Cheriton Bishop Walking Group

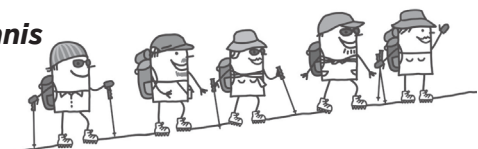
The past few months have seen an increase in popularity of our walks and people joining us from further afield.

Dartmoor Local Plan, Consultation Start

Dear Local Plan Consultee,

We have now published the Proposed Modifications for consultation. All information on the consultation, how to comment, and the events we are holding are available on our Local Plan Review page.

There is a Quick Guide to the consultation online, and some FAQs specifically on the changes at Buckfastleigh – hopefully this helps make things clearer, as we are mindful this is quite a technical stage in the process.

The consultation is open until 5pm on Monday 19th July 2021. Please ensure your comments are with us by then. We encourage all comments to be made using the online form on our website. Alternatively you can download a comment form and return it by email or post. At this stage comments are invited only on the proposed modifications and the soundness of the Plan following those modifications. Comments on areas of the Plan which are not being modified can no longer be considered.

The Authority is required to carry out a sustainability appraisal of the Modifications, as well as an assessment of its compliance with Habitat Regulations. You are invited to comment on these reports, too, and they are available on our website.

We ask you to please take every opportunity to share the details of this consultation with anybody who may be interested. We will be notifying everyone on our Local Plan Consultee List, as well as sharing details more widely through press releases, FaceBook and Twitter. We are also holding public drop-in sessions where we will be available to answer any questions, with further details on our website.

NEDCare, at the Heart of Local Communities

NEDCare is a charity that is rooted in its community, having been set up by local people in response to a lack of regulated care in the area. Although still growing to meet demand, it is now one of the largest employers in North East Dartmoor and is led by a Trustee Board of local people who bring valuable insight, skills and experience for the benefit of all those they support.

NEDCare provides regulated care across North East Dartmoor, including Cheriton Bishop and surrounding areas. Since August 2017, NEDCare has provided 29,403 hours of regulated care in the local area, working with 111 individuals and their families and travelling 83,731 care miles!

NEDCare's vision is of 'care for everyone who needs it, where and when they need it', and part of fulfilling this vision is to subsidise the cost of care for those who can't afford it.

A local resident whose parents were clients of NEDCare remarked that, "NEDCare's connections and understanding of the local communities where they are supporting people really helped my parents retain their links and connections in their community".

Paul Mitchell, long-time Cheriton resident and Trustee of NEDCare, notes that, "NEDCare is a charity, not a private business... it's there to help people. In Cheriton, there is a strong heart of caring

for people, and NEDCare is part of that."

Founder Julia Darby comments, "we are a community-led organisation that provides regulated care to people in remote areas who otherwise wouldn't be able to get the help they need. We are still growing to meet demand – sadly we still don't have enough carers to support everyone who needs it, so it is important that we can find and recruit local people who can thrive in the role."

NEDCare pays their Carers a fair wage from the off (starting at £10/hour), and also pays for mileage and downtime at the standard rate. One recent recruit remarked, "I would certainly recommend working for NEDCare to anyone at all who needs a career in which they feel valued".

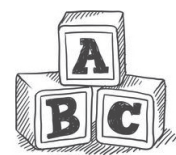

In the Garden

The Summer Garden

July and August are the months we have been waiting for when we have been working away in the garden, so don't forget to sit and look and smell the summer blooms.

There is still lots to do but don't miss the beauty of those fleeting moments. Although of course you can appreciate the garden whilst you snip off those spent flower heads!

*The more you dead head,
the better your plants can direct
their energy into new flowers*

Bearded iris have mostly finished flowering by July so now is a good time to lift and divide them. Weeds tend to get entwined amongst their rhizomes so this is a good opportunity to clear those away. Lift them carefully with a fork and cut away old pieces of foliage and rhizome. Plant the new pieces of root in clean soil and trim the leaves to about 6" to reduce wind rock. They need to be planted near the surface of the soil.

