

Children's Hospice South West's (CHSW) annual Santas on the Run event is back, but not as you know it! Taking place over the weekend of the 11-13 December, supporters will be able to choose their own distance, route and festive fancy dress.

The festive fundraiser usually takes place at Great Torrington's RHS Garden Rosemoor each year but the local children's charity has taken the decision to hold it virtually this Christmas due to the pandemic. It's free to register and anyone who manages to raise more than £15 will receive a special Santas on the Run medal.

Kiley Pearce, CHSW Events Fundraiser, said: "This year, Santas on the Run is going freestyle! Although we can't all come together at Rosemoor, we can still spread some joy and laughter and we'd encourage everyone to go crackers with their festive fundraising!

Whether you twinkle in tinsel or rock it like Rudolph, you can get creative with your costume and complete a distance of your choice, your way."

CHSW's Santas on the Run has taken place at Rosemoor since 2018 and before that was held in Bideford town centre. Over the years it's seen thousands of people join together raising vital funds for CHSW and its Little Bridge House children's hospice in Fremington.



### The Spalding Hall - An Office Alternative?

The pandemic we find ourselves in, has made us all adapt, re-evaluate and re-calibrate how we live our lives, and though it has brought hardships, there have been silver linings too.

Homeworking has its challenges, but has relieved some of us from the daily commute, saving time and expense, and benefited the environment through reduced carbon emissions, very much in keeping with The Mid Devon Climate Change Initiative.

Home working has it's advantages, but it isn't always the ideal place to work from. A potential alternative is the Spalding Hall, and we are exploring the possibility of the Hall's use as a local Working Hub. It can accommodate 4 or 5 well spaced work stations, has a small kitchen, toilets, and recent checks on internet speed on roaming networks show 45 to 48 MBs/sec.

So if you are looking for somewhere to provide a quiet workplace for an hour or two a week, or a meeting place, please give the Hall some consideration – perhaps you can band together with a few friends or colleagues and book some slots in the Hall.

Hiring charges are currently very reasonable at £6.50 an hour, £17.50 for a half day and £33 for the full day. Bookings are managed by Jean Martin, telephone **01647 24586**.

If you feel that there are specific facilities you would like to see to make the Hall work for you as a work place, please contact Steve Colderick at *colderick@btinternet.com* with your thoughts – while we can't make any promises to implement these, we are keen to hear ideas and to gauge levels of interest in using the Hall as a Working Hub.

When we move out of the shadow of Covid there will be an opportunity to look back at how we coped, and to take the silver linings with us – perhaps establishing the Spalding Hall as a Working Hub will be one of these. The Hall Committee is very keen to keep the Hall as a working asset for the community, and a shift away from travelling into work every day could bring personal and wider benefits.

### Open Letter to Residents

Hi Folks!

I live in one of the new houses at Higher Shippon and am very thankful that I was given the opportunity of becoming a tenant. These are beautiful houses and the view is phenomenal. My husband and I have become disabled, so we really do appreciate our good fortune that Lady Luck chose to site us here!

However, and you knew there would be a 'however', I only have one concern - one worry - one nagging anxiety that keeps me awake at night (and has for all my 21 years residence in Cheriton Cross/Bishop/Higher Shippon). It is always the Yeoford Road!

We live at Higher Shippon which is 'just outside' the village - only about 2/3 feet beyond the sign! However, we are inside the speed restrictions.

To the best of my knowledge and belief, there have been objections to the re-siting of the speed restriction signs. I don't know the reason why but I have written to the police, the farmer/farmers and to Nick Way for further information.

The way in which all of you fine people can help is by reducing the speed of your vehicles within the environs of this village/hamlet

At the moment, when exiting Higher Shippon, drivers tend to speed up as and when they observe the speed de-restriction sign and the wider section of road up ahead. It is only learnt behaviour and normal human reaction, but now Higher Shippon exists, it becomes an anti-social action!

Why? Because when drivers, cyclists or walkers from Higher Shippon attempt to exit the hamlet, they discover that their vision is obscured from the left and the right!

