/roadsandtransport/report-a-problem

This includes interactive maps where you can pinpoint an area and is more user friendly. There were presentations on Snow and Road Wardens and some Parishes already have this in place. It was also noted that if Parishes wished to purchase more grit bins, then Devon County Council would take responsibility for filling them.

The Chairman attended a meeting at Tiverton where the Leader of Devon County Council, Councillor John Hart, spoke about further cost cutting to the budget, which was likely to be up to 40%. Grass cutting and devolution was also discussed.

District Councillors reports

Councillors reported that Mid Devon District Council were looking to house five refugee families. That budgets will be cut again in 2017/18 and that the Leader of Mid Devon District Council, Clive Eginton would be willing to attend the January meeting to outline the proposal for devolution in Devon. The Councillors also reported that the Young Farmers had held an open day and have now moved into the old Mulberry building.

The Local Plan had been approved and the Planning Enforcement Officer was looking at the situation at Southcombe Hill Farm.

Planning Applications:

Certificate of Lawfulness at Polford Cottage for existing use of an annex as a separate dwelling in breach of condition 4 of the planning permission 02/02248/FULL.

Greenacres – erection of an extension to an Agriculture building.

The Council had no comment to make to either of these applications.

Planning Decisions

Glebe View – single storey extension. Permission granted.

Brackenwood – felling of x5 Ash trees within a conservation area. No objection.

Southcombe – Prior notification for the erection of a general purpose Agriculture building. Development Acceptance.

Consideration of the Quotes for the New Bus Shelters

Two quotes have been received from local builders and a further one is still outstanding. One of the quotes received, only contained a total quote and it was requested that the costs for each shelter be provided. Councillors also suggested that the Developers at Moor Park may wish to help and that local businesses may wish to make donations towards the costs.

Parish Council Meeting – 9th January 2017

Public Open Session

In excess of 20 members of the public were in attendance to voice concerns about the intended road closure of the C507 for a month from 27th February. It was felt that there were significant issues arising from this closure;

1. The intended diversion was highly inadequate to support the required volume of traffic including larger vehicles including the school bus
2. A month is felt to be far too long to close a road of such local significance
3. Temporary traffic lights is considered a much better alternative

Overall it was felt that the intended closure paid little or no consideration to the needs of our local and neighbouring communities.

The above issue was later discussed by the Parish Council where it was agreed to write to Devon County Council and the contractors to voice the concerns of the community.

Visit from Clive Eginton (Leader of Mid Devon District Council)

Clive talked about the devolution of power from Westminster to local communities following the Cities and Local Government Devolution Act 2016. The purpose of devolution is to remove decisions from Westminster where it is felt they would be better made locally. At present there is a bid being made to create a decision making authority named 'Heart of South West' which includes the following organisations types all of which will have equal voting rights;

- 17 Local Authorities and District Councils
- 3 Clinical Commissioning Groups
- 1 Local Enterprise Partnership
- 2 National Parks

The proposals will see the Heart of the South West leading on the following agendas;

- A greater say in highways
- 100% super-fast broadband
- Employment support
- Land and housing
- Health and wellbeing
- Productivity planning

Local Plan

Clive talked about the amendments to the local plan, which is currently out to consultation ending on 14th February. The most significant changes in Cheriton Bishop relate to Land off Church Lane where the proposed allocation is to reduce in size from 1.9 to 1.4 hectares, which accommodates 20 houses rather than the 30 originally proposed. 30% of the 20 will need to be affordable housing.

Village Green

The village green will be on the agenda for the March Parish Council meeting. Any further views from the public will be welcome at this meeting. The village tidy to be held in April will focus efforts on tidying the village green.

Moretonhampstead Hospital

The scope of the hospital is changing however the charity 'Friends of the Hospital' has funds that have been donated by local people. This money needs to be spent to meet the needs of locals but within the constraints of the changed scope of the hospital. The charity is seeking trustees to ensure that these funds are spent wisely. Anyone interested in this work should contact a member of the Parish Council.

Annual Parish Meeting

The meeting will be held on 27th March. All local societies are welcome to come along and discuss achievements from the past 12 months.

Bus Shelters

The Parish Council is attempting to fund 2 new bus shelters that will be built to stand the test of time. Unfortunately it does not have the required funds to build on both sides of the main road. We are therefore seeking support from any local businesses that would like to sponsor/contribute to the building work. District Councillor's Comments

No doubt most people are aware that there were plans to close the Yeoford to Cheriton Bishop road between Lewdon Cross and Four Cross Ways from February 27th to March 24th so that work could be carried out on the road safety barriers both sides of the bridge over the A30 dual carriageway. The suggested diversion was to follow either Church Lane past the Church and School or from Four Cross Ways to Froggy Mill and back up past Medland Manor to Lewdon Cross.

Many interested people attended the last Parish Council meeting where the matter was discussed. As a result of the pressure exerted by Cheriton Bishop Parish Council, myself and your many emails to the contractor Jacobs, they have now reduced the time for the closure to two weeks. Also at weekends the road will be controlled by traffic lights and a special arrangement will be made for the school buses. The alternative route has now been changed taking you back to Whiddon Down via Hittisleigh to Yeoford. This will be necessary for lorries and large vehicles whereas cars may be able to make use of more local shorter routes.

I have requested a site meeting to discuss the work to be undertaken and the above arrangements but at the time of writing this has not been granted.

