193/13 Matters Arising

Chairman confirmed the tree has not been planted yet the site for it was agreed. It was confirmed that there are no emissions at Tellams they are not burning there anymore it is now a storage site

194/13 Chairman & Councillor's reports

Councillor Mitchell now had the plaque for the flagpole courtesy of Councillor Heal. Councillor Mitchell reported on a meeting with Councillor Way and Highways Officers. The white lines outside the shop will not be replaced there was discussion about the siting of the bus shelter outside the Mulberry, the sign for the surgery will be provided. Other highway issues were discussed

Councillor Endacott was concerned about the parking on the road opposite the shop, Chairman confirmed it had been reported to the police who were unable to take any action as it was not illegal, a lorry parking at the top of Church Lane was also mentioned as a problem. Chairman reported that blocked drains have been cleared

Steps at Hescane Park. Councillor Coren has established that the steps have not been adopted it appears the steps are still in the ownership of the original developer of Hescane Park which has now ceased trading but he has spoken to the person involved and they are not interested in ownership of the steps.

It has been suggested that he confirms this in writing also agreed to find out if the path from the steps to the main road is owned by the Old Thatch. Councillor Coren reported that Tellams is monitored by M.D.D.C. and he had seen the records which show the site has not been operational for two years it is now just a transfer station

Councillor Heal reported that M.D.D.C. were very busy with large developments at Tiverton and junction 27 of the M5. locally enforcement action is going to be taken at Southcombe Hill Farm and the Argermay site is being monitored but it looks derelict

Mr B Bryon-Edmond confirmed the footpath from Hescane Park belonged to the developers not the Old Thatch. He had attended the T.D.C. planning meeting about Moor Park and spoke against the dangers of the proposed development to pedestrians his suggestion of a pathway was rejected as it was in the curtilidge of a listed building. Mr B Bryon-Edmond also spoke on behalf of the Parish Plan working group over 50% of responders were concerned about road safety and speeding. He is investigating the setting up of a community speed watch scheme

Minutes of the meeting on Monday 9th December 2013 had been circulated and it was resolved they be taken as read and signed as a correct record

There are still blocked drains at various sites that need clearing or jetting through. Agreed Chairman and Clerk to draw up a list to send to D.C.C.

Councillor Mitchell reported problems with the newsletter printer the engineer had suggested putting a small heater in the cupboard agreed to purchase one

Councillor Westcott was concerned about the reduction in affordable housing at Moor Park. Noted the application had been approved but no notification received from T.D.C.

Councillor Endacott reported there was quite a lot of interest in setting up a walking group and there was an initial meeting next week

Councillor Heal said its budget time at M.D.D.C. there are cut backs for 2014/15 but the next year 2015/16 is of more concern as cuts will be much more drastic when government grants are cut. Councillor Heal clarified that a submitted plan has to be decided as submitted it cannot be altered or adjusted at a planning committee meeting

Agreed to do a land registry search to confirm ownership and if necessary to write to Mr Grove. He had some information on road traffic regulations regarding parking on the C50 Chairman confirmed the PCSO had visited the residents concerned. Councillor Coren circulated details of the S106 money held by M.D.D.C. he asked Councillors to check if any developments had been missed

The project aims to help households improve their energy efficiency, even those in traditional or old buildings, which don't have cavity walls or are awkward to insulate. A self-assessment form will be available indicating which measures would be useful in each house, and a workshop on opportunities for energy saving will be run in each community, with signposting to sources of financial support. Look out for ours in Cheriton Bishop, probably in March.

From the Rector

National pride

This month sees the return of the six nations rugby internationals. It is the oldest and largest rugby tournament in the world. It has a one hundred and thirty two year history. It is not an unbroken history, the tournament was stopped by the war and bitter disputes in 1885, 1887 and 1889 prevented its Completion.

The tournament has grown from the four home nations to include France and Italy. It is interesting that Ireland has remained unified in the tournament despite Ireland's independence.

As you watch the trailers on television you might be forgiven for believing that some giant battle was about to begin. It is portrayed as a battle of epic consequences and importance. It is interesting how a game can unearth a national pride in the nations of Great Britain, France and Italy. There is talk of greatness and a total belief in the ability of your national team to win all the games. History shows that the games are much closer and less predictable than the exaggerated claims of the supporters. It is hopefully a rivalry that is good-natured and lasts only the duration of the game and allows differences to be easily forgotten after the excitement of the game.

It is interesting that the importance of where we have come from is part of our identity. Where we are born and our parent's nationalities fix an identity in each of us. It creates a label that tells us and others where we were born and who made us. It is not something we can change, we may be able to delight in it with pride or keep it a secret from others. But when it comes to filling in forms there is no hiding our beginning and identity. However it is an identifier that does not define who we are or what we shall become. That is a whole different story in which we get a big hand to shape it for ourselves.