If you had tulips in pots which you then heeled into the ground until their foliage died back, you can now lift them. They can be left to dry in a shed until the autumn when you can replant them.

As well as watering plants in the summer, don't forget to top up your ponds. If you don't have rainwater, tap water can be added in small quantities. Remove algae, putting it on the pond side for a day or two to allow any pond creatures to crawl back into the pond, before you add it to your compost heap.

In the vegetable garden there should be plenty of salad and vegetable crops to harvest. Dig up your early potatoes to check on their progress before they get too big. Shallots and onions are ready to harvest when their foliage begins to yellow and bend over. Lift them and allow them to dry in the sun before storing them. Cut courgettes whilst they are young and tender.

Enjoy the fruits of your labour!

Why are sperm counts falling?

According to Dr. Shanna Swan, an environmental and reproductive epidemiologist at the Mount Sinai Medical School in New York, sperm counts in some western countries reduced by 59% between 1973 and 2011. This is not new, because sperm counts have been falling in some countries for over a hundred years; but it is worrying.

The possible culprits could include exposure to chemicals, including phthalates in plastics; and obesity, not allowing the relevant parts of male anatomy to get cool enough. The chemicals hypothesis is strengthened by the finding that in Denmark, organic farmers had higher sperm counts than non-organic farmers. Which led to a lot of carping about who was more virile.

If Roundup can kill you if you are over-exposed to it, surely it can affect your reproductive health. If

male fish are being feminised due to oestrogen and some 200 other human-origin chemicals found in our rivers, then maybe male humans are affected by these chemicals as well. However carefully we use them, pesticides, weedkillers and household cleaning products tend to end up in groundwater. Powerful insecticides Fipronil and imidacloprid (in flea treatments for dogs and cats – both are banned on farms), were found in most of Britain's 20 river systems and were harming insect, and therefore, bird populations.

Human fertility is immensely complex and many factors are likely to be involved in the declining sperm count. But for a variety of health reasons, minimising the quantity of chemicals we use is not just good for nature; it's good for us too.

2021 An Olympic Year?

I cannot explain why but I have always associated the Summer Olympic years with leap years. If there is a summer Olympic games then there is a 29th February that year.

I guess the first year I was really aware of the Olympics was 1976 which was in Montreal, I was fascinated by many different sports shown on television. This was in the days before world championships and so it was often the only time in four years when the best contestants competed in the same competitions.

There was controversy with the 1980 games in Moscow with sixty-six nations boycotting the games. In the following games in 1984, Los Angeles was boycotted by the Russians. In 1988 the games in Seoul were tainted by failed drug tests, 100m winner Ben Johnson failed his drug test. As you can see there has been quite a lot of controversy!

The Covid-19 pandemic forced the postponement of the games last year and so we lose the connection to the leap years.

The games are again proving to be very controversial. A recent poll in Japan suggests that seventy per cent of people want them cancelled because of a fear of a rise in Covid-19 cases.

The International Olympic Committee is insisting that the safety measures will keep the athletes, visitors and the Japanese public safe.

There are also fears of high summer temperatures which could make Tokyo the hottest games on record, which also raises concern for athletes wellbeing. I think the games will go ahead and I hope the fears do not materialise and affect the games.

The controversy is a far cry from the Olympic creed.

The most important thing in the Olympic Games is not to win but to take part, just as the most important thing in life is not the triumph but the struggle.

The essential thing is not to have conquered but to have fought well.

There is a sense that when we agree to do something or commit to an event, we should give it our best effort and do our best. By not giving our best or trying our hardest, we are visibly saying that we do not care. My mother used to say "Do it with good grace or don't do at all", that seems like sound advice.

The Bible uses images of participating in a race. Paul reminds the Corinthian church that the race of life (1 Corinthians 9 vs. 24-26) is about an imperishable prize, eternal life. Eternal life is a gift given to those who believe in Jesus, and so this makes us want to do our very best.

The sense is that we should all enter, compete and be fully prepared for engaging in life. It is not the winning but participating that is important. Eternal life is open to all with God.

