Cheriton Bishop Parish Council Report

Meeting on 12th May 2014

Discussed at the open public session:

Concerns raised about the Tellams slurry pit application as follows:

- Residents have suffered with bad odours in the past and Environmental Health have been notified.
- The application was for a slurry pit and now seems to be for storage of raw sewage from septic tanks.
- Where will the raw sewage be disposed? Concern about the availability of land to spread it on.
- No indication of any management plan or environmental assessment for dealing with raw sewage.
- Increased traffic.

Discussed by the Parish Council:

- Village clean up was well attended with many different areas being cleaned.
- Removal of mobile home at Argermay discussed. District Councillor confirmed there has been difficulty identifying the owners of the property.
- Whether Mid Devon District Council are changing to electronic consultation on planning and District Councillor confirmed not at this stage.
- Very useful energy workshop took place in the Spalding Hall.
- Community Land Trust AGM on 20th May 2014 in Spalding Hall.
- District Councillor confirmed the change of use application for the Mulberry has been approved.
- Mid Devon District Council confirmed that the correct procedure had been carried out regarding the community listing of Checkers Store.
- Mid Devon District Council open spaces map received.
- Two requests received asking for the agenda of the Parish Council meetings by e-mail and agenda has been circulated accordingly.

Decisions made by the Parish Council:

- Councillors elected Gill Westcott as Chairman
- Councillors elected Tim Vooght as Vice-Chairman

Planning:

- Previous comments sent to Mid Devon District Council about Tellams Yard will be forwarded to Devon County Council. Extension will be requested until the next Parish meeting and request further information on the need for an Environmental impact assessment, clarification on application description and transport assessment. Concerns about availability of land to spread sewage on as problems in the past of slurry spread on public footpath. Does application comply with Government guidelines on managing raw sewage?
- 14/00472/PNAG Treable Farm. No further approval required.
- 0156/14 Little Thorn, Cheriton Bishop. Approved.

Dear Councillors,

Western Greyhound have notified us of changes to their bus services to take effect from Sunday 1st June. It is understood that the changes are prompted by the outcomes of a contract retendering exercise by Cornwall Council. The Traffic Commissioner has granted short notice.

The changes are:

- revisions to Service 510 Exeter Okehampton Launceston Wadebridge;
- withdrawal of Monday to Saturday Service 599 Exeter Okehampton Bude;
- a revised Sunday & Bank Holiday timetable on Service 599 Exeter Okehampton Bude, with Sunday
- & Bank Holiday services on the Okehampton Bude secion being withdrawn after operation on 6th July.

Alternative Monday to Saturday services are provided by Stagecoach on Service X9 which continues to operate Exeter - A30 - Okehampton - Bude.

There is some reduction in service through Pathfinder, Tedburn St. Mary, Cheriton Bishop, Crockernwell, Whiddon Down and Sticklepath. Some alternative services are provided by Service 173, Exeter - Whitestone - Tedburn St. Mary - Cheriton Bishop - Crockernwell - Drewsteignton - Chagford.

We have amended our arrangement with Western Greyhound to specifically maintain the Monday to Saturday 0655 Okehampton - Exeter and 0750 Exeter - Okehampton, both of which carry significant numbers of people to and from work in Exeter and Okehampton.

On Sundays & Bank Holidays, Service 510 will continue to provide five buses each way between Exeter and Okehampton but after 6th July there will be no buses on Sundays & Bank Holidays on the section between Okehampton and Bude. Based on data supplied by Western Greyhound, most passenger usage originates from Cornwall. Cornwall Council, however, have confirmed that they will not consider any contribution towards a subsidized replacement Sunday & Bank Holiday service on this section.

The choir will then sing a short selection of music before the bellringers demonstrate their skills. There is no charge.

