#### Public Open Session

Local residents Oswald Chung and David Tripp both gave presentations in support of their applications for the vacancy on the Parish Council.

#### **Councillors' Reports**

- The Councillors discussed filling the casual vacancy by co-option and after a vote David Tripp was elected to fill the position.
- Concerns were raised as a house in the village had been broken into earlier that day.
- Runners in the local area have made a complaint that there is a great deal of dog mess around the Four Cross Ways and Holewell Lane area. Consider erecting signs reminding dog walkers that dog fouling is an offence punishable with a fine. This area will be closely monitored.
- Devon County Council coming out to inspect the bridle path at Dabby Lane on 13<sup>th</sup> June.
- The rounders and picnic event held on the Village Green on 11<sup>th</sup> June made for an enjoyable afternoon with over 40 people in attendance.
- Reports that there is a pea hen on the loose in Crockernwell.
- Locals in the village have commented that Tedburn have recreational exercise equipment so if the Parish Council has funding for this type of project this may be a good idea for the village. This will be on the agenda at the next meeting. Any opinion on this would be appreciated including possible locations and the council would like to hear from people in this regard.
- Concerns over the drains in the entire lane up from the scout hut. County Councillor advised that drains are a problem around the scout hut but this has been reported to the scout's head office. The surface water gulleys further up the lane need to be cleared.
- The bus shelters are almost complete and are looking good. The contributions plaque was discussed.
- Leaflets detailing walks around Cheriton Bishop will be distributed around the village.
- An enquiry has been received from the Scout Group to raise funds and possibly use the TAP fund.

#### District and County Councillors' reports

- Discussions concerning Argermay: no news in this regard.
- Mid Devon District Council have accepted 4 Syrian refugee families.
- Devon County Council now has new contractors for highways maintenance. They no longer use South West Highways as the contract has changed over to Skanska, a Swedish company.

#### Overshadowed by terror

I assumed the month of June 2017 would be remembered for the general election results.

When the election was called everyone seemed surprised by Theresa May's decision to call a snap election. The consensus was that the Conservatives would extend their small majority. The surprise result was a hung parliament. The only certainty seems to be unpredictability at the moment.

However, the terror attacks in both Manchester and London have dominated the news. It is almost impossible to comprehend how your life can be so dramatically changed by an injury or bereavement of someone you love. It is hard to come to terms with when this is an accident, but when it is a deliberate act to harm innocent people, especially children, it seems even more unbearable. It seems to me that to be able to commit these acts of terror, you must either hate or be indifferent to the plight of the people around you. You cannot really care except maybe for yourself or your ideal. Jesus makes the important point: that we should love our neighbour as ourselves. We should treat others the same as we would like to be treated. When Jesus was asked who our neighbour was, he recounted the story of the good Samaritan. Often our neighbour is someone whom we find difficult. One of the key messages, in the midst of this recent evil, was that there came out many stories of good Samaritans. There were many people who stopped, helped and literally bound up the wounds of the injured. There were people who were carried to safety, strangers who drove people home and people who offered a bed for the night. It was said that there were many more acts of love and kindness than the few acts of evil. It is this love that unites us and brings us into relationship with God. It is also true that when we turn away from God and act selfishly we become lost. No faith community can advocate such acts of terror or evil. It is a distortion for human ends and I believe God has no part in it.

On a more positive note, it is good to see how people have reacted to these human tragedies. People have felt compelled to come and pay their respects to those who have died with vast floral tributes both in Manchester and London, they are a vivid reminder. The Red Cross has started an appeal fund to help the victims and their families. There are messages of support from all parts of our society and the world. There has been a second concert to raise money for the appeal. People are genuinely concerned and want to do something to help. We should never forget the capacity people have for doing good and wanting to help. It far outweighs the acts of evil. We need a right perspective, compassion for those in need and determination for doing what is right and good.

The offence of going equipped for burglary is likely to be concerning for you. However, please note, this relates to a crime that was committed elsewhere but the vehicle was stopped at this location. It is however a reminder that even in a quiet village, we all need to be observant of unknown vehicles and any unusual activity.

An example of this comes when a Burglary occurred on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> June. A property close to the school was burgled and items were taken. This occurred between approximately 1200-1300 hours. The property was empty but secure and the offenders have broken a patio door at the rear of the property to gain access, setting off the house alarm. In a short amount of time they have taken jewelry boxes and left as they entered. A number of people heard the alarm but did not contact police or investigate further, meaning the occupier did not know about the burglary until later in the day. The offenders must have had a vehicle and I would ask that residents think back to that day and consider if they saw anything unusual. I would also ask that if you walk around the lanes of Cheriton Bishop (perhaps dog-walking etc) that you keep an eye out for the stolen items. Particularly a small wrought iron style box that contained childhood keepsakes, that the owner would dearly love to have back. It is likely that the offenders discarded this at some point.

#### CHERITON BISHOP NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

#### **BURGLARY & SAFETY REMINDERS**

I have been asked to provide a piece on behalf of Neighbourhood Watch following the very sad loss of the previous, much more capable hand, and it is a hard act to follow.

**Well here goes** :The aim over the months is to continue to provide information as before, along with what has been or is happening in the area, report the conclusion if there is one, provide reminders on security, provide useful information, perhaps try to see if there is any movement on the speeding situation and reporting the latest scams.

#### BURGLARY

Sadly there was a burglary in the village on Monday 12th June between 12.00 and13.00 hours, i.e. lunch time, which took place in a property just a short distance from the school. The alarm did go off but unfortunately it was ignored. Entry was by breaking the glass in a secured patio door. Jewelry boxes containing jewelry and watches and other boxes containing childhood mementos such as hospital tags, baby teeth etc were stolen. Certain items were discarded along the Yeoford Road when, presumably, it was found these were of no value and these have now been recovered. So when out walking keep eyes open, there may be other times when stolen items are thrown away for whatever reason.

#### ALARMS

If you have an alarm system make sure it is serviced regularly and if it starts to go off irregularly do have it dealt with. Otherwise people tend to ignore them, which is not any help to you or anyone else. If the insurance company for the property takes into account the alarm when setting the premium, they will require it to be maintained on a regular basis.

#### PROTECTING YOUR HOME REMINDERS

Holiday time is here. Whether you're out in the garden, or out and about, you are providing an opportunity for burglars to strike. Even if you are in the garden, keep external doors and windows shut and locked.

Don't leave valuable items in reach of an open window when you're indoors.

Air flow through the property is wonderful at this time of year, but it is important to keep the property safe.

Ask a friend or neighbour to visit whilst you are away for any length of time, to water plants and take post away from letter boxes. Better still have the post kept at the post office. Prevent delivery of parcels whilst away. Set timers to control lights and a radio. Restrict view into the property by using the curtains or net curtains.

A vehicle parked on the driveway is a good idea whilst you are away.

Sheds and out buildings should be well secured. Put tools, toys, steps and ladders away overnight. Check insurance policy that these areas are covered.

Make the garden area secure and lock rear entry gates and ensure that walls and fences are not easy to climb over. Neighbours could have a key to enable them to check around the property.

Fortunately we live in a quiet village but things do occur at times. We all need to be **observant**, **vigilant** and to keep our eyes open for **strange vehicles** and **persons** around. Police numbers: 101 for most incidents and 999 for top emergencies.