While on the subject of roads there will be patching work carried out between Blackdown Cross and Twisted Oak Cross from 30th January to 3rd February so that length of road will be closed. This work is subject to weather and circumstances prevailing at the time.

This is a Villages in Action event. Do turn up and support it! The hall will be in café style, and there will be refreshments available.

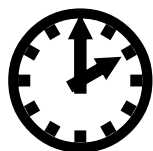

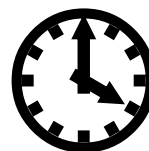

From the Rector

Why is February so much shorter
than the other months?

It seems odd that the other months have either thirty or thirty one days when poor old February is two or three days shorter. It would be fairer for all the months to have thirty or thirty-one days. That would mean seven months of thirty days and five months of thirty-one days. Just to rebalance things, let's suppose that the current seven months with thirty-one days forfeit one day. They become thirty-day months and the remaining months are promoted to become thirty-one day months. That sounds a much fairer and even distribution. But what would happen to your birthday if it was 31st Jan, before the re-adjustment? You then start to see some of the problems of adjusting the calendar. When the calendar was changed in 1582 ten days were skipped and so October 5th to October 14th 1582 never existed. If your birthday was between those dates, did you bother with a birthday celebration?

The real problem is that people were good at following the moon, a twenty nine day month. What really drives our climate is the sun, but it is much harder to follow an annual cycle, it is just too long. Therefore, there have been many attempts to adapt the lunar cycle to match a solar cycle. Originally calendars stopped counting in winter and restarted in spring. So the last two months to be added to the calendar were the winter months January and February. All months would have probably started out with twenty-nine days and made longer to adapt to the solar calendar. You might argue that February has kept to its original length and the other months have been adapted.

Like February we often feel short-changed, everyone seems to have more than we have and it feels unfair. It is easy to feel that if we had a little more we would be much happier. The problem is often, the more we have the more we expect, and the more disappointed we become with what little we have. It quickly becomes a downward spiral into discontentment. Maybe we are looking at the situation from the wrong perspective. If we think of February, it is unique and different. It is not like all the others, it stands out as being special. We need to understand that we are all special and that we do not have to strive to be something that we are not; that is a much better understanding of ourselves.

What is clear is that God values us for what we are and for what we can achieve. He does not look at us and wish we were more than we could be. It is however equally true that we can make the most of what we are and how we can help others. If we do not do this we actually short change ourselves and never reach our full potential. Surely we all need to be encouraged to do our best, which is exactly what God does.

“STRAIGHT FROM THE HORSE’S MOUTH”.

Just out of the “stable” in the Devon & Cornwall Police area is a new system of communication between the public and the police (and other emergency services). The scheme is an on-line secure messaging System, available to authorised administrators – such as Neighbourhood Watch Members – to quickly inform on crimes committed and possible patterns of crime. It covers everything from burglaries, fraud, anti-social behaviour to crime prevention and suspicious activity.

It supersedes the “Community Messaging Service” which simply failed to inform! Good examples of this failure have been the lack of any information or request for information from the Police, relating to six break-ins in Cheriton Bishop in the last few months!

The new system is not fully up and running but here is a flavour of its reports.

“A Message sent on behalf of “Action Fraud 05/01/17” – Action Fraud has received reports of victims receiving convincing e-mails from Amazon. The spoof e-mails from service@amazon.co.uk claim recipients have made an order on-line – an expensive chandelier- Bose Stereos, iphones and luxury watches. The e-mails state that if the recipients haven’t authorised the transaction they can click on the help centre link to receive a full refund. The link leads to an authentic looking site which then asks victims to confirm their name, address and Bank Card Information.

Amazon state “they will never ask for personal information by e-mail.

Another message from the Neighbourhood Watch network 17/01/17. A Scam going around by ‘phone from BT and Openreach, usually ringing about your internet and eventually attempting to get personal details.

We have had two reports of a similar scam in our community where victims were told their BT rental payments were not paid. What followed was the usual attempt to elicit bank details, which neither gave, but one was actually threatened with violence if the information was not forthcoming. **This was reported to the Police.**

A third fraud – convincing letters being sent on a replica template of Lloyds Bank telling recipients their accounts have been subject of “unusual transactions”. It asks them to call a number and an automated welcome message is played asking the caller to enter their card number, account number, sort code etc..

These letters are a sophisticated phishing attempt and serves as a warning to consumers to question even written correspondence from their Banks!

Apologies for repetition to our NHW members who have already received this information instantly. You can too, by joining Cheriton Bishop & Crockernwell Neighbourhood Watch.

In any event, if you are aware that you are being “scammed”, don’t give any information away but do contact **ACTION FRAUD ON 0300 123 2040**

We have felt for a long time that communications between the Police and Neighbourhood Watch (and that’s YOU) have deteriorated. **Neighbourhood Alert**, being rolled out across the country, will hopefully keep us up-to-speed on crime, the causes of crime and the solution when it occurs.

I've never been superstitious but the events that happened on that day might go some way to convince me that Friday 13th can be unlucky. First off was the early morning major leak on the water main in the lane. To give them their due, South West Water were tackling the job fairly quickly. Unfortunately, as they were repairing the mains pipework, they severed the BT cable which runs adjacent to the water main. That was the second incident. The water was fairly quickly restored but dear old BT didn't attend to the problem until Saturday morning and that was only after they had been told that they didn't need to dig up the road as SWW had left the hole unfilled. The third happening was the dropping of my ancient Nokia mobile telephone onto the kitchen floor!
