#### 173/13 Public Open Session

MOP asked if the local authority has any control over the emissions from the Tellams incinerator; he had noticed some strange smells. Chairman confirmed it was monitored and it was agreed to ask DCC for some information on the monitoring. It was also confirmed that SW Water by-products have been stored at the site.

#### **177/13 Minutes**

Minutes of the meeting on Monday 14th October 2013 had been circulated and it was resolved they be taken as read and signed as a correct record.

#### 178/13 Matters Arising

Parish Plan: Councillor Westcott reported the steering group wants to move forward with the report. The group would like comments from the Parish Council on the survey. A dog walking area had been suggested and a dog bin on the Yeoford Road. It was noted that dog bins are not usually located near residential areas. There was a request for allotments in the survey. Efforts have been made in the past to find local land which had been unsuccessful. There was no access into Glebelands play area for wheelchairs or pushchairs. Councillor Heal would speak to the MDDC Grants Officer to see if there are any funds available to provide a ramp. There were comments in the survey about making the council meetings more accessible, although it was not clear why they were thought to be not accessible. It is not possible to put the agenda in the newsletter due to the timing; the agenda is prepared and finalised one week before each meeting. It was suggested that a shortened version of the minutes is put in the newsletter. The use of social media was discussed.

Councillor Metters is following up information on the bus shelters.

#### 179/13 Chairman's & Councillors' reports

Chairman reported he had purchased and planted a copper leafed flowering plum tree and the new bench was in place at Jubilee corner. Councillor McDonald reported a blocked drain at Glebelands. Councillor Dicker reported the drain across the road at Venbridge was still blocked - agreed to pass to Councillor Way as he had dealt with it previously. The road surface at Four Cross Ways was very poor. Councillor Westcott said the Community Land Trust was re-evaluating the project as Moor Park has raised the number of affordable houses provided so the project might not be practicable as originally planned. The housing needs survey was being updated.

#### 180/13 District and County Councillors' reports

Councillor Heal said social media is being used by MDDC, especially by the Housing Dept. The Enforcement Officer had reported that Argermay appeared to be deserted and abandoned. Southcombe Hill is still ongoing. Councillor Heal passed on information on bus shelters and was able to confirm that S106 money could be used to replace but not repair a bus shelter. He reported that the MDDC rent arrears was the lowest for three years. The CIL charging system should start next year replacing S106. Councillor Coren said there was no problem with fitting a handrail on the steps from Hescane Park except that it was not clear at the moment who owned the steps. The Clerk advised that there may be some risks in fitting handrails to property not owned by the council - agreed to investigate further. MDDC are consulting on the provision of public toilets. MDDC are now licensing scrap metal dealers. Councillor

Coren responded to criticisms of the MDDC planning department at the last meeting. He quoted a recent review which placed the department as the 2nd highest in the South West for its speed and quality of decision making, the review had been circulated to councillors.

#### 181/13 Clerk's report and questions for the Clerk

The newsletter working group had met and reviewed the advertising rates which had not been increased for some years. It was recommended that the quarter page rate is increased to £40 and the half page to £80. Resolved to approve the recommendation. The group had also looked at the number of hours it used the Spalding Hall and recommended an increase in the rent paid to the Hall. Agreed that the Council would look favourably on a request to increase the rent from the hall committee. Copies of the community Right to Bid application forms had been circulated to councillors with the information required to make a bid.

#### 182/13 Planning applications

Consultation by Teignbridge District Council

13/03046/MAJ Moor Park Cheriton Bishop construction of 18 dwellings with associated roads and parking. The Parish Council welcomes the application and supports it, the council would like to suggest an S106 agreement to provide traffic calming on the C50 to control speeding on the main road. The council has some concerns about the lack of a pavement on the Dunsford Road which have already been brought to the attention of the Planning Officer by a local resident.

13/01336/CLU Land and Buildings at NGR 275327 93819 (Southcombe Hill Farm) Cheriton Bishop Certificate of Lawfulness for existing use of toilet block, office and general purpose agricultural use as granted under planning approval 09/01347/FULL together with former mobile home site as a single dwelling house. Application noted - agreed no further comment was needed but to re-emphasise all the comments already made.

#### **District Councillor's Comments**

Peter has been and still is very busy with the Planning Committee at Tiverton. He has also spent time visiting people in the home or on site helping and advising with their applications.

At the end of September the Regulatory Committee of which I am a member, met to implement the Scrap Metal Dealers Act 2013. This introduces a new licensing regime for those dealing in scrap metal. A scrap metal dealer's site licence costs £250 and a scrap metal dealer's collector's licence costs £180. There is now no transaction allowed with cash - every transaction has to be by cheque or bankers draft. Farmers, garages and small engineering firms are exempt from any charges as they are deemed to be selling something that is at the end of its useful life.

There are other issues as well that we are reviewing at Tiverton. A car parking committee, of which I am a member, is looking at how things can be improved right across Mid Devon. This has been prompted by the very successful new tariff that was introduced at St Saviours Way car park Crediton, where prices were reduced to £1.00 for 5 hours. Since then that car park has shown a substantial rise in income.