From the left, the vehicles appear to go down into a dip before emerging far too close to the junction. The right side is obscured by the hedge and vehicles are upon you extremely quickly.

For those with pushchairs or with a toddler, the walk turns into a stop/go situation - pulling the children into the hedge - dashing for a driveway!

What about the vulnerable and/or disabled? Certainly managing a manual wheelchair would be problematic and those on sticks would feel very unsafe - especially in inclement weather.

We are not even in winter yet, but cold water already sprays onto the legs which is very unpleasant! Imagine the effect when there is black ice, snow and slush!

If the speed signs were to be moved nearer to Four Cross Ways, then all the action would be much further away from residential properties which seems to be the ideal situation.

I do hope that this problem can be settled and I thank you in advance for your consideration. Perhaps, before too long, the problems further up the Yeoford Road can be addressed, but that is really not my province.

I have spoken to the police about hand held speed cameras but if drivers slow down, there won't be any need to pursue that idea... Maybe we should have pavements all along the Yeoford Road to the edge of the village as it is extremely dangerous at present.

Also, we need a zebra crossing at the War Memorial village green to the shop. Maybe we should also push for speed bumps and a reduction of the speed limit to 20 mph!

All these things are eminently sensible and happen in other villages but all I am requesting is moving the speed signs and that drivers keep to the speed limit and slow even further when the road conditions dictate.

Let's face it folks, Cheriton Bishop's Yeoford Road is used as a 'rat run' by all and sundry isn't it? Huge lorries use it to cut off miles on the way to Crediton and international lorries use a Sat Nav which misinforms them about the width and status of the road and often lands them in serious trouble!

Right, that's enough!

Please drive slowly and safely through Cheriton Bishop!

### We're Reducing Low Mileage Journeys

"Did you know that a quarter of all car journeys are less than 1 mile"?

This horrifying statistic is one of the reasons that carbon emissions are climbing. It is just too tempting to jump in the car and nip to the shops, especially if it's cold and dark. However, if we want reduce emissions, noise and pollution we need to be the change we wish to see.

Mid Devon District Council's stated aim is to become carbon neutral by 2030. Much work is being done to achieve this objective and Parish Councils have been tasked with raising awareness and launching initiatives to attain this target.

### **Our Joint Initiative**

Cheriton Bishop Parish Council have launched a joint initiative with Cheriton Bishop Primary School to attempt to reduce low mileage car journeys by encouraging the children to walk or cycle to school.

The children have been set a challenge of walking or riding to school 15 times over the



next few months. Children who live outside the settlement can also participate by walking to and from the bus stop.

When the target is reached, they will be awarded a reflective key ring for their school bag. The key ring is both useful and practical. It is illuminated by headlights exactly like a bicycle reflector. As the nights draw in, it may provide some additional safety for our children as they endeavour to meet the challenge. It is hoped that the children get a taste for the benefits of walking to school and continue on even after they have reached their goal.

We hope you will join us in applauding the children's commitment to look after our environment and help us to reduce our carbon emissions.

Please wish them every encouragement with the challenge.

### Avian Influenza (Bird Flu)

An Avian Influenza Prevention Zone has been declared across the whole of England effective from 5pm on 11 November 2020.

All poultry keepers in England (whether they have commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard flock) are required by law to take a range of biosecurity precautions.

If you keep poultry (including gamebirds or pet birds) or other captive birds, you must act now to reduce the risk of disease in your flock by following the relevant biosecurity measures required within the AIPZ. Your stock needs to be fed and watered under cover to prevent contamination from wild birds.

Good biosecurity improves the overall health and productivity of your flock by helping keep out poultry diseases such as avian influenza and limiting the spread of disease.

All bird gatherings within the AIPZ are prohibited therefore the general licence that had permitted bird gatherings has been revoked.

If you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds, such as gulls or birds of prey, you should report them to the Defra helpline **03459 33 55 77** 

Public Health England advises that the risk to the public's health is very low. Food Standards Agency (FSA) has said that on the basis of the current scientific evidence, avian influenzas pose a very low food safety risk for UK consumers. Avian influenza is unconnected with coronavirus (Covid-19).

