Help NEDCare Continue To Provide Care

NEDCare is a registered charity, providing over 1000 hours of regulated care every month. NEDCare provides a vital, notfor-profit, service in the local community. However, with the rising costs of supporting a Care Team, as well as assisting with the cost of care, NEDCare's additional funds are running low.

In order to maintain the service it currently provides, NEDCare's viability is enhanced by fundraising and donations. Despite pressure on local authorities to pay what it actually costs to deliver care, the funding gap* in social care means that NEDCare still needs to 'top-up' where the fees do not adequately cover their costs. However it is becoming increasingly difficult to fund this shortfall, and as with many other charities, NEDCare's existence is threatened due to underfunding. Registered Manager Simon Tickner notes that, 'fundraising and donations make all the difference to us remaining secure and being able to continue to serve the community'. There are several ways you can support the work that NEDCare does. You can simply donate on their website (*www.nedcare.org*) via Paypal. NEDCare can claim Gift Aid on donations from UK taxpayers. You can also leave a gift in your Will.

Alternatively, if you'd like to be in with a chance of winning £25,000, you can play NEDCare's Fundraising Lottery for just £1 per week.

Despite being a smaller than usual group we managed to get a surprising amount done. The director was pleased, and that isn't easy! Nor did we lose any days to the rain. The Health and Safety person did have to exert her authority on one occasion because it was so hot. Had to call a water and shade break on the last day when we were trying to get everything put away and covered up.

Packing up is hard to do.

Tents need taking down and the trench needs to be covered to discourage weeds and try to prevent damage from deer and other animals over the winter. Now we have finds to sort and all the drawings and photos to sort and the director must write the Interim.

We had fewer finds than usual this year but did find interesting walls. We also had a mystery object which was removed with a lot of soil around it to keep it from breaking up. Later excavation of the soil and metal suggests some sort of mudguard or similar, perhaps from an old tractor. Some digs get chariot burials, we get old tractors.

Future Plans

We managed an AGM at the beginning of November. Last year we didn't even try but this year a few of us met in person, socially distanced, and we Zoomed the meeting to others. It went very well. We now have a new Secretary which is great as the last one had done the job for 15 years and needed time to research pottery instead.

We planned our work for the year and set dig dates. All this information will be on our website as soon as we can get it there.

New Archaeology Adviser

We have the Dartmoor National Park archaeologist Andy Crabb as our Archaeology Adviser now, and we hope to be doing some interesting work on Dartmoor under his guidance and working with other groups on the moor. We are excited with this new direction.

Helping the Financially Vulnerable this Winter

Support Fund Launched To Help Mid Devon's Most Financially Vulnerable

The Government has distributed funding to County Councils across England to help those most in need. Households on low-incomes can get help with food and energy costs this winter from the new **'Household Support Fund'**.

Mid Devon District Council has received a share of this funding to set up a local Household Support Fund to help residents struggling with the cost of household essentials this winter. We know that sudden unexpected costs can create real challenges for residents on low incomes. The Fund is available to provide rapid short-term financial support to meet immediate needs: food, energy and water costs and other essentials. To access support, you must be a Mid Devon resident over the age of 16 years old and be without sufficient resources to meet your immediate short-term needs. Full guidelines and application forms can be found on our website, www.middevon.gov.uk/support-fundlaunched-to-help-mid-devons-most-financiallyvulnerable-this-winter/

The scheme runs until Thursday 31st March 2022.

Devon County Council will also be running a range of other schemes to support families on low-income this winter, such as a holiday food voucher scheme to cover the Christmas holidays and a holiday activity and food programme. Neighbourhood Watch

With 2021 rapidly coming to an end and Christmas just around the corner there is a great deal on our minds. The pandemic is still very much with us although you would not think so when walking through Exeter seeing how close people are to each other and the lack of wearing of face masks. It just seems that people think it is all over and it will not affect them, or they just do not care. I suspect that a number have had their jabs and think they are immune. In Europe Covid-19 is on the increase in some countries and this country according to the media is watching events very closely. We should all try to be sensible and consider our own health and safety, our family and friends as much as possible.