We would like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and peaceful 2014.

#### From the Rector

#### Tales of two Christmases

The words 'Bah Humbug' and 'Scrooge' immediately remind us of a famous Christmas story. They come from the Charles Dickens novel 'A Christmas Carol'. Many of us are aware of the story but may have never actually read the book by Charles Dickens. We have probably seen the film versions or TV drama based on the story. It is almost an annual event to have some new adaptation or a repeat of a favourite version. It has become part of the Christmas television package.

Sadly, I remember the Muppet version with most affection! It is interesting that the main character Ebenezer Scrooge has had his surname adopted into our English language and is associated with meanness and a lack of Christmas spirit. The book was written at the height of the industrial revolution and asks profound questions about the plight of the poor and the responsibilities of both society and the wealthy towards them.

There is a parallel idea that there are probably many people who have never read the story of Mary and Joseph in the bible. Yet they already know the story through nativity plays and television dramas. The context of the nativity story is very important; it is at the time of the Roman occupation and the need for a census to ensure that the right taxes are paid to the Romans. The Jewish nation is looking for freedom from occupation and oppression.

Returning to one of the central characters in Dickens story, the lasting legacy of Ebenezer Scrooge appears to be the meanness he characterizes. He is remembered most for his poor qualities of over working his employees, their poor working conditions, low pay, his hostility to worthy causes and the scorning of good times. We are given a glimpse that in his youth his affections were scorned and he became bitter and insular. The story was not meant to dwell on his short comings, but rather upon his transformation and redemption. Scrooge should be about turning a negative attitude into a transformed spirit of generosity. Yet the word 'scrooge' remains frozen in his past life and not in his liberated life.

I often feel the Christmas story is also locked in the past. It was a good thing that Jesus was born and that he did some good deeds. But like Ebenezer Scrooge the transformation in Jesus and his significance is largely lost and seems more like an idle tale. The Christmas story is about a human beginning but it also has an ending on Good Friday when Jesus dies on a cross. If that really was all there was to it, then it would just be ordinary. But Easter day replaces death with new life and hope. It speaks of God's love for each one of us. What is really extraordinary is that God choses the humble birth of Jesus to change the world. So, is the point of Scrooge to warn us about meanness, or that we can be transformed? So, is the point of Christmas about a baby being born, or that God works to forgive and restore us?

Teenagers are invited to enter these classes to compete on equal terms with the adults! Each exhibitor is allowed to enter two exhibits for each class. You have nearly nine months to ensure the show committee has problems displaying the enormous numbers of entry! (But the Society was forward thinking and did buy the marquee for that purpose; remember the tomato display of August 2013?!)

Remember that the points awarded to the prizewinners in these classes are counted towards the Challenge Cup. There is the possibility that should a person score highly in this section, the floral art, and the cookery with a few points in the flower and vegetable classes, they could win the Challenge Cup. Reading down the list of past winners all had the reputation for vegetable and flower growers but that could change with a future winner gaining the majority of points from different sections!

#### Parish Plan Questionnaire: Some Results

Thanks to all of you that took the trouble & interest in filling out the questionnaire for the Parish Plan. We are currently putting the plan together in response to your answers but in the meantime here is some feedback to give you a flavour of what came back to us. The response rate was 42%, which is pretty good, with information for 286 people.

Of all the phrases that described what was desirable for the village, the largest number of people (178) ticked "a community that looks after all its inhabitants". Perhaps we should give more thought to how this could become increasingly true. The second most frequent choice was "a balanced spectrum of ages" (157 people), followed by "modest, low impact development" (123). There was also support for "some expansion to support current services" (103).

The village hall, Spalding Hall, Pub, Surgery, Shop and school were all highly valued facilities. Also the church, as a place of worship (73) and as a historic building for (193).

#### **Community safety**

80% of respondents (192 people) were concerned about speeding in the village and wanted the 20 mph zone extended to the main road and Yeoford Rd. 68% (164) wanted more police speed checks. Majorities also wanted more/better pavements, and more parking restrictions. 72% (172) wanted traffic calming measures in the village and offered many suggestions. A speed monitoring partnership with the police and local volunteers is already being investigated.

#### **Transport**

12 people said they had difficulty getting to hospital and 7 to the surgery. It's hard to know what can be done about this apart from better advertising for Acorn. There was discontent with the evening and weekend bus service and there were concerns about reliability. Only a quarter thought the cost was reasonable. Perhaps that's why 100 respondents (40%) never used the buses.

#### Housing

Answers to the structured questions and the free comments showed clearly that many people want more smaller houses in the village, and numerous comments asked for no more large houses. 98(53%) wanted more 1-2 bedroom units for young people and downsizing adults, 97(52%) wanted more housing for young families (3-4 bedrooms) and 121(65%) wanted social/affordable housing. 25 people said they would need new accommodation in the next 5 years and 10 of these specified social rented housing. 6 wanted self-build, and 1 wanted assisted living. 171 people (83%) wanted any new houses to generate some of the energy they use renewably.