You can choose to register fewer than 50 birds, or birds you keep as pets. The Animal & Plant Health Agency (APHA) encourages you to register even if you do not have to by law.

By registering, APHA will be able to contact you if there's a disease outbreak (such as bird flu) in your area and you will help prevent the spread of disease and protect the national poultry flock.

### **Submission & Examination**



The Town and Country Planning (Local Planning) (England) Regulations 2012 and Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 Dartmoor Local Plan 2018 - 2036

I am writing to inform you that Dartmoor National Park Authority has submitted the Dartmoor Local Plan 2018 – 2036 to the Planning Inspectorate for examination. The Authority submitted the Local Plan along with an extensive library of evidence and other documents.

The Planning Inspectorate has appointed Roisin Barrett BSc MSc Dup Hist Cons MRTPI IHBC to examine the Dartmoor Local Plan. The Programme Officer responsible for assisting the Inspector with all aspects of the examination is Robert Young, who is independent of the Authority and works with the Inspector. Any correspondence or queries relating to the examination process should be directed to the Programme Officer.

# Play Park Upgrade is Well Underway at Glebelands

The Parish Council has taken on the responsibility of the play park located in Glebelands from Mid Devon District Council to avoid losing the play area altogether as it was at risk of closure.



In addition the Parish Council has allocated £35,000 of Section 106 money provided by developments in the area to refurbish the park and to deliver exciting improvements.

New equipment, which is designed to support toddlers to teenagers with improved access to allow inclusive use, will be installed to include: somersault bars, spica 2, two-tower multi-unit, spinner bowl, carousel with bars, see-saw with springs, flat and cradle swing frame, new bin and benches. The existing basket swing will remain, as well as the crazy gander, which will be repositioned. In addition, new impact-absorbing safety paths will link the items of equipment to ensure accessibility.

### Cheriton Bishop Walking Group


At the time of writing we are in the second lockdown of the year which has curtailed our group walks temporarily.

## Earth Corner



### Celebrating Enough

Some of the razzamataz may be missing from Christmas this year, with restrictions still partly in place, even if there is the 'light at the end of the tunnel' with the possible availability of a vaccine.

Can we celebrate Christmas well, and still avoid harm, making life better all round? Covid-19 is not the only crisis to worry about, with concerns about our personal futures, and about our life together.

A German journalist wrote to his fellow journalists: "Many journalists have apparently still not grasped how serious the climate crisis is... We seem unfazed by the steady stream of reports on new temperature records, stronger hurricanes, drought years, floods and species going extinct... We know the data and facts, but we don't understand what they mean"

Many of us do know that, at present, rates of emissions (the carbon budget for the world average temperature rise to stay under 1.5°) will be used up in 10 years. Even though the Covid crisis has reduced our climate impact, cutting all contact is not the way ahead. We know big changes in national and international policy are needed, and can help create new jobs. We think about our own lives and habits, but can such small things make a difference?

Christmas, if it means anything, is a time of hope. Hope isn't necessarily a feeling. Hope can consist





in intention, and in action, and it is infectious. Hope tells us that how we celebrate Christmas matters. Not only by taking every possible precaution against spreading coronavirus, but also taking precautions not to spread harm by racking up the energy and pollution embodied in our signs of love to one another.

Perhaps chooseing to buy from local independent businesses where we can, businesses which employ more people per pound than large chains

Our local craft and food businesses, even if we find them online, send no dividends to distant shareholders but spend much of what they earn back into the local economy.

Appreciation and gratitude bring transformation to our lives, valuing what joys we already have. In my case, including the first cup of tea in the morning and the trees outside my window.

Of course, it's just possible that some might be relieved not to be entertaining 28 people to Christmas dinner! A sense of gratitude when we have enough is a profound act of personal and collective blessing.

## In The Garden



### Pruning The Winter Garden







The months of winter have the least activity in the garden, for plants and probably humans too. The days are so short, temperatures are falling, and plants are dormant.

