Welcome to the Newsletter

April 2021 Edition

With the vaccination roll-out and Step 2 of the lockdown on the horizon, I'm hoping that we're nearly there. But even with restrictions lifting, I think I'll still be nervous about going to the beach with the dogs or just going to the supermarket. Here's the lowdown on what is (hopefully) going ahead mid April:

'From 12th April, will see the opening of nonessential retail; personal care premises such as hairdressers and nail salons; and public buildings, including libraries and community centres. Indoor leisure facilities such as gyms will also reopen (but only for use by people on their own or in household groups); as will most outdoor attractions and settings including outdoor hospitality venues, zoos, theme parks, and drive-in cinemas. Self-contained accommodation such as campsites and holiday lets, where indoor facilities are not shared with other households, can also reopen.

Hospitality venues will be allowed to serve people outdoors and there will be no need for customers to order a substantial meal with alcoholic drinks and no curfew, although customers must order, eat and drink while seated ('table service'). Wider social contact rules will apply in all these settings to prevent indoor mixing between different households.'

I feel like the whole nation has got a bad case of cabin fever. Here's hoping we get a wonderful Spring and Summer (and haircut) we deserve it!

Temporary Prohibition of Through Traffic

Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 - Section 14

The County of Devon (Temporary Restriction) (Road From Cheriton Cross To Wallon, Cheriton Bishop) Notice 2021

Devon County Council hereby give notice that from **Monday 12th April 2021** for a maximum of 5 days, until **Friday 16th April 2021** (both dates inclusive), no person shall cause or permit any vehicle to proceed on the sections of affected roads.

Road from Cheriton Cross to Wallon, Cheriton Bishop 155m SW of access to Jervis Farm on road from Cheriton Cross. The alternative, signed, route for vehicles will be via roads from:

Earth Corner

Meat: A Benign Extravagance?

Like many other households we will be having lamb for our Easter dinner. It'll be from our own small flock, reared on grass. (This takes a year because Jacobs sheep are skinny little things who don't put weight on fast, though they lamb well on their own outdoors).

I know, veganism is probably the best diet for the planet. Vegan diets use far less land, so lessen deforestation, and research suggests plant-based diets are also better for health.

But according to Simon Fairlie who defends meat eating as a 'benign extravagance', livestock can be reared without costing the planet, and on traditional mixed farms animals can help fend off predators and pests and provide fertiliser. Simon milks 4 cows in an off grid microdairy in Dorset (using a wind up gramophone and a pile of 78's to entertain the cows while milking) and sells delicious cheese.

'What are the most sustainable types of meat?' Time magazine asked Simon.

'Pigs fed off food waste, whey and other forms of garden and agricultural waste. Dairy cows that are eating grass and clover as part of mixed-arable rotation. They have very little toll on the environment and are, on balance, benign. The way forward is to switch to organic farming.'

For a sustainable diet Simon agrees that all together we'd have to cut meat consumption by half, but could maintain most of our dairy intake, using less intensive organic methods.

Fortunately in Cheriton Bishop we have organic milk close at hand with the *Milk on the Moove* trailer regularly in the village, also advertising organic meat when available.

In The Garden: Spring is Here!

If March is full of the promise of Spring, April is when we begin to see it happen. Always, this depends on the weather, as we can still have frosty nights and cold winds but when the sun shines, plants make great strides. Everywhere, there is a gradual greening of hedges and lawns.

April is a good time to plant evergreen hedges (such as Holly, Berberis or Escallonia) as they won't have to contend with cold winter winds before they have a chance to get established. Trim winter flowering heathers as they begin to turn brown, allowing new fresh growth to show through.

Cut back Cotinus (smoke bush) and Sambucus (Elderflower) so that attractive young foliage will grow. Tie in fast growing shoots of climbers such as clematis and roses to make sure they go where you want them. Divide Hostas as they begin to shoot, cutting them into segments. The most vigorous growth is on the outside so this will rejuvenate them.

Sow lots of seeds as the soil will be warming up enough to direct sow if you don't have a greenhouse. It is best to wait until the end of April to sow fast growing annuals like courgettes and sweetcorn to ensure they won't get frosted.