From the Rector

<u>Midway</u>

We are approaching midway through the year. By the end of the month the countdown to Christmas 2014 will have started with just 177 days to go! We will have also past midsummer's day and we will be looking towards the end of summer, and the days will start to get shorter. Midway or midpoints are interesting because they represent the halfway point. Often in terms of longer time periods getting to halfway is really an achievement as after that the end is nearer than the beginning.

When we take on a big project we are sometimes overwhelmed by the size and amount that there is to be done. The way forward is to break it down into smaller Chunks that are more manageable. Keeping track is very important and we use quarters and halves to measure our progress. Going beyond halfway brings the end into focus and we start to feel that the worst is behind us. Sometimes getting to half way Can put us in the odd position of being no nearer the end than the beginning. It Can sometimes be accompanied by a low point as we realise that there is just as much to do as we have already done! It still takes more effort to keep going and finish what we have started. Sadly some people do not even make it to half way or just give up halfway through. The cost has been more than they expected or they can manage.

At this moment in time there is real anxiety over the preparations for the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro in 2016. It is around the halfway point and the International Olympic Committee are describing it as the worst situation in 40 years: "This was a worse situation than in 2004, when there were concerns about preparations for the Athens Games." It will be interesting to see how Brazil recovers the situation in time for 2016. Midway can be a really uncomfortable time! With the Olympic Games there is no alternative plan, it just has to work!

As we look at the action of God it seems to transcend time and there appears to be no half measures. We are reminded that he is there at the beginning, the middle and at the end. By deduction God is there all the time. It is more of a Constant presence than a Variable involvement by God. What really does change is our willingness to find God and accept that we are part of his work. We sadly often ignore God and turn away from what we should be doing. It is often a painful experience. Amazingly God welcomes us back wherever we are, it does not matter if we are half way through, or we think we have left it too late. God takes us and works with us. It often comes as a huge relief to lay our burdens down and to look to being guided by God.

The Mulberry

On May 7th the application for change of use for the Mulberry came before the Planning Committee at Tiverton. In their presentation the spokesperson for the objectors group stated that 260 people had signed their petition from Cheriton Bishop and district against the change of use, also stating that this was nearly half the population of Cheriton Bishop. In view of this number of signatories we feel it is only right that a few facts be made clear.

1. It was stated that the premises had not been marketed correctly.

Stags were instructed jointly with GVA to market the property. Since February 2013 it has been advertised in the Estates Gazette, Publican's Morning Advertiser, the Western Morning News and Exeter Echo. Mailshots were sent to local and regional developers, pub operators/owners including regional brewers and commercial property agents. A saleboard was placed on the property and it was listed on their websites. Over 500 people requested details via Stags website and the property was also available on property portals such as Zoopla and rightmove. Over the period it has been browsed 24,891 times on rightmove and clicked through 903 times. According to Stags the property has been fully marketed for 7 months.

2. Offers received.

Three offers were received each requiring a change of use. One was from a vets practice, one from a developer and one from the Devon Federation of Young Farmers (DFYF). The first two potential transactions fell through leaving the one from DFYF.

If the application for change of use by the DFYF had been refused then their offer would have been withdrawn also.

3. Skittle Alley and Darts Team.

The restaurant area replaced the skittle alley, so that facility has not been available for several years. The darts team had also relocated some while before closure.

During the last month of its use as an inn the landlord approached the local councillors to know if he might be able to get a change of use to demolish and develop the site. This would have meant that the days of the Mulberry as an inn would have been over in any case.

Now, with the approval granted to the DFYF for change of use, it means that later this year when they move offices from their current HQ in Exeter, they will most likely bring extra business to the shop, post office, The Old Thatch and The Coach House.

As District Councillors it is part of our responsibility to support and help the Parish Council, to take their thoughts and ideas forward to Mid Devon District Council and relay replies. This we did on this occasion.