Because there is less growth it is a good time to prune deciduous shrubs, trees and vines. With their bare winter shapes it is easier to cut them to manageable size. Hedges can be shaped to keep the base wider than the top. This helps the lower branches to access light and air (although it is easier in theory than practice!) Dead, diseased and damaged branches should be removed from trees and shrubs, including any crossing branches which are rubbing together. Cut back to a joint where possible rather than cutting off a tip. Usually you should aim to open up the centre of a shrub to allow light and air through it.

Roses can be reduced to half their height to reduce the risk of wind rock. Strong winds

can destabilise the plant and damage the roots. Roses will need more careful pruning in the spring so you don't need to be too precise now. Vines can be untangled and thinned to a framework with side shoots cut back to two buds.

Enjoy winter flowering shrubs such as the cheerful bright yellow flowers of winter jasmine. Bring a few sprigs into the house to remind you of the garden on dark cold evenings. Viburnum bodnantense 'Dawn' makes a welcome scented bouquet with its clusters of fragrant pink flowers.

My favourite winter flowering shrub is Daphne bholua 'Jacqueline Postill' with its intensely fragrant blossom. It is a shrub to plant near your path or front door where you will pass it frequently and appreciate its heady fragrance.

#### Take Care At This Unusual Time

As if 2020 hasn't been an unusual enough year, many of us are now thinking about Christmas. With the pandemic still very much with us, it's anybody's guess what the festive season will bring, not least when it comes to getting together, going away and how we celebrate.

At this time there is so much to think about with the added consideration of your own, family and friends health and wellbeing, together with possible work and other uncertainties. Just so many distractions. That's why it is especially important to safeguard yourself, your family and finances whatever you are doing, so be safe when shopping online.

### **Are You Ready for Winter?**

With winter on its way, it's important to understand the impact that the weather can have on your home. Ensure your home stays safe and warm during the colder months. Here are some very relevant pointers to note:

- Ensure the roof space is well insulated to keep heat in your home and keep energy bills down.
- Get the boiler checked and serviced regularly by a qualified engineer so it stays working safely and efficiently.
- Protect pipes and external taps during the colder months with insulation and foam lagging to prevent them from freezing and bursting.
- Heat can escape from your home from something as simple as an uncovered window.
   Lined, insulated curtains and draft stoppers around doors will stop drafts.

- · Clean out and repair gutters and outlets.

#### **Protect Your Password**

Neighbourhood Watch is launching - 'Protect your Password' - with three quick and easy steps.

If passwords are a struggle, or you feel overwhelmed by the amount of online security information, you're not alone. These three easy steps may help:

- Create separate passwords for email accounts.
- Use 3 random memorable words (they could be objects in the room you are in), to make up a single password, with certain letters in each word a capital and perhaps add a date that is split up in the password.
- Turn on or use two factor authentication (2FA).
   When you log in with the password you will receive a text or code on your phone to check you are who you say you are.

#### **Burglary Prevention Reminder**

During the first lockdown, burglary went down, but it is now on the rise, so read on to help you take action in protecting your home and belongings:

- · Don't leave keys in accessible places.
- Lock external doors and ground floor windows and remove keys from the locks on the inside.
- Set your burglar alarm.
- Keep valuable items out of sight.
- · Draw curtains to prevent internal viewing.
- Use timer light switches and the radio on when leaving the house unoccupied.
- Keep a photographic and written record of items of value.
- Keep the outside of the house free from items that could help a burglar break in and lock garages, sheds and outbuildings.
- Lock vehicles at the property when not in use and remove any items inside from view - keep them locked in the boot or take them with you.
- Toys and bikes should be locked away at night.

# Message from St Mary's

### Christmas But Not The Same As Always

I think I managed only a couple of my monthly articles without talking about Covid-19 this year.

Sadly, it is very much back and giving us all real concerns and worries. There is already talk about what Christmas may be like with the restrictions of the rule of six or no households being able to mix with one another. There may be travel restrictions and no overnight stays. It is hard to forsee what might be possible.

What seems likely is that the way we have observed and celebrated Christmas in past years, will be very different this year

For some people they want to carry on regardless, for others they are looking to find a new way of making Christmas special and sadly, for others, they are questioning whether it is worth the effort.