With so much stuff and goods being ordered online it is very important to make sure your passwords and payments are well protected. Courier Fraud

According to the Police there has been an increase in 'Courier' Fraud in the last few weeks. This has included burglary, the taking of credit and D D cards and withdrawing money. Impersonating as a police officer is being used to convince the handing over of money and other financial details.

Fraud now accounts for as much as one in three of every crime that is reported we are told. The police say that you are more likely to be a victim of fraud than any other type of crime. What a thought and what an achievement to have obtained! Please be very vigilant and do report all suspicious activity or behaviour. Never hand over cash and you know that your bank will never contact you by the phone.

Passwords

A statistic that you just can't believe and we hope by all we have said in these pages of the Newsletter before, that you are not one of those individuals. Apparently more than 23 million people worldwide use the password 123456 for all their accounts and log in.

If you do use this password then change it immediately. We know it's easy to remember but do get a new one that is just yours.

Safety

According to the police, Devon and Cornwall continues to be one of the safest places in the country. Total recorded crime between July 2020 and June 2021 decreased by 0.6% from the previous year, The largest reduction was 'all burglary' but other areas of crime increased slightly. We are all encouraged to report a crime, any suspicious behaviour or vehicles around. It is up to us all to do our part and be on our guard when out and about. Report or email on **101**.

Young Ones & COP 26

A 7-year-old on the train to where we were staying near Glasgow showed me her placard after the Fridays for Future young peoples' march during COP 26. I was a bit shocked by her slogan. ..

You don't care, but I do!

What does it say when young people believe their leaders are indifferent to their future?

It's not just her. A whole river of around 10,000 young people, colourful, noisy, with home-made placards were shouting for urgent action now, against 'greenwash' and 'Blah, blah, blah'. There were families with push chairs, school and college students, contingents from Belgium, Germany, France and Brazil - and these were just the ones you could hear.

The text which came out of the conference didn't agree to phase out coal or end the subsidies for fossil fuels on which the G20 have spent \$3.3 trillion since 2015. Some countries agreed to cut coal power and others to cut methane emissions, and some to end deforestation by 2030.

If countries action all their promises (and UK doesn't have enough policies to achieve its promises yet) then temperature increase might be limited to around 1.8°, if self-reinforcing feedbacks or 'tipping points' haven't got too far, and if technologies, untested at scale, are financed and actually work to capture and bury carbon underground.

Meanwhile millions in Kenya and Uganda are facing starvation due to failure of once-reliable rains. The young people know this. A charity funded school had its roof blown off in a severe storm, with the solar panels. Forests planted as offsets burnt in wildfires. Poor countries have not received the promised funding to cope and adapt, and that which has been given is often loans, adding to the indebtedness of countries which often spend more on debt payments than health care. For the Maldives and many small islands, overstepping 1.5 is a death sentence.

A speaker from Columbia outside the COP said 'We find this process very insulting. [Wealthy countries] are saying, we will go on killing you'.

Do you think the youth strikers were right to be disillusioned with their leaders? And what does this all mean for Cheriton Bishop? Are there things we can do here, relating to how we travel, what we eat, how we heat our houses and stuff we buy, to show we care about our children and young people?

Avian Influenza Prevention Zone (AIPZ)

Heart of the South West Trading Standards Service have advised us that an Avian Influenza Prevention Zone was declared across Great Britain. This means that all bird keepers (whether they have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard are required by law to take biosecurity precautions:

Schedule 1: Minimum Biosecurity Measures

- Separate domestic ducks & geese from other poultry.
- Ensure the areas where birds are kept are unattractive to wild birds, for example by netting ponds, and by removing wild bird food sources.
- Feed and water their birds in enclosed areas to discourage wild birds.
- Minimise movement into / out of bird enclosures.
- Cleanse and disinfect footwear and keep areas where birds live clean and tidy.
- Reduce contamination by cleansing and disinfecting concrete areas and fencing off wet or boggy areas.
- Keep free ranging birds within fenced areas, and ponds, watercourses and standing water must be fenced off.

