

Sculpture Exhibition

Stone Lane Gardens

Stone Lane Gardens are opening their doors once again to up and coming artists as part of their annual Ashburner prize. Sir Tim Smit, a founder of the internationally recognised innovative Eden Project, will open the exhibition to the public in July.

This year marks the 30th anniversary of an annual exhibition at Stone Lane Gardens. The Ashburner Prize builds on the legacy of founders, June and Kenneth Ashburner. All works within the exhibition will be open to sale and the winner of the Ashburner Prize will be awarded £1000 prize money.

Letters to the Editor

Parish Council: Planning Applications

How does the Parish Council decide whether to support or object to a planning application?

When the Parish Council is asked by MDDC to comment on planning applications, it can only comment on material considerations. There is little point in commenting on things other than material considerations, as these will not be taken into account by MDDC in their decision-making process (the same applies for comments about planning applications made by the general public).

Material Considerations

- Local, Strategic and National planning policy
- Supplementary Planning Guidance
- · Relevant case law
- Previous planning decisions & appeals on the site
- Traffic generation form the proposal and the access to the site
- Noise and disturbance as a result of the development (when completed more than during construction)
- Landscaping required/proposed as part of the development
- Impact on biodiversity including habitat and protected species
- Loss of trees on site or impact on trees with Tree Preservation Orders
- · Flood risk
- Hazardous materials/ground contamination
- Impact of development on setting of a listed building
- · Impact on conservation areas
- Impact of visual amenity of an area/street scene
- · Archaeological impacts
- Overlooking and loss of privacy
- Loss of light (significant) or overshadowing resulting from proposed development
- Parking
- Design and appearance of proposed development
- Layout and density of building/development proposed

Examples of things that are not material considerations

- Loss of value of neighbouring properties
- · Loss of view
- Competition
- Disputes between neighbours (land ownership, access rights etc.)
- Personal morals or views on an application
- · Applicant's motives
- Issues covered by other legislation
- Fence/boundary lines
- · Restrictive covenants

Not all planning applications can consider ALL material considerations. For example, an outline application won't consider reserved matters like the appearance of a building as there will be no designs for that at this stage.

Parish Councils can request that their MDDC ward member call in contentious planning applications to the Planning Committee for determination.

The planning authority applies the Planning Balance. (The process of 'weighing up' the relevant factors is often described as the 'planning balance'.) The planning authority must exercise its judgement and consider many (sometimes) conflicting issues to decide whether planning permission should be granted. They must consider the question is the public benefit outweighed by any harm caused by the development?

The final decision lies with the planning authority who may or may not heed the Parish Council's comments (the same goes for public and consultee comments).

Neighbourhood Watch

The New Normal

Well it looks like we are now learning our new normal. It may be sensible to continue to wear masks where there are large numbers of people gathered and in enclosed areas. Safety measures include hand washing, sanitising and maintaining distancing.

The new normal is all part of getting on with our lives but being careful at the same time. Follow Government guidance at all times.

Donate Ukraine

Scammers are about! Remember If you want to help the people of Ukraine, then donate wisely and do the research so that you give without being scammed.

Fraudsters are working hard at this very difficult time on how to take advantage of the situation and encourage people to part with their money and personal details when we all want to help the Ukrainian people. Be wary of cold callers, texts and links that pop up or appear when downloading attachments. If you receive a phone call put the receiver down and if it's a text message forward it on to 7726. Also be wary of fundraising pages on platforms. If you have been scammed or think you have contact your bank immediately.

Highway Code

The Highway Code has been updated and now includes three new rules about the priority or hierarchy of road users. Guidance is for all but especially to walkers, cyclists, horse riders and driving horse drawn vehicles. It covers the safe way to open vehicle doors from the inside by using the hand furthest from the handle of the door - this encourages you to look over your shoulder to check if there is a cyclist, vehicle or pedestrian close by. Charging electric cars is also covered in the update.

Heating Oil

Heating oil is used by a great many who live in the countryside. Due to the very high price of this at the moment, there is a great rise in the stealing of the oil from tanks on properties. Often the valve is left open so any oil left in the tank discharges onto the ground causing an environment issue

for the owner. Tanks are not very attractive and therefore they are often screened or hidden away somewhere which provide thieves with a perfect place to operate at.

Tanks can be locked, alarms fitted, warnings on mobile phones installed as well as movement sensors or flood lighting. It is always worth checking your tank storage monitor regularly, just in case there has been a visit during the night.

