to raise funds to repair St. Mary's church roof in Cheriton Bishop



Remembering the end of World War Two

This August sees the 70^{th} anniversary of the end of World War Two. The Japanese finally surrendered on 14 August 1945, following the dropping of the atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, the Soviet declaration of war and the invasion of Manchuria.

The next day, Wednesday 15 August 1945 was celebrated as VJ (Victory over Japan) Day. The British and Commonwealth campaign in the Far East was the longest campaign of the war, fighting raged for three full years. The British Forces over there, unlike their comrades fighting in Europe, had no leave during which they could go home, even if it was for just a few days. They were there for the duration of the war, their only hope of seeing England was in victory. For the allied Far East Prisoner of War (FEPOW) life was extremely hard. The prison camps became infamous for the harsh treatment administered to their in-mates. Food was strictly rationed - all that many men had was a little rice and boiled river water. All the prisoners suffered with diseases such as malaria, beri beri and dysentery. Despite their weakened state the men were put to work as forced labour. The construction of the 258 mile Thailand-Burma railway, also known as the Death Railway, was the most notorious.

It is sobering to think that atomic bombs that were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki are estimated to have killed instantly over 140,000 people and about the same number were injured. However, they had been exposed to very high levels of radiation and the majority would die from radiation sickness.

The national commemorations will begin with a special commemoration on Horse Guards Parade, veterans and their families, which will include at its heart a traditional Drumhead Service. The Armed Forces will lead veterans and their families in a VJ Parade down Whitehall, past the Cenotaph, and the statue of Field Marshal Lord Slim, who famously led the 14th Army, and synonymous with the Second World War in the Far East. After the parade veterans and their families will be hosted at a 70th anniversary reception. On Sunday 16 August 2015, a service will be held at the Far East Prisoner of War Memorial Building at the National Memorial Arboretum, a wreath laying and blessing at the Far East Prisoners of War Grove will follow.

This anniversary is a sombre reminder of the human cost of war and the tragic events that leave deep scars in the memories of the survivors of the war. Despite these harsh realities people seem very able and willing to take up arms against others and even repeat acts of genocide. Edmund Burke said

"The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing."

At the heart of God is a demonstration of love that stands up against evil and delights in goodness. It relies on people doing good to transform the dark parts of our world. It is goodness that triumphs rather than might and it relies on many people acting out of love.

Fair Funding – Fair dealing!

We have been invited by the Police & Crime Commissioner, Tony Hogg, to support a campaign to elicit fairer funding for the Devon & Cornwall Police from the Government. Our voluntary efforts to make Cheriton Bishop a safer place, by setting up a Community Speed Watch, we believe, have not been given a fair deal. A lot of people in the community have been involved in this project so we think our response to the P&CC's request should be published in our Parish News Letter:

Fair Funding for Devon & Cornwall Police

Thank you for your letter reference the above. Jean Martin has asked me, as her Deputy, to reply on her behalf.

Whilst we accept your arguments for a fairer slice of the cake, we do feel the Police could improve productivity themselves by better use of volunteers. We were all impressed when you addressed us in Cheriton Bishop Village Hall at the start of your term of Office. You expressly championed, as you have done in speeches subsequently, the role of volunteers such as Neighbourhood Watch, in supporting the Police. Notable amongst the suggestions from the audience at that Meeting was the need for better communications from the Police to us, the public, using the Messaging Service. This has not happened!!

That volunteer spirit was here anyway in our strong NHW Group but we were further motivated by the results of our Parish Plan Questionnaire which showed that our community's top concern was road safety and in particular, speeding through our Village. It was resolved by the Parish Council, NHW and the Parish Plan Committee, to set up a Community Speed Watch. From our first approach to the Police/Highways, it took over 18 months for us to be told that we did not qualify.

In that year and a half, our volunteers waited and waited; we chased and chased with volumes of communications; research showed us that the cost of a camera was around £3000.00 so we got the forms to apply for a grant from the PCC Fund, but were told by the Police that funding was not an issue, so we did not!