Schedule 2: Enhanced Biosecurity Measures for Premises with Over 500 Birds

Keepers with more than 500 birds will need to restrict access for non-essential people on their sites, workers will need to change clothing and footwear before entering bird enclosures and site vehicles will need to be cleaned and disinfected regularly to limit risks.

Remember that if you have poultry it is your responsibility to keep updated on any outbreaks and an easy way to do this is to sign up for text notifications - register with the APHA alerts service.

In the Garden

More Plants Please!

Perhaps December and January are good months to think about what we gardeners can do to make the world a greener place.

Of course there is one simple answer; we need to plant more plants! If you ever needed a better excuse to think of more ways to squeeze irresistible plants into your garden, now you have it.

There is no better way of locking away all that carbon than creating a rich green canopy. As plants photosynthesise they absorb carbon dioxide which they convert into glucose in order to grow. Hard surfaces and bare soil are wasted planting opportunities. Layering is good as it optimises whatever growing space you have. We should all be thinking about what tree we can add to the Queen's Green Canopy for the Jubilee next year. Now is the best time to plant it.

Deciduous trees often make good supports

for climbers such as honeysuckle or clematis and here in Devon, ivy always thrives. Shrubs under trees, perennials and ground cover plants all make a thriving tapestry of hardworking plants.

Perhaps try using fewer annuals and plant more perennials. Make sure you put the right plant in the right place so that it uses fewer precious resources and allows us gardeners to reduce our carbon footprint.

Future Farming Resilience Free Support to Help Navigate the Agricultural Transition

Business Information Point are providing free, tailored one to one advice, webinars, and business skills development workshops to help navigate the changes brought about by the Agricultural Transition.

The move away from Direct Payments will be a big change for some farmers, so they will happen over a 7-year transition period to give time to plan and adjust. The Future Farming Resilience Fund has been funded by Defra to allow us to support farmers and land managers with this transition.

The support is free and available until February 2022 to any farmer or land manager currently in receipt of BPS payments.

We will be running several free, workshops to discuss the changes. In addition, we have a local

network of experienced advisors who can work with you to assess your current position, how the changes are going to affect you and your farm and discuss the options available to you.

Message from St. Mary's

Christmas Hopes

I wonder what type of Christmas you are looking forward to this year? I guess the answer to the question might be a traditional Christmas or a normal Christmas! This may be the hope that you have in light of the experience of last Christmas.

I suspect that I do not need to remind you of the five-day window for Christmas that shrunk to just one day, and the notion of socially distant families with all the windows opened to increase the ventilation, making Christmas distant and cold.

Perhaps the Christmas mixing resulted in a positive test for Coronavirus. I guess we all want these events banished from our memories. I think that Christmas this year will still need to be measured and cautious.

The hardest part is, how do you plan for what you do not know you will be able to do? There is also great uncertainty of what might be in short supply in the face of challenging supply chain difficulties.

It was very much a chaotic affair. Mary and Joseph could not find anywhere to stay. It was through the kindness of strangers that they ended up in the stable. I guess that Jesus' arrival was a surprise to his parents who had hoped to be home in time for the birth.

Jesus' arrival stirred people to give generously to people they did not know.

I would want to remind people that Christmas should not be introspective only. What can we all collectively do to help neighbours in need or strangers struggling?

Councillor's News

Almost 6 months as a county councillor and I have attended a number of virtual briefings which have given me an overview of the services offered by the county council and what role councillors can play in their implementation.