For me place of birth and parents is very two-dimensional. I want to add a third dimension, that of God's Creativity. As I look at a new born baby, which is both delicate and intricate, I do not think to myself "wow all this comes about by random chance". Instead I marvel at such wonder and complexity. If, as I suggest, there is a third dimension, is it right that we ignore it except perhaps at times of Crisis and family obligation? Or should we engage and find out what part we might be able to play in God's plan of forgiveness and grace? Should we pass on to others the very good things that God wants for each of us? It is more important to know where we are going, rather than where we have come from. We can enjoy the excitement of a competition for a short time but what we do each and every day is just as important, if not more important.

A New Gardening Year

To all those people who kindly bought the Tete a Tete daffodil bulbs, a big thank you. From the money raised the Society was able to purchase very early flowering daffodils to plant around the village. Remember, you will need an entry form to display your tete a tete at the **Spring Show, Saturday 29th March**; schedules on line mid February or paper copies from Persis 24303. Over 50 sets of bulbs were sold, how many will be on display?

At the last Spring show 2011, there was talk about season-ality with daffodils only appearing once in the year, but many vegetable and fruit crops available all year, grown around the world and imported. So Gardeners, go out into your plots and bring a few samples of what you are still harvesting at the end of March. Leeks, parsnips, broccoli, early cabbage, swiss chard? And in store apples, potatoes, carrots? And forced chicory, parsley, mint, etc? Anything else?

No entry form needed, this is not a competition but a chance to show everyone that there are still harvests to be had at the end of March. Do not forget to leave your name on your specimens otherwise they may be claimed by hungry folk! And of course, it will depend on our fickle climate!

PROACTIVE OR INACTIVE?

PARKING in the Village has become a subject of heated debate!

There are two schools of thought about what should or should not be done.

On the "Proactive side", there is a determination to restrict parking in the areas of the junction of Yeoford Rd., the Main Rd (C50), and Woodbrook Rd.; the top end of Church Lane: and the junction of Dunsford Rd. and the C50 in the vicinity of the Old Thatch Inn.,- to improve visibility and prevent accidents.

The "Inactive" school also want to prevent accidents; their solution is to maintain parking on the roads, as vehicles form an obstacle and slow traffic down – speed being an important contributor to accidents. In short, maintain the status quo!

The consensus at Neighbourhood Watch (and indeed from the Parish Plan Questionnaire), fall into the "Proactive" school. We felt the removal of the single white line on the opposite side of the road to the Shop encouraged double side parking, which reduces "visibility" and makes physically turning onto the road hazardous when leaving the shop car park.

Turning right from Yeoford Road onto the C50 is also dangerous, especially when vehicles are parked near the corner of Woodbrook Rd. Drivers actually have to enter the oncoming lane!!

A Site Meeting was arranged by County Councillor, Nick Way, with the appropriate Highways people to try and get the continuous white line repainted and sound out other parking restrictions. We were told that policy on "white lining" is that it is generally not done in Villages anymore (cost saving, perhaps?). There was of course, no consultation with anyone about this! Nor double/single yellow-lining!

Highways' fall into the "Inactive" school. Asked if they would change their minds if there was an accident, we were told that there would have to be two or three!

So, good folks of Cheriton Bishop, the autocratic Highways Department has spoken and their word is LAW. (unless you take them to the High Court as Tedburn did over the debacle of the A30 access and won – proving that they are not always right!).

And it must be remembered that it was Highways that agreed to building on half the Old Thatch Car Park - which our Parish Council opposed precisely because parking problems were foreseen. And a lot earlier, building on the Shop Car Park was approved by Highways, thus reducing off street parking and visibility for both vehicles and pedestrians using Yeoford Road. Not, you may think, a very good track record!

The Police have no part in this – they can only act where parking restrictions are being flouted. The Highway Code "recommends" "NO PARKING" within 10 metres of a corner, anyone so doing becomes culpable if there is an accident caused by their parking! So BEWARE!

Your comments via "Letters to the Editor" on whichever school you agree with would be welcomed and passed on as necessary.

A NEW YEAR MESSAGE FROM THE TRUSTEES - HELPING MORE PEOPLE

Last year, our services were used by 151 people on 2,421 occasions – up from 1,981 in 2012 – a healthy 22% increase. Most of the increase was attributable to the increase in home visits by our new Community Care Manager who at the request of our GPs made 215 home visits.

Next year, from April, we are expecting to increase our patient transport services to cover the transfer of many clinics from the RD&E in Exeter to our local community hospitals. We aim to work with the NHS to cluster and schedule appointments in our area to enable minibus services to operate to and from Moreton and Okehampton hospitals. We will also need more volunteer car drivers. We are also planning to assist those in need when returning home after an operation.

All this extra work will require additional funding at a time when local authority budgets are being substantially reduced. Should our funding be cut, service users can rely on Acorn continuing as we have adequate capital reserves for such an occasion. We will then need to step-up our fund raising activities. The New Year sees many people retiring – it's a good time to join our growing team of volunteers to join in with our good works in your local community. To further boost funds for the unfortunate youngsters, during the last week of this half of the term each child will be given a 'heart' on which they can write a message to an orphan and then return it to the school on Friday 14th February with a donation, if they wish. The message carrying 'hearts' will then be sent off to Kwakaheza school. As an added incentive, the children will be allowed to wear their own clothes to school that day.
