

Minutes of the Cheriton Bishop Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 10th June 2019 at Spalding Hall, Cheriton Bishop

Present: Cllrs C Carter, T Vooght, D Milton (Vice Chair), D Tripp (Chair), P Dicker, D Coren (MDDC) and S Penny (MDDC). **In Attendance:** D Shepherd (Clerk) and 1 member of the public

To receive and accept apologies:

It was resolved to receive and accept apologies from Cllr Wood and Cllr Endacott. (Prop. Cllr Tripp)

Public Participation: To receive public comment on items on the agenda. A maximum of 10 minutes is allowed for this item. There was no public comment.

Minutes of the Cheriton Bishop Annual Meeting held on the 13th May 2019: It was resolved to approve and sign the minutes as a correct record. (Proposed Cllr Tripp)

Minutes of the Cheriton Bishop Council Meeting held on the May 13th 2019: It was resolved to approve and sign the minutes as a correct record. (Proposed Cllr Tripp)

Co-option of Councillor: The Clerk had circulated the three applications, one of whom indicated that they were content to withdraw if there were other suitable candidates. It was **resolved** to co-opt Kim Bastyan. (Proposed Cllr Tripp)

Report from Cllr Way (DCC): For Information Only

Cllr Way reported that DCC had adopted St Boniface as the Patron Saint of Devon. He reported on current lack of funding for the road network and provided dates for Snow Warden training which he would forward to the Clerk. He explained that a Snow Plan was required. Cllr Way also reported on pot hole repairs and the work he was doing to support funding for new Play equipment at the School.

Report from the Chair: For information only

The Chair updated the Council on action taken following an accident when a parishioner was seriously injured. He provided a quote for posts for the Twenty is Plenty signs for £90.28 and this was approved. He reported on a parishioner who will refurbish the Council noticeboard and a budget of £150 was agreed to include a new user-friendly board to pin notices upon. He confirmed that he and Cllr Milton would be attending Chairmanship Training shortly. He confirmed that a start had been made on refurbishing the bus shelters and Cllrs agreed further action.

Report from Councillors: For information only

Cllr Vooght asked the Clerk to update the website re Cllrs and their roles. Cllr Milton reported that parking at the corners was still a problem in the parish and enquired about the process of introducing yellow lines into the parish. Cllr Coren suggested Cllrs take photographs of problem areas. Cllr Milton also updated the Council on the Local Plan in relation to the parish.

Report from Cllr Penny (MDDC): For Information Only

Cllr Penny reported on his first month in office and his roles in licensing and housing policy development. He had attended Planning Committee when the Anaerobic Digester had been approved at Crediton.

Report from Cllr Coren (MDDC): For Information Only

Cllr Coren reported on his disappointment that the Anaerobic Digester had been approved. He reported on his role on policy development groups and on local enforcement issues.

Devon Air Ambulance Night Landing Sites: Cllr Dicker reported that only one landowner had responded so far and the response was positive. It was agreed to take no further action until responses had been received from the other two landowners.

Section 106 Monies: Cllr Vooght to report on a future project. The Council to respond to request from MDDC. Cllr Vooght reported that he was waiting to hear from the landowner. The Clerk referred to the email from MDDC asking for a response from the Council re: taking over the Play Area. It was **resolved** to resist the pressure from MDDC until Cllr Vooght had been able to discuss the future project with the landowner. (Proposed Cllr Vooght)

Repairs and Maintenance in the Parish: Cllr Dicker to report

Cllr Vooght referred to the need to also refurbish the Council's Community Noticeboard. Cllr Tripp agreed to arrange this.

Autumn Village Tidy: It was resolved that the Autumn Village Tidy would take place on the 28th Sept.

Roads and Footpaths in the Parish: To consider issues relating to roads and Footpaths in the parish including communication with Devon Highways. Councillors discussed the problems in communicating with Devon Highways. The Clerk referred to the importance of using the DCC Report a Problem site and to use the Highways Surgeries which take place on the first and third Thursdays of the month at Crediton Library. The Highways Officer is best contacted via Cllr Way. Cllr Way explained that the problems have been created by the system and the lack of resources

Correspondence: To consider the report circulated by the Clerk. The Council noted the report and Cllr Milton agreed to place the Community Asset notice near the Old School Building. The Clerk had also placed one on the Council noticeboard.

Public Open Session: A parishioner made comments on several matters on the agenda. Date and Time of Next Meetings: July 8th at 7.30 pm. No meeting in August.

Day trips for July and August


We are back to Tuesdays again!