Livestock Worrying

This problem increases at this time of the year as the weather improves and more people go walking in the countryside. Dogs must be on leads where livestock is present. Livestock worrying is a criminal offence and can be devastating on livestock, farmers and in certain circumstances, for the dog and its owner.

Do enjoy the countryside and when walking on designated access land, dogs must be on a lead between 1st March and 31st July and at all times when livestock is around.

Burglary

Neighbourhood Watch has been trying to help us all feel safer at home by running a 'prevention' campaign. There are five major ways we can all help to reduce burglary to our property and these are: Windows - keep these locked. Interior - put inside lights on timers or use smart bulbs. Doors - double or deadlock. Exterior - put outside lights on a sensor. Neighbours - keep an eye out.

Constables

Devon & Cornwall Police are recruiting Special Constables. These are volunteer appointments, and will mean that we may see an increase in visiting police to our neck of the woods. It could be said that we have so few visits as this is a rather safe area to live, but, things do happen here from time to time and therefore:

Always be observant & vigilant and keep your eyes open when out and about.

Can Heat Pumps Beat Fuel Prices?

This sounds like magic to me – or is it a con? Heat pumps are supposed to move heat from the surrounding air or ground into your home. (What heat? At this time of year?) The Energy Saving Trust says 'the quantity of heat delivered into your home is much greater than the quantity of electricity used to power the system'.

That's two unlikely statements. I did some investigation. But it turns out our cat knew all about it. She often used to sleep on top of the fridge, because it was warm. In the end we covered it with a blanket, reminding us that anything else put there would collect a sprinkling of cat hair.

Apparently heat pumps are like a fridge in reverse. The warm place is in our homes, the place that gets marginally cooler is the great outdoors. Even in winter! Residual heat can be collected by turning a liquid into a gas, the gas is pressurised so it gets hotter, moved inside and then released, giving up its energy into air or water. The heat is low grade, so you need insulation to let it build up. (Insulation is the most cost-effective way to cut bills.)

Have I got that garbled? You may find a better explanation on the Energy Saving Trust website.

There are Two Points to Consider:

First, it uses electricity, like a fridge, but doesn't burn anything, so no CO2 created to add to heating the planet, except what makes the electricity in the first place. (NB you can go on a renewable electricity tariff without forking out much extra if at all).

Second, it's efficient and so compared to having an oil or LPG boiler, it cuts ongoing bills. The heat comes from outside, the electricity is only for moving it, so you get around 3 units of heat for 1 unit of electricity.

The Catch?

It costs. An air-to-water heat pump typically costs between £9,000 and £11,000, according to the Energy Saving Trust, plus some thousands to alter your radiators or put heating under the floor if you do it that way. Or you can use existing radiators with a hotter, less efficient heat pump system.

Obviously quotes will vary hugely depending on house size and many other things. Some financial help is available. From April 2022, UK households will be able to apply for a £5,000 grant to swap their oil or gas boiler for a low-carbon air-source heat pump (or £6,000 for a ground source heat pump).

Friends in Crockernwell recently installed an air source heat pump which serves two families (replacing solid fuel). Monthly bills haven't fallen (if they haven't risen, that's a miracle!), but the house is warm and cosy and it saves a lot of work. The cost, at £21,000, was higher since their system involved new radiators and incorporates solar hot water heating, but was partly balanced by government financial incentives, the now defunct RHI (Renewable Heat Incentive). Previously, in a new house, they had installed a ground source system using a 100 ft hole outside (though if you have land or a big garden, a horizontal pipe system is easier), and this worked well as they could incorporate under floor heating.

Go to the Village Meeting

In the Garden

We're Going Green!

Green leaves will be appearing everywhere, changing the landscape from bare browns to lush green in a matter of weeks. Tulips bloom in April, filling gardens with bright and elegant flowers. Enjoy them whilst they are at their best and if you need to move them as they finish flowering, lift them leaves and all. Remove seed heads but let the leaves dry out on the bulb and then store in a cool, dry place.

Hostas will be emerging and now is the ideal time to divide them. Dig up the whole plant and then chop it into segments, which can be replanted or potted up.

Early flowering shrubs like Forsythia and Chaenomeles can be pruned now to encourage compact flowering next year. Silver leaved shrubs can be cut back now too to keep them fresh and compact. Wait until the soil feels warm, but there are lots of seeds which can be sown outside in April.

Prepare a smooth, weed free seed bed and keep the seedlings watered until they get established.