As we watch the Olympics and cheer on our favourites, let us also remember how hard the other competitors have worked in training. It is the same for God who sees all of our best efforts and encourages us to keep going and keep trying. It is taking part that really counts.

Neighbourhood Watch

We're Nearly There

At the time of writing this issue, case rates are rising across Devon with the highest increase being in the 20 - 39 years olds. Delaying the lifting of the restriction to 19th July seems sensible. In the meantime we are told we must continue with the important rules of social distancing, wearing face coverings, and hand washing regularly. Continue with lateral flow tests and self isolate if you test positive or are asked to do so by tracing teams.

Officers Self-Isolating During G7

Devon & Cornwall police have reported that one officer supporting G7 policing tested positive for Covid-19. The officer and all who had been in close contact or in a bubble with (amounting to 12 officers) are now self isolating and taking a PCR test.

Speeding

Speeding within Cheriton Bishop, Crockernwell and Tedburn St Mary is causing concern. In the village this is particularly noticeable on the main C50 (old A30 road), Yeoford Road, Church Lane and the road down from Four Cross Way to the school. On the Yeoford Road, cars parked on the road at the surgery can be the first thing to slow traffic down.

We feel that 30 MPH signs should be moved further away from Higher Shippon's entrance. On the lane down to the school, the 30 MPH signs need to move further up towards Four Cross Ways. Heavy vehicles seem to be getting larger and the lanes and roads in our area were never envisaged in years past to be used by such large vehicles.

Scam Delivery Text Messages

A reminder that you should be very wary when receiving texts requesting a delivery change or missed delivery which includes a link. There are many different scam texts and emails around. If you are expecting a parcel but you are not sure whether the text is genuine, take a look at the website of the company that the text says it is from. Most have advice on how to check a text from them is genuine and also how to report suspicious texts and emails. This can be done by sending an email to National Cyber Security Centre or to - report@phishing.gov.uk, or phone Action Line on **0300 123 2040**.

Advice to the Scammed

We have just been told that three people in Devon have lost many thousands of pounds to fraudsters claiming to be from their bank who said they had been targeted by fraudsters! In all cases they were told that someone had attempted to remove money

from their account, asked security questions and told to put money in a holding account. Phone numbers appeared to be genuine as used by the people's bank fraud departments.

Do not give out personal information to unexpected callers. The bank or the police will not call and ask you to withdraw cash, or move money to another account for any reason. If you suspect callers are scammers, put the phone down. You can check the person who called by using another phone to a number you have used before to make contact. It has been suggested that you do not dial numbers printed on the back of credit cards as scammers have found a way of obtaining and using these.

Going Away

If you are hoping to book a holiday soon, here are a few tips to help ensure your safety.

- Do thorough research on accommodation, flights, cruises, package holidays etc. to check that they are authentic.
- Check that accommodation does exist.
- Check reviews on Trip Advisor or similar sites.
- Never pay for holidays or travel by bank transfer. Pay by credit card with a good chance of getting your money back if things go wrong.
- Travel agents and tour operators should be members of ABTA or ATOL
- Be wary of cheap holidays or high deposits.
- Check terms and conditions.
- Keep all paperwork and check statements for irregular payments and entries.
- Be wary of callers who can arrange holiday refunds or for travel cancelled or postponed due to Covid-19. These callers play on the desire for a refund so that another booking can be made.

Councillors resolved to object to this application because the plans submitted under the current application do not reflect the plans upon which the Planning Inspector made her decision at appeal. Cllrs asked the Planning Officer to request that a design which reflects that which was allowed at appeal be submitted. Councillors recommend that the dwellings should be carbon neutral in use and that their visual impact on the environment be reduced by being earth sheltered. Councillors asked the Planning Officer to investigate whether the site excavation is too close to the road and has therefore

Councillors resolved to object, commenting as follows. The S106 Agreement dated 2nd October 2013 was negotiated to allow the applicant to use the site for small scale specialist waste incineration whilst at the same time protecting local residents' quality of life. The Parish Council is concerned that the applicant has not adhered to the terms of the Agreement included to protect quality of life. If that is the case the PC does not have confidence that, if the change of use is allowed, the terms will be adhered to in the future, nor that DCC will have the manpower to monitor or control the situation.