The two latest briefings I have had have been on budget and the environment. It will be no surprise to any of us to know that officers are engaged in the very difficult task of maintaining services, with all the inevitable increases in salaries, utilities and materials, and maintaining a budget within the permitted guidelines Council Tax rules allow.

The reason revenue component comes from council tax and so we shall all look with interest in the spring to what we shall have to pay.

The second briefing was on the environment! This was just three days before the COP26 conference in Glasgow began. What we know is that the largest contributors to the corporate emissions are the school buses which represent 42%. For those of us who see the buses trundling through our towns and villages it is no surprise. The buses are old, and here in Crediton they often have to negotiate very narrow roads which means that they idle for some time emitting their smelly polluting fumes. I wonder how they pass the emissions test which they surely need to do to be roadworthy.

I'm pleased however to report that the officers are in talks with the bus companies to improve the service and to look at electric buses in towns. The County Council intends to install 240 electric vehicle charging points throughout the county by December 2022. There is also an on the street charging grant which could potentially be used by other groups throughout the county. I was also surprised to learn that wind turbines are more than twice as efficient as solar panels at generating electricity!

While on buses I have to report that Queen Elizabeth School in Crediton is often reporting to me that buses are late getting pupils to school. I have raised this with the relevant officer who is in talks with the companies.

In the winter months I hope to carry on with my surgeries but I have two admit that December, January and February are always very cold and damp so I may not turn up. Do not worry because I much prefer people to e-mail me rather than telephone. My reason for this is that if you email me to *frank.letch@devon.gov.uk*, I have a record of what you are concerned about and can then forward it to the relevant officer.

As winter approaches I would like to think that those people who live near grit bins would kindly check to see how full they are. If they are not as full as you think they should be please contact your local parish or town council who can then make requests to county highways.

Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting

Held at Spalding Hall on Monday 15th November 2021 at 7pm

Present: Cllr Ball, Cllr Benjamin, Cllr Edwards, Cllr Milton (Chair), Cllr Salmon, Cllr Westcott, Cllr Wood, Cllr Letch (DCC) and Cllr Coren (MDDC)

In attendance: The Clerk and 2 members of the public

- 1. To receive and accept apologies: Apologies were received and accepted from Cllr Tomlinson and Cllr Penny (MDDC).
- 2. To receive declarations of personal and disclosable pecuniary interests in respect of items on the agenda: Cllr Milton declared a personal interest in Item 8 on the Agenda
- **3.** Public Discussion an opportunity for members of the public to make representations, answer questions and give evidence in respect of any item on the agenda: Robin Scott, the Academy Head of Cheriton Bishop Primary School, introduced himself and explained that the school council would like to strengthen ties with the community. He suggested types of community projects in which the children could become involved and explained the school would welcome suggestions from the PC. Councillors thanked Mr Scott for his interest and for coming to the meeting. Cllr Letch explained that he has through the Locality Fund funded books for other schools and that he is planning to visit the school in the New Year as part of this Feet First programme, which aims to help children accept difference and cope with disability.
- 4. Cheriton Bishop Council Meeting Minutes 11th October 2021 to consider the approval of the minutes as a correct record: It was resolved to approve the minutes as a correct record.
- 5. To receive reports from MDDC Councillors for information only: Cllr Coren reported that on 15th December MDDC will be voting on allowing the Community Governance Review to go to public discussion. The Review will consider parish and ward boundaries. Three homes in Crediton have been put forward for the housing of refugees from Afghanistan. If approved for use, they will be funded by central government. Cllr Coren represented MDDC at the Remembrance Service at the Cheriton Bishop War Memorial on Sunday and was disappointed that some drivers and passers by did not respect the two minute silence.
- 6. To receive a report from ClIr Letch (DCC) for information only: DCC is working to reduce its carbon footprint and is planning to install 220 electric car charging points in the county. A grant for installation of charging points by others is available and those interested should contact ClIr Letch by email. School buses account for 42% of DCC's carbon footprint and DCC are working on reducing this. [ClIr Westcott joined the meeting]. Roadworks and driver shortages are causing problems with the school bus service to QE in Crediton. Residents should contact ClIr Letch will not be holding any surgeries at Cheriton Bishop until March 2022 but until then if residents want to contact him, he requested that they do so, preferably by email on *frank.letch@ devon.gov.uk*.
- 7. Development of Land off Church Lane Cheriton Bishop to discuss the proposed development by Bunnyhomes and agree any associated actions: The meeting was suspended to hear from one member of the public who lives close to the proposed development and is having difficulty getting Bunnyhomes to respond to contact. The member of the public also explained concerns about potential flooding from the development and the lack of biodiversity in the plans. The meeting was re-started. The Clerk explained that Bunnyhomes have asked to present to the PC again at the next meeting, which will be in the village hall to allow room for members of the public to attend. Cllr Coren confirmed that MDDC has not yet received the planning application. Councillors noted that, as the site has been identified in MDDC's Local Plan, it will not be possible to stop development from going ahead but that residents and the PC have potential input on development by way of objections and asking for conditions. [Councillor Milton left the meeting]