Dr Clunie's Half Everest Challenge, collecting for Acorn

On the 3rd of August, to celebrate his 54th birthday Dr Jason Clunie will (attempt) to cycle Bridford Hill 54 times: 27 of them up and 27 of them down. In statistics this will be just a touch over 54 miles. The uphill 27 miles will be at an average gradient of 9% (maximum 20%) and encompass a vertical gain of just



under 4200metres. Hence the Half Everest Challenge, (the total height of Everest is 8850metres). Those of you who know Bridford Hill might know that it's not an easy climb and so doing it 27 times is at best difficult and tiring and at worst downright silly. So if you feel it's appropriate please give generously for this invaluable local community support service. Both the surgeries are collecting and we are setting up a no fee just giving page on www.wonderful.org

which is 100% fee free and so all the donations will go to Acorn. There will be more detail to follow, on our and Acorn website, at the surgeries and on Acorn Facebook page.

TALKWORKS to help get your life back on track

TALKWORKS is a free, confidential, NHS talking therapy service, offering effective treatments and therapies for anyone over 18 with a GP in Devon. We can offer an initial appointment either over the phone or face to face where we will listen to you and discuss your difficulties and your options for therapy.

Within our service we can offer you one-to-one appointments, either face to face or over the telephone, as well as the possibility of attending group workshops or doing online work depending on what is best for you. We use Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) to look at how our thoughts, feelings, and behaviours interact. From there we help you to make manageable positive changes to improve your mood, using evidence based techniques.

We work across Devon in local hospitals, GP surgeries (including Cheriton Bishop), over the phone and in other community settings. We also have a specialist team available if you are struggling with a long term health condition.

Hardanger embroidery or "Hardangersøm" is a form of embroidery traditionally worked with white thread on white even-weave linen or cloth, using counted thread and drawn thread work techniques. It is sometimes called white work embroidery and originated from a small town in western Norway.

The following month, we welcome back our 'Stitch Circus' led by Janet Grist and friends. One of the most unique elements of our group is that whatever your skill level, from novice to expert, everyone is welcome. At our AGM, Jenny Bone guided us through felting techniques and everyone made necklace beads or smaller coasters. Many of us had no idea how to felt but within an hour, were enthused converts to this art. Next time I shrink a jumper, I will have achieved a felted garment rather than a mini top! Gardener's corner

By July the garden should be brim full of colourful flowers and delicious salads and vegetables. It is good to keep cutting fresh flowers for the house or for presents, as this keeps the plants trim and productive. Likewise with salads, just keep taking a few fresh leaves every day and more will grow. Some perennial herbs, like chives and marjoram, are best cut right back now so that they make tasty new foliage for the rest of the summer.



In the greenhouse, keep pinching out side shoots of tomatoes and also the growth tip can be taken out now. The plants should be putting all their energy into producing

delicious home grown tomatoes rather than new growth. Courgette plants can also have their growth tips taken out to encourage bushy plants and more fruit.

Orchard trees can have their fruit thinned out now, especially if the tree hasn't lost enough in the natural 'June drop'. It is better to have fewer, better quality fruits which can develop into apples and pears that are more appetising. Plum trees might need support for heavily laden branches as they are brittle and break very easily. All Prunus trees should be

pruned in the summer if necessary, rather than the winter like other fruit trees. This is because the cut stems are prone to silver leaf disease and canker during the winter months. Some early flowering biennials like sweet rocket and wallflowers will have finished flowering by now. As they have come to the end of their lives, they can be



removed, leaving room for fast growing, colourful annuals such as cosmos and zinnias, stocks and cornflowers. These might still need pinching out if they are getting tall and leggy in order to maximise flowering. You can still take cuttings of tender perennials such as salvias, penstemon and pelargoniums. These should root rapidly and grow to make good plants to give to friends or fill in gaps. Herbaceous geraniums will have finished flowering now and can be cut right back so that they produce a fresh flush of foliage. Prune wispy growth on early flowering clematis (Montana) and also on wisteria. Make sure you cut the long shoots of wisteria around the base of the plant. Wisteria are grafted plants and the root stock will soon overtake the less vigorous flowering graft if these suckers are allowed to grow. You will then find yourself with a wisteria which doesn't flower. In this case you need to take it out and plant a new one!

August in the garden

Keep picking flowers and enjoy them! Also dead head garden plants to prolong their flowering period. If you have alstroemerias, pull them from the base (as you would pull rhubarb) and they will regenerate with new stems from below the ground. If you want to collect seed however, don't forget to leave a few flowers to set seed (the best colour ones if you are organised enough to remember to mark which they are!)

Biennials such as wallflowers and foxgloves can be planted out now (but keep them well watered) to get well established before the winter.

Keep sowing salad leaves for a continual supply.

August is the time to propagate rosemary. Put cuttings into a pot of gravelly compost, taking off the lower foliage and the growing tip.