You can see how people view the same event from very different perspectives. Taking one Christmas tradition, the turkey, will there be large ones? (will you be fined for ordering for more than six?), will people be able to buy smaller ones? Or do you break with tradition and try something different? I think it is important to remember the farmers for whom Christmas is an important time for their livelihoods. They cannot easily change the size of the turkeys at the last minute, we should stand by them as they work so hard to support us.

I was reminded that how we look at things can change our perspective. If we look at this coming Christmas as a disaster just waiting to happen, it's more than likely that a disaster is what we will get. However, if we change our perspective, we can see Christmas as an oasis in these difficult times. We can look to

make the most of the opportunity to have time with those we love within these difficult days, and we can look to start new traditions and even ask people what they would like to have or do, rather than tread the well worn paths of Christmas past.

It is always a good idea to reflect on what happened at the beginning...

We know that Mary and Joseph travelled to Joseph's home town and there was no room for them to stay. After a long journey, they would have been tired and desperate for a bed for the night. It is through the kindness of a stranger, the innkeeper, they got shelter for the night.

For many sleeping in a stable would hardly seem a kindness, yet Mary and Joseph gratefully received the kind offer of a place to stay.

We know the baby is an unexpected arrival in the most unlikely of circumstances. It matters not where or when the birth occurred, it is eclipsed by the great joy and hope.

We see this clearly in the celestial song of the angels that the shepherds witness on the hillside. They rush to see for themselves and are not disappointed but return home praising and glorifying God.

### Minutes of the Parish Council Meeting

Held on the 9th November 2020 using virtual Zoom technology as permitted by the Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus)

Present: Cllrs D Milton (Chair), Cllr Ball, Cllr Benjamin, Cllr Westcott, Cllr Wood,

Cllr Coren (MDDC)

**In Attendance:** The Clerk and 2 members of the public

- 1. To receive and accept apologies: Apologies from Cllr Salmon, Cllr Penny (MDDC) and Cllr Way (DCC).
- 2. Co-option to Council to fill vacancy: It was resolved to co-opt Toby Ball (Proposed Cllr Milton, Seconded Cllr Benjamin)
- 3. To receive declarations of interest to receive declarations of personal and disclosable pecuniary interest in respect of items on the Agenda: There were no declarations of interest.
- 4. Public Involvement: to receive public comment on items on the Agenda: One member of the public spoke about planting trees in the parish (see item 6 below), particularly on the verge at the eastern edge of the village. There had been a Parish Council initiative to plant two poplar trees here a few years ago and only one had been planted. Poplar trees were chosen as they are attractive and their size (narrow and not too tall) is appropriate for this particular site. Not all the budget allocated for the trees had been spent.

One member of the public (the applicant's agent) spoke about planning application 20/00619/FULL (see item 7 below). The applicant has made a revised application with changes requested by the planning officer (moving the position of the garage and retaining the shared drive with the neighbouring property). The proposed cladding of the property has also been changed.

- 5. Cheriton Bishop Council Meeting Minutes 12th October 2020 to consider the approval of the minutes as a correct record: It was resolved to approve and sign the minutes as a correct record
- 6. Planting of trees to consider whether to plant some trees on the verge at the eastern edge of Cheriton Bishop using funds (if any) remaining from an earlier initiative and whether if requested to provide additional money for this project: Councillors were very supportive of this initiative and of plans to plant other trees in the parish. It was resolved to allocate a budget of £70 for the planting of 2 poplar trees on the verge at the eastern edge of the village by the member of the public attending the meeting.
- 7. Mid Devon District Council Planning Application to consider the following applications upon which MDDC had asked the Council to comment:

Reference: 20/01738/CAT

Proposal: Fell 1 ash tree in a Conservation Area Location: 2 Croft Cottages, Cheriton Bishop

Applicant: Mrs C Jillians

It was resolved to support this application as the tree is very close to the cottage and the applicant had been advised it should be felled.