- 11. Consideration of Planning Applications to discuss whether it is appropriate to have a written policy and agree appropriate actions: After consideration Councillors resolved that a written policy is not needed. Councillors consider all planning applications by reference the Mid Devon Local Plan and the National Planning Policy Framework whilst at all times working within the PC's Code of Conduct. This is sufficient.
- 12. Budget 2022/23 to consider the draft budget: The clerk and councillors discussed the draft budget, which will be amended and considered again at the December meeting.
- 13. Joint Purchase of Vehicle Activated Speed Sign (VAS) to receive an update: The clerk updated councillors on a quotation received and outlined the practicalities of sharing the device with other parishes. DCC approval of locations will be needed. Cllr Letch confirmed that he will assist in the moving of the device between parishes but that volunteers from each parish will be needed to load and unload the device. Cllr Letch explained that he supports the sharing of the device with two other parishes. The cost of the shared device is around £1200 per parish but the cost depends on the specification of the device chosen. The Clerk will liaise with the other parishes (Bow and Copplestone) and obtain more information and advice from DCC.
- 14. Contributions to Village Newsletter by Parish Councillors to discuss: Cllr Milton reminded councillors that when writing for the Village Newsletter they should always state whether they are writing in a personal capacity or representing the views of the Parish Council.
- 15. Climate Change to receive an update on Climate Change initiatives: Cllrs Wood and Salmon will plant the recently purchased bulbs shortly.
- 16. Social Media to receive an update on PC social media activity: Nothing to report this month.
- 17. Roads & Footpaths to receive an update on roads and footpaths in the Parish: Cllr Wood reported that the supplier of the number signs for the footpath posts has re-quoted and it is expected that they will now cost around £260. Cllr Wood will provide more information at the next meeting.
- 18. Newsletter to receive an update on Newsletter activities: Cllr Edwards reported on a meeting recently held by the Newsletter team. The current printer contract runs to April 2023. The current advertising income projection for this year is just over £3000. The cost of an advertisement for 2022 2023 will not be increased as the newsletter is run on a not for profit basis. If production costs rise by an unmanageable amount during the year (eg. due to increased electricity costs/ hall hire charges) the team would consider a mid-year increase in the advertising cost. A new box to hold printed copies is needed for the village shop. Councillors will look for a cost effective way of providing this.
- 19. Repairs & Maintenance to consider any repairs and maintenance needed for PC assets: Councillors discussed the condition of the benches at the War Memorial, the surface around the War Memorial and the oak bollards at the gateway to the village. Cllr Wood will obtain a quotation for the repair/refurbishment of the benches and the bollards and also for the replacement of the surface with brick paviours. The ditch and undergrowth at the Village Green should be cleared in the Spring.
- 20. Financial Regulations to approve the updated PC Financial Regulations: It was resolved to adopt the updated regulations.