Main crop potatoes should be planted by April to give them a good growing season. If you are pruning big shrubs (like Buddleia), bear in mind that the prunings could come in handy as pea or bean supports.

Enjoy being outside with your hands in the warm and productive earth!

Thanks to everyone who dressed up for this year's World Book Day.



Neighbourhood Watch

Pet Theft

Neighbourhood Watch has been carrying out a survey to try to understand pet theft and in particular dog theft. There is growing concern with reports in the media of an increased number of dogs being snatched by criminals during these last twelve months of lockdown. The survey objective is to understand response concerns and recommend what further preventative measures can be put in place by the owners. Watch this space...

Livestock Worrying

With the better weather and the lockdown end in sight, there is likely to be more people out and about enjoying the countryside and in particular the open moorland. With this comes preventing livestock worrying which is a crime and any livestock that are chased or attacked by dogs, are often killed or injured. This has a financial and an emotional impact on all concerned and proceedings can be taken against the owner and the dog destroyed.

Responsible dog ownership and their behaviour should be managed at all times. On Access land, dogs must be on a lead between 1st March and 31st July and at all times when livestock is present.

Village Scam

N W understands a villager received a unexpected phone call from someone saying that there was reason to believe that their computer was being hacked and bank details had been taken. The person said they could put it right for them. Unfortunately access to the computer was allowed and money taken. This was a scam.

Do not allow anyone access to your computer especially to someone you do not know. They may be very persistent and seem to know information about you and are requesting account and or pin numbers.

Most of our computers contain a great deal of personal information especially after the last twelve months of shutdown when goods have been ordered online.

Try to Spot a Scam Email

Some things to remember when opening a suspicious email.

If the sender's email address looks wrong or suspicious, then roll the mouse pointer over the sender's name to check and if it doesn't match the website address it says it is from, it could be a scam.

If the email doesn't use your name, but says something like 'Dear customer', or a sense of urgency

is apparent and asking you to act immediately, or a website link that has a letter missing or is spelt wrong, or a request for personal information, or poor grammar with spelling mistakes, are nearly all scam techniques and should be avoided and emails deleted. Do not click on any links.

Cold Caller

In the village a few weeks ago, there was a man from a company going around knocking on doors of properties near the old A30, trying to sell 'home insulation' products. Villagers who opened their front doors have said that they felt very uneasy as this person was by all accounts very pushy. If this happens again, try to know who is at the door before opening and keep the door locked at all times. If by mistake or habit you do answer, keep the door on the safety chain if you have one.

Warning

Some villagers have been receiving phone calls claiming to be from Amazon Prime and also from other companies saying there is something wrong with your account. If you receive such a call and you know that what they are saying is not correct because for instance you do not have an account with that company, then it is a scam. End the phone call immediately.

Police

It's reported that during 2021/22 Devon & Cornwall Police are recruiting another 232 persons for front line jobs. 181 to increase neighbourhood teams, 22 extra contact staff to reduce 101 call waiting times and 29 crime investigators. The cost is reflected in the budget which means a £14.92 increase in the police annual precept for Devon and Cornwall households for a band D property.

That's it for this issue. We are coming to the end of lockdown it seems. We hope that people still remember the stay safe rules that most of us have been following, or the advice provided by the government at that time.

New Hope

For many people, Spring marks the beginning of a new season often associated with new life or a new start. It was often regarded as the start of a new year, a new beginning. The winter is a fallow time when things appear to stand still and not change. With the return of the light and the warmth, things come back to life or are born.

For many people, the third national lockdown has been a fallow time, waiting to be released back into life. I guess many people have seen on TV the cattle being released from the winter cow sheds to new spring grass. There is a sense of urgency and excitement about new freedom and fresh food! Sadly, despite the excellent work of people during the lockdown, there is still great uncertainty about the way forward. We are given some insight into God's working, which is very rarely clear and obvious. Instead, we are encouraged to take small steps forward and trust that we will be guided to the right path. We see Jesus concerned with lost and vulnerable people.

As we emerge from this crisis there will be many people who are lost and afraid. We need to take time to help and encourage others, instead of the way of the world which is to help ourselves and make sure we are alright.

The pandemic reminds us that we are accountable to each other and we should offer support and encouragement to those around us.

