Cheriton Bishop Parish Council Report

Meeting on 13th February 2017

Public Open Session

• A member of the public attended to voice concerns over the proposals being considered by Cheriton Bishop Primary School to change to an Academy. The main concern being that communication is not transparent or clear and the first letter received by parents caused confusion as it made it seem a decision had already been made. No decision has been made in this regard and it is only the start of the consultation. There has been a petition because parents want to know the options and require further information.

Discussed by the Parish Council:

- Use of Moretonhampstead hospital is under question and Moor Health want to use it for the best benefit of the community through health initiatives. The Parish Council have received a newsletter in this regard. The issue will be on the agenda at the next Parish Council meeting.
- Further to the Walking Group meeting Jon Whitehead and Dennis Milton will now be heading up this group. A big thank you to Peter Endacott and Jane Hancock for organising the walks and being head of this group to date. The next walk will be on 5th March 2017.
- The Village Spring Clean-up will be on Saturday 8th April 2017 meeting at the Village Green at 9.30 am. If anyone has any suggestions of areas in the village that need attention please let the Parish Council know.
- The Parish Council now has the majority of the funding to replace the bus shelters in the village. The shelter by the Young Farmers building will be removed within the next few weeks ready for it to be replaced. A big thank you to all businesses who have contributed to the replacement shelters to date.
- A letter has been received from a resident of Woodbrooke about the poor condition of the road. Devon County Council plans to do as much as possible to this area but cannot guarantee the whole area will be fixed.
- Parish Council would like to remind residents that they can report poor road conditions using the Devon County Council website. This link can also been found through the Parish Council website.

District and County Councillors Report

- Mid Devon have agreed to accept 5 Syrian refugee families and accommodation has been offered by private owners. Due to needs, accommodation will be in towns.
- Consultation on the local plan ends 14th February 2017 showing dedicated areas where it may be possible to build.
- Road closures in the village are between 9.30 and 3.30 but it seems the signs are not always taken in at the end of the day. It has been disjointed how the closures are being done as it seems utilities are not communicating with others working in the area.
- There is a possibility that schools in Devon will be losing funding and there is a vote in February by Devon County Council regarding this.

Planning:

- 17/00069/LBC Horselake Farm Listed building consent for replacement windows comments made.
- Little Thorn extension. No comments.
- Decision The annexe, Polford Cottage certificate of lawfulness. Refuse permission.
- Decision Greenacres Extension to agricultural building. Grant permission.
- Decision 2 Croft Cottages pollard 1 Ash tree no objection.

District Councillor's Comments

Roads: There are probably a number of confused motorists around Cheriton Bishop area at the time of writing this article, "ROAD CLOSED" and "DIVERSION" signs are on almost every road.

At the time of writing BT are engaged in work extending broadband connection in and around the village and the road closure on the Yeoford Road caused by the BT work will end on Friday 24th February.

The following week the road barrier safety work begins on the dual carriageway bridge on the Yeoford Road. Road closure for this work will be from Monday 27th Feb to Friday 3rd March and Monday 6th March to Friday 10th March. At the weekends and for the third week ie 13th to 17th March traffic will be able to use the road but will be controlled by traffic lights.

Some good news is that the stretch of road from Four Crossways to Southcombe Cross has been re-surfaced and is now a pleasure to drive on. Also a section of road from Crooked Chimneys via Twisted Oak to Black Down Cross has been repaired.

Neighbourhood Watch: I would like to thank those responsible for their emails etc. making us aware and keeping us informed. This is a valuable service to the community.

The beginning of March starts the beginning of Lent

March starts the church's season of Lent. The first of March is Ash Wednesday and marks the first of the forty days of Lent.

This year Easter is late, on Sunday 17th April. The latest date for Easter is 25th April, so Easter is not as late as it can be. Interestingly the latest date for Easter is due in 2038. It will be a once in a lifetime experience as the next one is due in 2190! The date is set by the new spring moon, which this year is on Tuesday 11th April. Interestingly, there is a debate as to which is the new spring moon, which often means Easter is celebrated on different dates in the Eastern and Western churches. This year there is agreement and Easter is celebrated on the same date. The origin of Easter was the Jewish Passover feast. Last year the Jewish Passover was a month later than Easter and this year it is the same week as holy week. I hope you can get a feel for the complications of interpreting the moon cycle and its significance.

Having fixed the date for Easter it becomes much easier to count back forty days, not including Sundays. Which brings us back to Wednesday the first of March, Ash Wednesday and the beginning of Lent. When I go into school and explain the church seasons, I explain Lent as the season for watching and waiting. Well obviously we are waiting for Easter. The watching part is a little harder. We are watching for how we are doing in our relationship with God. We are looking for areas we can stop getting things wrong and we are not doing as well as we had hoped for. We also look for ways to improve and develop new areas in which we can do things to help others and ourselves. A traditional approach is to give something up or start something new for Lent. You commit to do this for the forty days. I wondered how long things took to become a habit. It was thought to be three weeks, but recent research suggests sixty-six days. So a good Lenten observance is well on the way to becoming a new habit. Although, if you do not keep it going, it probably will not be a lifelong habit. It is interesting to me that I have to work hard to develop good habits. My bad habits seem to take no effort at all!

I am sure Lent is always a timely reminder that we have to review and adjust where we should be in our relationship with God. The wonder is that God does not tire of my below average performance but rather encourages me to make the most of life and see how things grow and develop. So why not do something good for Lent? It might become a good habit and it will certainly help you and other people.