Eventually, speed checks were made, but our contention is they were made in the wrong areas - not at the point where, previously, the Police had successfully manned speed checks. Indeed, they were done in a position where traffic is slowed down by parked vehicles outside the Shop/PO.

Our 18 month marathon of effort given freely, could, we believe, have been resolved in a couple of months at worst, thus saving both sides a lot of work! Clearly, the Police do not need our voluntary help and our community is far from happy about the outcome.

Mr Hogg, in your letter "Fair Funding", you have highlighted the reasons justifying additional funding which are laudable but surely, with a 7.5% reduction in recorded crime in the last year (Devon & Cornwall Police figures), the work load on the Police Force would have commensurately fallen. That plus the genuine enlistment of help from the voluntary sector might just solve the shortfall on funding.

We therefore feel no desire to support your campaign.

Oh to be young again! Memories of Cheriton/Tedburn YFC

I cannot remember the year I joined the club, maybe 1948. My mother tried to encourage me to join, she said "You will meet people of your age group". I had just left school. I wonder, was she hinting that I might meet a nice young man? I did and we were married for thirty-three and a half years! It is well known that the YFC is a marriage bureau. I agree as there are at least three generations of at least three families, maybe more, all connected with the YFC – and I know there is a fourth generation not yet old enough to join.

We had the usual meetings, competitions and trips to various places. A trip to the Cadbury's Chocolate Factory near Bristol in September/October time (cannot remember the year). They were making Easter eggs for the following Easter, several months on the shelves before being sold. Another trip we had was when we went to the Will's Tobacco Factory and saw the dried tobacco leaves go in one end and come out the other all neatly rolled and ready for packaging. As we left we were given a small tin of various cigarettes. I tried them all but I haven't smoked since.

Meetings were once or twice a month, can't remember much about them. Competitions were: Public Speaking, Brain's Trust, and Quizzes. I took part in one Public Speaking competition. I was the Chairman. That was the first and last time I did Public Speaking!

The competitions were for both boys and girls, and boys only, and girls only. There was Beef, Dairy, and Sheep stock-judging. We had Poultry judging – the hens were in cages and, of course, we had to handle them. The boys did thatching and hedge-laying and, I think, spar making for thatching. The girls did craftwork as well as the usual cookery. They did 'Darning a Sock', and 'Mending a Tear', also 'Ironing a Shirt'. I wonder who darns their socks or mends a tear now? The boys weren't so keen on the cookery but they were there when it was ready to eat!

One class we had was Ballroom Dancing. I enjoyed that because you could hold your partner, yes, *hold your partner, really hold them close.* Not like today – they just stand up and shake it all about or do some gymnastics. Oh to be young again!

It was not all work and no play. There were Dances, Dinner & Dances, and Xmas parties at different clubs in the county. Of course there were the Whist Drives and Bingos to boost the funds. I have just remembered, we had a Dairy Maid Competition (not a bikini clad person).

Remember this was just after World War II and the countryside was changing. Tractors were appearing and getting bigger. Farming methods were changing. Even the YFC Badge has changed in design (previously of horses ploughing) to keep up with the times.

My family is one of the families with three generations. The first generation became a member, then Club Leader, then became a coach for the public-speaking teams 1978 – 1989. The second generation joined the Club, in time became Club Chairman and then became Devon County Chairman in 1985. Going back to 1980 he won the cup for Landrover Driving at the National Final at Stoneleigh, Warwickshire and another member of Cheriton/Tedburn came 10th. The third generation has now joined the club – I wonder what is in store for him?

A little history for you: I mentioned we had Dinner Dances. Well, we had two at the Royal Hotel, Crockernwell. I know two YFC couples had their wedding receptions there. It was later renamed the Judge Jefferies. When the A30 dual carriageway bypassed Tedburn St Mary, Cheriton Bishop, Crockernwell and Whiddon Down it was sold to a developer who changed it into three homes, now known as Crockernwell Court.