This is about a community working together rather than a few doing well while others struggle around them.

The real hope is that as we have drawn together in the difficult times, we continue to do so in this new beginning.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting

Held on the 8th March 2021 using virtual Zoom technology as permitted by the Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus)

Present: Cllr Milton (Chair), Cllr Ball, Cllr Benjamin, Cllr Edwards, Cllr Salmon, Cllr Tomlinson,

Cllr Westcott, Cllr Wood, Cllr Coren (MDDC), Cllr Penny (MDDC) and Cllr Way (DCC)

In Attendance: The clerk

1. To receive and accept apologies: No apologies were received.

- 2. To receive declarations of interest to receive declarations of personal and disclosable pecuniary interests in respect of items on the agenda: Cllrs Benjamin and Salmon declared personal interests in application 21/00076/CAT. Cllrs Ball and Tomlinson declared personal interests in application 21/00266/OUT.
- 3. Public Discussion an opportunity for members of the public to make representations, answer questions and give evidence in respect of any item on the agenda: There was no public discussion.
- 4. Cheriton Bishop PC Meeting Minutes 8th February 2021 to consider the approval of the minutes as a correct record: It was resolved to approve and sign the minutes as a correct record.
- 5. MDDC planning applications to comment on the following applications:

Reference: 21/00266/HOUSE

Proposal: Outline for the erection of 1 dwelling with all matters reserved

Location: Hill View Cheriton Bishop

Applicant: Mr P Nickells

Councillors referred to their objection submitted to MDDC on 4th May 2020 when the application was for 3 not 1 dwellings. It was resolved to object on the grounds set out in their previous objection submitted on 4th May 2020 and in addition for the following reasons: a) that the proposed access (which is approximately 25 m from the gateway feature at the entrance to Cheriton Bishop) raises concerns of safety and visibility, especially as vehicles leaving the village will be accelerating towards Woodleigh junction; b) that the Wildlife Trigger Table and Existing Site Plan are contradictory (for example the Trigger Table states no existing hedges will be removed but the Site Plan shows an entrance through the existing hedge; and c) the proposed development is not an exception under Local Plan Policy DM6. (Cllrs Ball and Tomlinson abstained from the vote). Cllrs also requested that MDDC take into account Teignbridge DC's comment that the site lies adjacent to the designated Area of Great Landscape Value within the Teignbridge Local Plan 2033 and that due regard be given to preserving the landscape as part of the wider consideration of the proposal.

Reference: 21/00266/HOUSE

Proposal: Erection of a single storey side and rear extension **Location:** Hazelmoor 3 Meadows Edge Hescane Park

Applicant: Mr J Terry

It was resolved to support this application.

Reference: 21/00076/CAT

Proposal: Notification of intention to reduce the height by 3m of trees by felling and laying to

reinstate hedge to 2m height within a Conservation Area

Location: Land & buildings at NGR 277191 93626 (Scout Hut) Cheriton Bishop

Applicant: Dr A Smith

Councillors discussed the amenity value of the trees and hedge. The hedge provides beneficial screening and is also a sound barrier for noise from the A30. Some of the mature trees are in very good health and should be preserved although others (at the eastern end) are not in good health. It was acknowledged that if the hedge is laid properly and maintained every 3 years it will grow back thicker which will be beneficial for mammals in the long term. It was resolved to forward these comments to MDDC for their consideration and ask that, if it is decided to fell some trees, MDDC first meets with a councillor and the tree surgeon to agree the healthy trees that should be preserved and tape them off before any work starts. (Cllr Benjamin abstained from the vote.)

6. Planning Application 21/00005/FULL – Woodland at Tillerton Steep – to update councillors:

Proposal: Erection of a general purpose agricultural building and retention of access and hardstanding

(revised and additional drawings)

Location: Woodland at NGR 278898 95235 Tillerton Steep, Cheriton Bishop

Applicant: R Lew Weisl

It was resolved to continue to object to this application for the reasons previously submitted on 9th February and with the following additional comments: a) the proposed soakaway appears only to collect water from one side of the barn. The water from the other side of the barn will drain onto an impermeable surface; and b) the proposed soakaway is in a 1 in 4 downstream slope. A geotechnical slope stability assessment should be carried out to satisfy any concerns about instability and erosion of the hillside. If consent is granted the condition previously suggested to MDDC should be imposed. It was noted that the hatched area on the drawing includes part of the bridleway; this is misleading as it suggests that the applicant is intending to hard surface the bridleway.