Reference: 20/00619/FULL – revised drawings and information

Proposal: Conversion of agricultural building to a dwelling previously approved under 19/01374/PNCOU, change of

use of agricultural land to residential, erection of a garage with new access and landscaping

Location: Medland Farm Barn, Cheriton Bishop

Applicant: Mr Cull

It was resolved to support this revised application with the comment that the boundary between the proposed garage and the neighbouring property be sufficiently thick to protect the privacy of the neighbouring property.

8. Mid Devon District Council – Planning Decision – it was noted that MDDC has granted permission for the following development with conditions as filed:

Reference: 20/01286/FULL

Proposal: Change of use of agricultural land to domestic driveway

Location: Land at Sunny Cottage, Cheriton Bishop

Applicant: S Pettit

9. Mid Devon District Council – Appeal Decision – it was noted that MDDC has notified that an appeal against the following planning decision has been dismissed for reasons as filed:

Reference: APP/Y1138/X/19/3233275

Proposal: Certificate of Lawful Use for a single dwelling house

Location: Polford Cottage, The Annexe, road from Cheriton Cross to Polford Bridge

Applicant: Mr & Mrs M Badham

- 10. Climate Change to receive an update on Climate Change initiatives: Cllr Wood reported that the joint initiative with the Primary School to encourage children to walk or cycle to school is now up and running. A press release will go in the December newsletter.
- 11. Traffic Speed and Noise in Cheriton Bishop and on local roads to update Councillors and consider next steps:

  Councillor Ball reported that residents at the eastern edge of the village attempted to calm traffic on the main road by parking cars alongside the verge, partially blocking the outbound lane. This was partially successful but not all cars slowed down and there had been some near misses and abuse from local residents. This is not a satisfactory long term solution. The clerk will contact Tedburn St Mary PC again to check whether they have made any progress on this issue.

Councillor Milton reported that the police have assessed that the best location for a community speed watch is near the entrance to the Old Thatch car park. 8 volunteers have come forward of which 4 will be needed for each speed watch. Cllr Milton will complete the forms for the police and act as the village co-ordinator.

- 12. DNPA Settlement Profiles to consider a response to DNPA's consultation on its settlement profile for Cheriton Bishop: Cllr Wood volunteered to submit a response, updating the profile.
- 13. Covid-19 Preparedness to consider whether action is needed in the parish: Cllr Benjamin reported on the Devon Communities Together webinar for Mid Devon Parishes. There is new guidance on supporting the clinically vulnerable (other household members are now expected to support when possible). MDDC has access to priority slots for home deliveries from supermarkets. The MDDC Covid-19 Local Support Fund can offer financial support to those suffering hardship in some circumstances. The Clerk has updated the PC website with information about available support.

Cllr Benjamin has 16 volunteers ready to help if/when needed during the current lockdown and the village shop is running the telephone order and pay service. The surgery has not asked for help with prescriptions.

To receive a report from the Chairman (for information only): The two councillor vacancies will be advertised on the CB Facebook page and in the Newsletter after the MDDC election period has expired on the 12th of November. Cllr Milton laid the PC Wreath at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday. Cllr Milton thanked Cllr Westcott for her hard work on the response to the Government's White Paper on proposed planning reforms. The First Aid Course is delayed due to Covid-19 restrictions. A decision from DCC about the resurfacing of the War Memorial is still awaited.
- 17. To receive a report from Councillors (for information only): Cllr Benjamin reported on setting up a Parish Council Facebook page. Clerk to put this on the December agenda for discussion.
- 18. To receive a report from Councillor Way (DCC): (for information only) Cllr Way was not present.
- 19. To receive a report from MDDC Councillors (for information only): Cllr Coren reported on the Local Government Boundary Commission's further proposals to alter Mid Devon ward boundaries, which do not affect Cheriton Bishop Parish.
- 20. Correspondence: to receive a report from the Clerk of correspondence received: The Clerk reported on correspondence received about Planning Application 20/01795/FULL, an email received from a resident about the Glebelands Play Area hedge and emails received from MDDC about benches and the crown lifting of 2 oak trees at the play area.