#### Play area

31% used the play area and there were many suggestions for improvement: more facilities for older children, wheelchair access so a wheelchair bound adult doesn't have to wait outside while a child plays; basketball net too high, a slide etc. Sadly 106 money available so far has been inadequate to buy even a slide with the high safety credentials the district council requires, but we hope this fund will grow.

#### **Growing food**

49 people (29%) said that they did not have enough garden or land for growing food. But only two people put their names in the volunteer sheet as wanting more. Is this correct, or do we still have a need in Cheriton Bishop for allotments or for a community garden? If you have a view, about any of this, please write to the newsletter, or contact me at the number below.

#### Social events

The questionnaire revealed that people were inhibited from going to activities by 'access problems' (4), having no-one to go with (13) and not being able to find a babysitter (7). Better publicity on the website and social media was also recommended. Some people thought that the village could do with a Committee to put on more social events and to help enable people to attend who might need help or support. There were a number of requests for an evening keep fit activity. A Local Directory of activities in Cheriton Bishop and neighbouring village is being co-ordinated by Persis Bower, so that people can see what is already available locally; and then gaps can be more readily identified.

#### **Local environment**

146 people (65%) wanted a dedicated dog walking area in the village. (This must include some of the 59% of people who have no dogs). Maps are being prepared to make footpaths better known. There were several requests for more trees to be planted in the village – possibly fruiting trees.

There were many more ideas than it's possible to list here. But perhaps the correspondence page of the newsletter will be a place to help clarify what is needed. And some actions have already started!

Local restaurants advertising in the newsletter are included on the website. All the societies included in the magazine are posted on the web site.

#### Activities and Events

The info on the site about local activities is taken directly from the newsletter and is updated as soon as the newsletter is published. We are keen that the website should not replace the newsletter, but the survey has shown that this does not appear to be the case so we will consider how best to ensure information is provided in a timely way. However, it is possible that the Village Diary could be improved and 'Reminders' mailed to people about events. If anyone wants to try that, if they send me their email I will add them to the list of reminders.

The Calendar will send reminders of all events listed two days before the event is scheduled.

Building work is rapidly picking up pace. The masonry team is rapidly expanding and already almost 100 of the 913 windows have been taken out for repair, including those in the old offices and family flat. Large areas of the parapet walls have had their pointing removed ready to take the walls down and the lantern light over the secondary staircase have already been taken down. The contractors have also been trialling cleaning the limescale off the granite, which has been working well.

On a final note, I have just finished a lovely project with students from Exeter College. They spent six weeks learning the stories of Drogo before taking over the castle for the day. They did a brilliant job and, to top it all off, they raised £175 towards the project too.

So, it's all busy, busy, busy. By the way, don't forget to book your place for the Drogo quiz night on Friday 13 December.

As always, I hope that many of you will get chance to pop up and see how things are going.

#### **BE BRIGHT! BE SEEN!!**

### Unless you want to end up in hospital!

Car drivers will be the first to admit that it is difficult to see pedestrians wearing dark clothing at night – and particularly just before sunset and sunrise when it is "dimpsey" (dim to non-Devonians!!). So they need to take greater care on our unlit/partially lit roads. BUT, pedestrians have a big responsibility too - "brighten up"!

School children are particularly vulnerable because most school uniforms are dark in colour. Villagers have told us how "invisible" they can be on Church Lane and other accesses to the main road/school. Some simple rules/ideas on how to be safer on our lanes – and this of course applies to adults as well.

- 1. Wear high visibility clothing this can just be arm bands and/or high visibility strips on back-packs.
- 2. Take out earphones so you can hear traffic approaching from both directions.
- 3. Walk on the side of the road facing the traffic where there is no pavement, especially where the road is two-vehicle width, but cross to the other side, if it is safe to do so, when approaching a right hand bend where you would otherwise be unsighted to oncoming traffic.
- 4. Carry a torch if possible and shine it when traffic approaches you.

#### **CRIME IS CHANGING**

The good news is that, despite Police budget cuts, crime rates are falling nationally and here in Devon and Cornwall, where total crime is down 4% (year to October 2013), burglary down 14.2%; robbery down 12.8%; and vehicle offences down 10.5%. **But beware** – criminals appear to be abandoning these crimes and resorting to identity theft and on-line fraud, where there is less risk of being caught!

More than 230,000 frauds were recorded nationally in the year to June – a 20% increase on the previous year. Many of these were "purchase frauds" – on-line shopping scams, and then there were computer frauds – hacking or spy-ware. And these figures do not include 'phone scams. Who hasn't had a call – "we understand you have had an accident" or "you have been mis-sold a policy" and inevitably you are asked to press a number on your key pad, and even the one that says you can unsubscribe, will cost an arm and a leg!

Be vigilant – if the offer sounds too good to be true, it probably is; don't give away any personal details and certainly not pin numbers or bank account numbers and when closing down your on-line bank site, always use the bank's "log-off" procedure. With Christmas approaching, cyber and traditional criminals will be hard at work, so take care – no rich pickings left on view in your unattended car or even in the window of your home.