- 7. MDDC New Licence Application under the Licensing Act 2003 to consider an application made by Mr A Butler in relation to Medland Lodge Farm: It was resolved to support this application to encourage a local business initiative.
- 8. Wildlife Wardens to consider introducing a scheme for Wildlife Wardens in the parish: Cllr Westcott reported on a Wildlife Warden scheme which has been by introduced by Teignbridge DC. Parish based volunteer wardens are trained to help support, protect and increase wildlife and improve its chances of surviving ecological and climate emergencies. Cllrs discussed the possibility of introducing such a scheme in Mid Devon and the parish. Cllr Penny explained that MDDC applauds the initiative and would like to encourage it but has no spare funding capacity in the current financial year. To be on the April agenda when Cllr Westcott will report further.
- 9. Climate Change to receive an update on climate change initiatives: Cllr Wood updated on progress at the Village Green. The wildflower seeds will be sown by a team of volunteers when the weather is warmer. The aim is to provide a pleasant environment for children which will encourage them to play locally and save travel out of the parish.
- 10. Mid Devon Call for Sites for housing and economic development in relation to a new Local Plan for Mid Devon: It was agreed that the Call for Sites should be advertised on the PC and village Facebook pages so that parishioners are aware of the request.
- **11.** Community Broadband to consider how to raise awareness in the parish of broadband providers which may offer an improved service: Cllr Salmon reported on contact with Airband, who have been invited to make a presentation at the next PC meeting.
- **12.** Cheriton Bishop Website to consider re-registering the domain name and pay the annual fee: It was resolved to check that James Jillians is happy to continue responsibility for the website and if so to register the domain name (£25 for 2 years) and pay the annual fee (£30).
- **13.** Lease of Glebelands Play Area: It was resolved to sign the lease of the play area. Documentation relating to the installer of the new equipment to be obtained on completion and clerk to ask MDDC again to cut back the overhanging oak tree.

- **14. Glebelands Play Area to consider the running of the play area:** Clerk report that she had asked that MDDC train councillors on regular safety checks. Clerk to obtain a safety check sheet. Councillors agree that they would empty the bin to save paying MDDC a fee for this service. New seating and play equipment for older children to be considered at a later date.
- 15. Annual Meeting: It was resolved to hold the Annual Meeting on Zoom on 5th May commencing at 7pm.
- **16. Annual Parish Meeting:** It was resolved to hold the Annual Parish Meeting on Zoom on 26th April commencing at 7 pm. Clerk to invite parish groups to attend. To be advertised on Facebook pages and in the Newsletter.
- 17. Parish Council Meetings to consider how to enable smooth running of the Council including establishing advisory or executive committees: Councillors will volunteer for advisory committees on the spreadsheet circulated by Cllr Wood. Committees and membership to be confirmed at the Annual Meeting.
- **18. Updated PC policies to agree new policies:** It was resolved to approve the Statement of Internal Control and the Risk Assessment.
- **19. Village Green Grass Cutting 2021/22 to consider the quotation received from MDDC:** It was resolved to appoint MDDC to cut the Village Green 12 times a year at a cost of £1027.08 plus VAT.

- **22. To receive reports from Clirs for information only:** Clir Benjamin reported that the new noticeboard has been put up at the shop. Thanks to Peter Benjamin for his help and to Lucy Cooper for the noticeboard sign. The Parish Council Facebook page now has 80 members. Councillors requested to post updates on their projects.
- 25. To receive a report from Cllr Way (DCC) for information only: The HATOC meets on the 9th of March. Cllrs were updated on the Covid-19 vaccination sites. The Crediton site was only open once last week due to short supply of vaccine. Suggested cllrs report problems with specific potholes to him in addition to reporting on the website. Cllr Ball to send on the Highways Assessment when it is ready.

Tracy wanted to join the PC so that she could become more involved with her


