CHERITON BISHOP PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting Monday 9th June 2014

All of the Councillors were present, along with both of the District Councillors and the County Councillor

Discussed during the Public Open Session

A resident asked if the village was entered in the best kept village competition as there was corrugated iron at Moor Park which was an eye sore and also dangerous, the site is now open for access by anybody. He spoke about the Mulberry planning application, he was appalled at the lack of democracy at the M.D.D.C. planning committee meeting and also raised concerns about the handling of the application and the marketing of the site. The District Councillors clarified the procedure at planning committee meetings, which is similar to other District Councils. They confirmed the Case Officer had recommended approval.

A representative from B G Pearce wished to correct some statements made at the May council meeting regarding a planning application for Tellams. The application relates to treated sewage from septic tanks not raw sewage. They clarified the difference between bio-solids and liquids and how they are dealt with on their land. There is a smell from bio-solids as it is spread on top of the ground, liquids are injected into the ground. They would welcome members of the public contacting them about any concerns they have. Due to the nature of the business they are closely monitored by many agencies. A member of the public commented that if more detailed facts had been included in the application, it would have helped dispel some of the concerns

<u>Planning applications - were raised at this point in the meeting by the Chair (so as to be discussed</u> whilst the points raised in the Public session were still fresh in the Councillors mind)

Tellams Yard Cheriton Bishop construction of a slurry pit D.C.C. consultation :

After discussion it was agreed there were no planning reasons for objecting to the application. Agreed to raise no objections but to raise concerns about the ongoing problem of smell.

14/00850/CLU Natson, Cheriton Bishop, certificate of lawfulness for the retention of a structure forming and used as a dwelling house in excess of 4 years. Agreed to make no comment on the application.

Discussed by the Councillors

Councillors thanked the owner of Oak House for cutting the grass outside the property and also spoke about the replacement trees. The owner was agreeable to planting trees.

It was asked if the recently circulated Community Service offer could be used to clear a drainage ditch at Cottage Lane.

Chairman reported speeding on Venbridge Hill.

It was reported that the walking group was going well, on the 20th July it is planned to hold a village walk.

Various bad road surfaces were reported. Councillor Way confirmed D.C.C. were only repairing A and B roads at the moment.

Councillor Way said some funds had been released for local projects. He was still chasing the surgery sign. Councillor Coren had been contacted about building work at Hole Cross. P.C.S.O. Lisa Crocker has started a farm watch scheme. Mel Stride M.P. would be holding a surgery at the Village Hall on Saturday. The Clerk had received an invitation for the Chairman and Vice-Chairman to meet the M.P. after the surgery, both are unavailable, Councillor Mitchell would attend.

From the Rector

Glasgow 2014

The month of July sees the opening ceremony of the Commonwealth Games on 23^{rd} July. This will be the twentieth competition. It is a unique competition in which the home countries compete for their own nations of England, Ireland, Scotland and Wales. It dates back to the British Empire. The first games were held in 1930 in Hamilton, Canada where 11 countries sent 400 athletes to take part in six sports and 59 events.

Since then, the Games have been held every four years (except for 1942 and 1946 because of the Second World War), and the event has seen many changes, not least in its name. From 1930 to 1950 the Games were known as the British Empire Games, from 1954 until 1966 the British Empire and Commonwealth Games and from 1970 to 1974 they took on the title of British Commonwealth Games. It was the 1978 Games in Edmonton that saw this multi-sports event change its name to the Commonwealth Games. It is interesting to see how the name has changed with the demise of the British Empire.

Scotland hosted the Games in 1970 and 1986. There are now 17 different sports. I shall be watching the rugby sevens and the athletics. If the winter Olympics are anything to go by, I shall end up watching the bowls. Who would have guessed that curling could be so exciting! As with all sports it is the taking part that is really important. Winning should be the bonus to participating. It is sometimes sad that all that people focus on is the winners, it is just as important to achieve your personal best performance. It may not win you a medal but you will be rewarded with the knowledge that you did your very best. It is so important to do the best you can.

The bible use images of participating in a race. Paul reminds the Corinthian church that the race of life (1 Corinthians 9 vs. 24-26) is about an imperishable prize, eternal life. The sense is that we should all enter, compete and be fully prepared for engaging in life and trying our best. We are to be encouraged that God and the great cloud of witnesses who have already run the race now surround us and cheer us on in the race that is life (Hebrews 12 vs.1-2).

As we watch the Commonwealth Games and cheer on our favourites, let us also remember how hard the other competitors have worked in training and look out for personal best performances. It is the same for God who sees all of our best efforts and encourages us to keep going and do our best!

Watching and Caring Not Snooping

" A NEW KID ON THE BLOCK"?!

Not NHW but NHHW!

The idea was "floated" at a Meeting in the Village Hall recently to set up a Neighbourhood Health Watch in Cheriton Bishop. This would compliment our existing very strong Neighbourhood Watch Group whose main aims are to make everyone feel safe and secure. The aims of NHHW are to enable communities to support one another's health and wellbeing needs by:

Connecting trusted community support for health Enabling Good Neighbours to support one another Increasing community resilience and helping to reduce loneliness and isolation

Some practical ways how this scheme could work with volunteers:

Collecting prescriptions etc or picking up groceries for a neighbour during bouts of ill-health or bad weather:

Looking after/feeding pets whilst the owner attends a medical appointment.

Providing lifts to the shop/ supermarket. Etc., etc.,

The Neighbourhood Watch slogan "Watching and Caring, Not Snooping" means many members already indulge in much of this support and, of course, Acorn does too! Neighbourhood Health Watch is supported by the Police, the Fire Service and the NHS – the two former are also closely involved with NHW. So there would be overlap between the two Groups, but also gaps.

Consultations will no doubt take place but we in NHW are happy to be used as a platform to get NHHW off the ground with a possible view to integration.

COMMUNITY SPEED WATCH

The results of the Parish Plan Questionnaire indicated that 187 villagers said that "more Police Speed checks were either "very important" or "worth doing". Police funding cuts have meant none or fewer checks have occurred, so in November 2013 we set the ball rolling to do our own checks with the Police sponsored CSW Scheme.

Initially, we have to have the sites monitored where we think checks should be made. This was at first to be done by Highways, then the job was passed to the Police, now it has been passed back to Highways. We have enlisted the help of County Councillor Nick Way to chase this but if all else fails, we will approach the Police & Crime Commissioner who has stated categorically, that the Police Service needs our help!

Wow, what a lovely period of fine weather we've been experiencing just lately with the sun shining brightly throughout the daylight hours. Of course, we have just passed the 'longest' day of the year when we had daylight for the greatest number of hours in any 24 hour day. If you really want to be downbeat you could even say that the evenings are drawing in now!! But it really is great to be able to stand at a high point like Four Cross Ways and look out to the south and west and see Dartmoor defining the horizon.