THE DEMISE OF THE MULBERRY INN

When it was muted that the village was to lose its former community pub through change of use, Reg Chapman, Mike Watts and Peter Ritchie, residents of this Village for a very long time!, were so incensed they went "house to house" with a Petition to "Keep the Mulberry". More than 190 people signed it (that is almost half the adult population) and another 65 from Tedburn and beyond.

These people are owed an explanation as to why the case was lost!

The Planning Application was "called in" by Mid Devon District Planners for consideration by the 15 strong Planning Committee at a Meeting in Tiverton. The opponents of change of use were given three minutes at this Meeting to put their case. Reg, Mike and Peter asked the undersigned to present our case, which we publish below.

Firstly, the Planning Officer spoke in favour of "change of use". Then it was the turn of the Young Farmers' representative (3 minutes), again in favour; then I put the case against. Next up was one of our Parish Councillors who was in favour because the Parish Council had voted for the Young Farmers using it as their HQ. The next speaker was our District Councillor, who whilst not on the Planning Committee, had limitless time to support the Young Farmers' application and did! Not surprisingly, the vote was carried in favour of change of use.

Read our case against granting change of use – it was not anti- Young Farmers- we all have the greatest respect for their labours – it was about retaining and restoring our Community Pub – and in the right hands all those signatories thought we could still have a successful and meaningful community hub.

"Good Afternoon, Mrs Chairman, ladies and gentlemen.

Our case for retaining the Mulberry Public House as a Community pub is based on the implementation of the National Planning Policy Framework, which states firstly: 'Proposals involving the loss of community facilities such as pubs etc. will not be permitted where this would damage the settlements ability to meet the day to day needs, or result in the total loss of such services to the community'!

"We had two licenced premises in the Village, which have co-existed successfully for more than 30 years because they were aimed at different markets. The Mulberry has always been a "community pub" – aimed at the 'locals', providing darts, pool, skittles, low-priced unsophisticated food and a social hub. The Old Thatch Inn, has always had an excellent reputation as a "gastro pub" providing high quality food and drink and drawing its customers from a wide area of Devon and passing trade from the A30. It closes most Sunday nights and Mondays. It has no facilities for the requirements of a "community pub" and does not rely on "local trade" for its survival.

"The permanent closure of the Mulberry will and is involving the loss of community facilities – Villagers have to travel 2-3 miles to indulge in them. The NPPF also says 'only in circumstances where the facility is proven no longer viable will applications for alternative use be considered acceptable'. The Mulberry traded successfully in the Village until September 2012. The closure was a result of bad business and financial management by the licensee who accrued debts of almost £1m, having purchased the business for just £460,000. It was run by a manager and two chefs – not sustainable in a 'community pub'. That is why it became temporarily 'no longer viable'.

"Two months before closure, the licensee had put the Inn on the market as a 'going concern' at £495,000. After closure, the premises were gutted – everything needed to run a pub sold off, yet 18 months later, with no trading figures or goodwill, the Agent was still asking £495,000 – clearly, they knew that the best return they could get for creditors was by holding on and getting change of use.

"Members of the Committee, we ask you to consider, is the Old Thatch a substitute for the Community Mulberry pub? If it isn't then the first requirement of the NPPF has to be met. No change of use.

"Also consider, could the Mulberry be re-opened and sustained as a well-run Community pub? Take note, please, that in its last year of trading – turnover was stated as $\pounds 300,000$ p.a. - a lot of bums on seats and elbows on the bars, and mainly from locals.- a very sustainable turnover. A hiccup in poor management does not mean the Mulberry is no longer viable so the second requirement of the NPPF for change of use is not met.

"Madam Chairman, ladies & gentlemen, I am here representing 196 signatories to a petition to keep the Mulberry as our Community Pub – that is almost half the adult population or our village, so democracy suggests where your vote should go – give us back our pub 'cause once its gone, it's gone forever. Let's put it back on the market at a sensible price." *MDDC Planning /Committee Meeting* 7^{th} . *May '2014*

Get Changed Makes History