In the vegetable garden, lettuce, peas, broad beans, leeks and beetroot can all be sown. Maincrop potatoes can go in trenches now, sprouts facing up, and well covered with good soil. Towards the end of the month, sweetcorn and courgettes seeds can be started in pots. These are better left later so that they don't get weedy and drawn before it is warm enough to plant them out.

Enjoy the energy of the garden in April!

Message from St. Mary's

Hope Restored

April is a time when we probably see the most amount of change, the days get longer, it is now British Summer Time and there is much more light in the evenings to go out and do activities after school or work.

There are signs of warmth from the sun that promise hotter days. Assuming it is actually warmer, then the trees and plants really start to grow and put out new growth and life. Hopefully, winter is becoming a distant memory and we look forward to Spring and Summer. Although we can still suffer really cold periods in April!

Not only are we looking forward to better weather, but we are also looking forward to better times. The hope is that in Spring and Summer the Covid 19 threat will be substantially reduced and life might return to something near the pre-pandemic levels.

Hope is really important, it can lift our spirits in difficult times. It can encourage us to keep trying and keep going when we might normally give up. Hope looks for real and positive change. The counterbalance to this is hopelessness when life looks like it might never get better and there is no end in sight.

Held at Cheriton Bishop Village Hall on Monday 14th March 2022

Present: Cllr Ball, Cllr Benjamin (Chair), Cllr Edwards, Cllr O'Neill, Cllr Salmon, Cllr Tomlinson, Cllr Westcott,

Cllr Wood, Cllr Coren (MDDC) and Cllr Letch (DCC)

In attendance: the Clerk and 4 members of the public

- 1. To co-opt a new Councillor: It was resolved to co-opt Peter O'Neill (proposed Cllr Benjamin, seconded Cllr Edwards).
- 2. To elect a Vice Chair or Vice Chairs: It was resolved to elect Cllr Ball as Vice Chair (proposed Cllr Edwards, seconded Cllr Benjamin)
- 3. To receive and accept apologies: Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr Penny (MDDC)
- 4. To receive declarations of personal and disclosable pecuniary interests in respect of items on the agenda: Cllr Salmon declared a personal interest in Item 9 and did not take part in the discussion of that item.
- 5. Public Discussion an opportunity for members of the public to make representations, answer questions and give evidence in respect of any item on the agenda: Three members of the public informed councillors of their concern about the dreadful state of repair of Holwell Lane which is so damaged that it is a dangerous hazard to cars, pedestrians, cyclists and horses. The defects are not just potholes, they are 'trenches' along the side of the road. It was confirmed that the damage has been reported on the DCC website but that nothing has been done. The road has been in a very bad state for many years. Cllrs recommended that residents contact DCC direct about the issue. Cllr Letch will follow up and escalate. Cllrs and the Clerk will also contact DCC.

One member of the public (the applicant) provided information about Item 9.

- 6. Cheriton Bishop Council Meeting Minutes 14th February 2022 to consider the approval of the minutes as a correct record: It was resolved to approve the minutes as a correct record.
- 7. To receive reports from MDDC Councillors for information only: The Mid-Devon Covid infection rate has increased by 20% in the last 10 days. Cllr Coren has recently attended the DNPA Forum which covered the Glover Report on National Parks. The MDDC Environment Public Discussion Group has plans to reduce the Mid-Devon carbon footprint and trees are being planted on surplus Mid-Devon land which is not reserved for development. Cllr Coren explained his concerns about Planning Application 21/02539 upon which the PC commented at its February meeting.
- 8. To receive a report from Cllr Letch (DCC) for information only: Cllr Letch reported that he has led an assembly at Copplestone School on 'accepting differences' and 'feet first'. He hopes to lead a similar assembly at Cheriton Bishop School and is in touch with the Head. Cllr Letch ran through DCC's budgets for 2022/23. Full details are on DCC's website. Of particular note is that £22.9 million will be taken from the emergency reserve to support services. There is no real increase in the Highways budget but £1 million has been set aside for road drainage and the repair of potholes. The Locality Fund budget as been decreased to £8,000 per councillor.
- 9. MDDC planning application to comment on the following application:

There will be 12 cuts a year and the mowings on the football pitch at the Village Green will be collected. Clerk to action.
- 14. Defibrillators to consider acquiring an additional defibrillator for the Parish and agree associated actions: After discussion of three quotations, it was agreed that a Zoll AED 3 defibrillator (which is the same as the existing defibrillator in the Parish) is the best option. The cost will be around £2170 including accessories, cabinet, training and installation. It was resolved to purchase the defibrillator when grant funding has been finalised. (An application to the National Lottery has been submitted).
- 15. Platinum Jubilee to receive an update on plans for the parish and agree associated actions: Cllr Benjamin explained that a timetable for a variety of events is coming together, with something planned for all 4 days. The PC has funding available to contribute to costs. The PC will not be planting any trees as part of the Queen's Green Canopy initiative but it was noted that free trees are available from the Woodland Trust. Cllr Benjamin will inform the School and the Church of this opportunity.
- 16. MDDC 20 mph Community Self-Assessment Form to consider completion and submission of the form for Cheriton Bishop and agree associated actions: It was resolved that Cllr O'Neill will complete and submit the form on behalf of the Council. It will be requested that the existing 20 mph area be extended to where Church Lane meets the C50, the Yeoford road from the C50 to the existing 30 mph limit and to Fairview on Holwell Lane.
- 17. Review of Council Documents: The Statement of Internal Control, Privacy Policy, Model Publication Scheme and Freedom of Information Statement were reviewed and approved. Cllr O'Neill suggested that the PC could publish a simple strategy document. All agreed this was a good idea. To go on a future agenda.
- **18.** Planning Information on Social Media to consider what planning information the PC should put on social media: After discussion it was resolved that it would be helpful to put information on the PC FaceBook Noticeboard about what Councillors can and cannot take into account when consulted on planning applications. Cllr Benjamin to action.

- 20. Compact Homes to discuss the concept of Compact Homes in relation to the Parish and agree associated actions: Cllrs agreed that Compact Homes in some form might be suitable for the parish and should be included in the comments made under Item 19 above.

Use of Green Lanes by recreational vehicles on Dartmoor to consider a response to the Glover Landscapes Review: It was resolved that the PC is against the use of green lanes by recreational vehicles on Dartmoor as they damage wildlife and habitat, result in costly repair works for the DNPA and are a nuisance to non-motorised users. Clerk to respond on behalf of the PC.
- **22.** Climate Change to receive an update: Cllr Wood reported that the bulbs planted in the Autumn are now coming into flower and attracting insects.
- 23. Social Media to receive an update: Cllr Tomlinson reported that the PC FaceBook page has now been up and running for a year. She has surveyed users about what they want from the page and has also surveyed residents of Moor Park to find out more about their perceptions, bearing in mind that they live in the Teignbridge District Council area but Cheriton Bishop Parish Council facilities. Cllr Tomlinson will provide more information at future meetings. Cllr Benjamin encouraged councillors to post updates on the FaceBook Noticeboard.

In these stormy times of dramatic weather, national and international politics on the boil, I thought it would be good to concentrate on things closer to home.

Two weeks ago I visited Copplestone primary school where I took the assembly for the whole school with parents and indeed grandparents. My theme was 'Accepting Difference', where I asked the children to think about how different we are and yet we have so much in common. I asked them to think about friendships and helping others. After the assembly the school was divided into two cohorts. To these children I gave my 'Feet First' talk where I showed the children how I cope with life. I show them how I write, peel a potato and slice it to make crisps, how I dress, eat and drive and answer any questions. I tried to show them that despite my lack of arms I do have hands even if they are at the end of my legs. Yes these are my 'hand-feet'. While I was at the school I touched briefly with the staff on special educational needs provision. I hope to go around all the schools in my division over the next month.

Still on the theme of education, at the recent Devon County Council meeting I had called for a report on elective home education (homeschooling as we know it). I am a little concerned at the lack of a rounded education. The report centres on children's physical and mental well-being and what help they can get from Devon County Council. I was also interested in examinations because, whether we like

it or not, they are often the gateway to a meaningful career. I would be very interested if any parents could give me feedback on what help they get from County and what they think they need. You can do this by e-mailing me at frank.letch@devon.gov.uk. All treated in confidence.

At the council meeting I was also able to present the petition I had received at a recent Crediton Hamlets meeting. It calls for County to seek funding for the commissioning and publishing of a feasibility study for the reinstatement of the second platform and improved access at Yeoford station. This would mean that local people in and around would be able to travel up to Okehampton and later beyond and would also guarantee a much more frequent service to Exeter.

I seem to spend a lot of my time e-mailing the highways officers because of the poor state of our roads. My latest request is for a SCARF enquiry to check speeds in Bow, Cheriton Bishop and Copplestone. With accurate data we should be able to install speed monitoring devices.

With the arrival of spring being almost imminent I hope to begin my monthly surgeries once again but I must warn you all that it will very much depend on the weather.


Cheriton Bishop Village FaceBook