The PC, notwithstanding the above, call on DCC to enforce the conditions imposed in the 2013 S106 agreement and in the current planning consent. In particular Condition 9 of Planning Consent for the site dated 2nd October 2013 requires that, if the building ceases to be used for incineration purposes, it will be removed. The building is not used for incineration and therefore that condition should be met.

Councillors asked Cllr Letch to call this application into Committee if DCC are minded to approve.

8. Traffic – to discuss speeding traffic through Tedburn/Cheriton Bishop/Crockernwell and agree associated actions:

After lengthy discussion of this ongoing issue which is again causing concern for parishioners it was resolved to conduct a Village FB and paper survey (Cllr Tomlinson) and try again to get Community Speedwatch up and running when Covid-19 regulations allow (Cllr Milton). Cllr Edwards will provide a map showing the areas of particular concern to Cllr Letch. Clerk to report the regular late night motorbike to the PCSO to request the police attend around that time and request that the portable speed monitor be brought back to the C50.

9. Wheelchair Friendly Benches – to discuss buying wheelchair friendly benches for the Village Green and agree associated actions:

It was resolved to purchase two wheelchair friendly benches for £215 each and temporary rubber matting using the £500 Locality Fund Covid Support Grant to assist in making the Village Green a Covid safe social space.

10. Play Equipment – to consider provision of new play equipment for 8 to 11 year olds at Glebelands Play Area and agree associated actions:

Cllr Benjamin ran through the quotation she had received from Kompan. Cllr Benjamin will research grant opportunities and Cllr Tomlinson will prepare a Village FB and paper survey to obtain parishioners' views. To go back on the agenda for July. Cllr Coren offered to find out how much S106 money might be available for new equipment.

11. Platinum Jubilee – to discuss how to celebrate HM The Queen's Platinum Jubilee and agree associated actions:

Cllr Milton explained the idea of the Queen's Green Canopy and suggested sites in the village where trees could be planted. To go back on the Agenda in September and in the meantime Clerk to find out whether DCC have any objection to trees being planted on roadside verges.

12. MDDC Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 – Consultation Public Spaces Protection Order – Proposed Dog Controls – to consider how to respond to the consultation questionnaire:

Clerk to respond on behalf of the PC.

13. Climate Change – to receive an update on Climate Change initiatives:

Nothing to report this month.

14. Social Media – to receive an update on PC social media activity:

The PC FB page now has 110 members.

15. Roads & Footpaths – to receive an update on roads and footpaths in the Parish:

Nothing to report this month.

16. Newsletter – to receive an update on newsletter activities:

Cllr Edwards updated councillors.

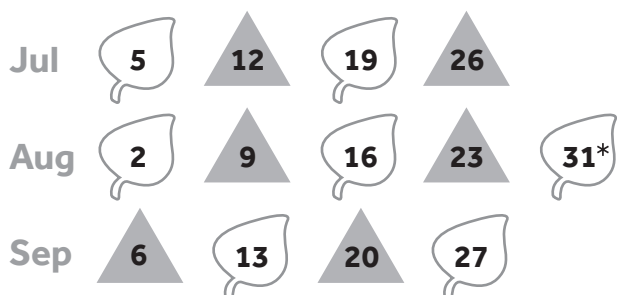

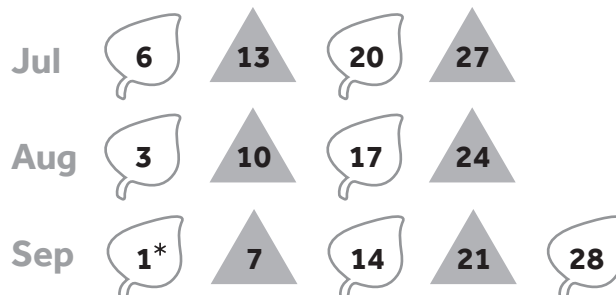