Dear Residents

I would like to introduce myself as the new PCSO covering the rural south of Crediton, which includes Cheriton Bishop. I have recently transferred to the area after 13 years in Exmouth. I am slowly finding my way around the various parishes and meeting the people that live and work there.

Cheriton Bishop is a lovely village with a low crime rate. Between 1st January and 15th February the following crimes have been recorded:

- 1 x possess with intent to supply proactive stop check A30
- 1 x common assault
- 1 x theft

The following incidents have been reported and attended during the same period:

Lorry swerving, A30 Highway obstruction, Church Lane 2 x Domestic incidents Highway disruption Personal ASB (Anti-Social Behaviour) Horse on road Road related offence, A30 Car with no lights Dislodged drain cover Broken down vehicle, A30

As you will see, most reports relate to incidents on the road. The other incidents are unlikely to have had an effect on the wider community.

SCAMS GALORE! (read this and, hopefully, don't get caught out!)

Some more examples of Scams "doing the rounds" below. Why do we publish them?

To show the ingenuity of criminals in creating messages that can persuade YOU to give them valuable personal information. These might not be the ones that hit you, but the lesson is, question anything that looks vaguely "unreal" or "too good to be true". The bad use of English grammar is often a good "give-away".

Scam 1 A very realistic e-mail is received from the Police! and is headed "Notice of Intended Prosecution" (NIP). It informs you of a speeding violation or some other traffic offence and will ask you to CLICK on a link to access full details. **DO NOT CLICK ON THE LINK** as it will probably infect your computer with malware! They are preying on the motorist who might think he/she has gone through a radar trap etc. without realising it! If you suspect you might be guilty, contact the Police by ringing 101 or e-mail them, quoting the reference number given on the scam and they will verify it.

Scam 2 This one was received by the writer but is also in general circulation! The e-mail heads up: "Thank you for shopping with us. This is acknowledgement of your order: Web reference 70523252; Item: Panasonic NN-GD3715; Microwave & Grill Silver; £188.00 GDP; 2 year guarantee: free; Standard Delivery in 5 days: Free".

The Scam (because it is -I did not order it!) goes on to repeat all the details you would expect from Amazon or any other on-line dealer. But under "Security" it stresses that "we will never ask you to send personal details by e-mail. If we require such detail for security reasons, we will ask you to contact us by phone". So you phone them to cancel the order, and that is when the automated phone reply asks you to feed in those personal details.

Scam 3 Can you believe this? The secure messaging service from the Police etc has been infiltrated by a scammer. The message from our secure source reads "This is a System Administrator message to hopefully put your mind at rest if you have received a recent spam/phishing e-mail, purporting to be from Neighbourhood Alert – the e-mail was not sent by us".

BEWARE!

ROAD CLOSURES/DIVERSIONS

You must be aware of the proliferation of these in and around Cheriton Bishop recently. The road closures themselves are often questionable and with so many of these, the "Diversion Signs" are often confusing. Example: traffic was diverted from the A30 at Whiddon Down through the Village. Unfortunately, a Diversion sign had been left up from another road closure, directing traffic onto Yeoford Road! Fortunately, this happened during the night, but it did not prevent HGVs, coming from Crockernwell, attempting the left turn then having to back up!

Sending vehicles, especially HGVs, down narrow country lanes as a detour is hazardous for pedestrians and frustrating for drivers who meet another vehicle when there is no passing place! Better "joined up" thinking is needed where more than one road is closed, or a clearer indication of where the Diversion is heading.

The "Utilities"! (Highways, SW Water, BT etc.) close whole roads down willy-nilly to save their expense with no consideration for road users. The Yeoford Road/Bridge crossing debacle is a classic example. Strange that the road can now be opened at weekends using traffic lights after protest. The road is actually wide enough for half to be done in turn and keep the road open! (detour 4–8 miles)

The Village Cross to Venbridge Road was closed by maintenance of a mains burst recently. The road was completely closed by excavation with not even pedestrian access. Yet on completion of the work, it can be clearly seen that the "holes" were to one side and had the excavated soil been positioned differently at least pedestrian access could have been maintained. (detour 3 miles)

Is it not time perhaps, for the safety and convenience of the public to be at least considered before roads are closed and traffic diverted?

If you come across a road closure that seems unreasonable, or a confusing diversion sign, contact: **new.devon.gov.uk/roadandtransport/report-a-problem.** This address can be used where dangerous pot-holes persist or other hazards go unattended.

Hi everyone

It is a hive of activity up at Drogo. There has been a bit of work in our visitor centre where we have relocated the door to the shop and given the café a fresh coat of paint. We have also been doing the annual deep clean of the Castle with floors being polished, objects dusted and new displays in the rooms. The garden team has been busy too, mulching the borders and doing vast amounts of pruning. On top of all this 'normal' work, the building project has been moving along nicely too. The new scaffolding is now complete and we are waiting for a spell of kind weather to put the roof sheeting on.

Just in case this wasn't enough to be getting on with, I have some very exciting news to share with you all. I am sure that many of you know that, in the 1920s, a hydro-electric power scheme was created next to the River Teign to provide electricity for Julius Drewe and his household at Castle Drogo. The scheme later fell into disrepair but, as it is Grade II listed and located within a Site of Special Scientific Interest, there has long been a desire to get it working again. I am delighted to let you know that we have, after many years of careful planning and submitting various permission requests, got everything lined up to make this dream happen.

Work will begin in February and will be completed by the end of September 2017. There will be a few open days down at the turbine house for those interested and a regular newsletter on progress. Please let me know if you would like to be added to a mailing list to hear the latest news.