When your rambling roses have finished flowering, it is a good time to prune them, to try and keep them under control.

Mow wild flower meadows in August. Leave the cut sward for a couple of days to wilt and allow seeds to drop, then rake it up and remove it. The wild flowers will do better if you don't mulch with cut grass as you need to keep fertility levels low.




Cheriton Bishop Walking Group

School's out for Summer!

Are you about to embark on your first full time job or are you thinking of getting some work experience before starting university?

Starting your first job can be a daunting experience. This article aims to share with you what you need in order to work in the UK, what to expect from your employer and what your employer is legally obliged to provide.

Prerequisites for employment

In order to work in the UK you will need the following:

- A National Insurance number. You should have received an NI number just after your 16th birthday but if you haven't, log onto the www.gov.uk website and apply for one.
- A piece of ID to show you are eligible to work in the UK such as a Passport or Driving Licence or birth certificate.
- and usually a bank account into which your wages can be paid.

What to expect from a good employer

If you are lucky enough to find work with a good employer you can expect to receive during your first week:



* A proper induction programme which will include a tour of the premises, an outline of the fire drill and identification of the assembly points and the cloakrooms. You will be shown where to store your

personal belongings and your general place of work

* Training

You will also receive training on the equipment you will be using such as the till, computer, software, etc.

* An understanding of the company's organisational structure

and an introduction to your Line Manager. You should also receive a copy of the Company's manual explaining the company's ethos, e.g. 'Do no evil' (Facebook), 'Never knowingly undersold', 'we are an equal opportunities employer' as well as 2 copies of your Contract of Employment (one for your records and one to sign and return).

The Contract of Employment

Of course pay is just one part of your relationship with your employer, the other part is the terms and conditions in which you work. These are set out in your Contract of Employment which we will now turn to consider.

Before the Contracts of Employment Act, employment law was a bit of a mish mash. The Contracts of Employment Act (now the Employment Rights Act 1996 (ERA)) sought to bring together a collection of • custom and practice

- custom and pract
- case law, and
- government legislation

into one Act.

The nature of the Act is that it sets out the minimum requirements that an employer must provide to all employees.

A Contract of Employment The important thing to note is that this is a legally binding agreement between your employer and yourself. It sets out your



duties, responsibilities and employment conditions which must be adhered to unless both parties agree to change it. Make sure you store it safely, you never know when you may need it!

When you accept an offer of employment from any person, you are **both** entering into a legal contract which can be enforced through the courts. And most importantly, the ERA 1996 section 1(2) states, **that the main terms of the contract must be in writing and provided to the employee within two months of the start of their employment.**

- The names of parties entering into the agreement: Business Name and the Employee's name
- Commencement Date
- Duration of employment
- Job title
- Remuneration Package
- Place of Work
- Notice required to terminate employment
- Hours of Work
- Leave
- Pension
- Absence due to sickness
- Disciplinary and performance improvement procedure
- Grievances relating to your employment

Contract terms....

Contrary to common understanding, contracts do not need to be in writing to be enforceable. So you may find that your employer does not issue you with a typed document setting out all your terms and conditions, it may be that:

- your terms are verbally agreed, or
- set out in the employee's handbook which must be made available to you.

Be mindful that some conditions are implied for example, you should know your employer is bound by law to pay you the minimum wage; that you have the necessary skills or qualifications for accepting the job ie if you accept a delivery job, you imply that you meet the legal requirements, in that you hold the appropriate driver's licence; and it is expected that you will not do anything dishonest nor steal from your employer.

In the event of a grievance at work



Recruiting and training staff costs money and time so the last thing an employer wants is for you to leave unnecessarily. However sometimes you do encounter problems in your workplace that can seem insurmountable and many employees just end up quitting. However I urge you to first exhaust all avenues available before walking out on a job because once you walk out, there's no going back. And just think what it says about you to your next employer?

In the event that you do have problems in the workplace.....

Your first port of call should be to your immediate supervisor/Manager. If they are source of the problem

a) Look at the grievance procedure as set out in your Contract of Employment

b) Consult your work committee member or Union representative, if you have one

- c) Consult your HR representative, or even
- d) Speak directly to the Department Head.

Exhaust all means to solve the problem internally before going to any outside agency such as: ACAS, Citizen's Advice Bureau, Your last port of call may be to a solicitor specialising in workplace disputes.

If you are really dissatisfied, you always have the right to give the correct period of notice to terminate your Contract.

So what are your responsibilities and duties to your employer?

To do your best, to be loyal, industrious and above all reliable.

What are your employer's responsibilities to you? To treat you fairly.

Good luck and enjoy the world of work!

Neighbourhood Watch

Speeding within the village and also accelerating and decelerating well within the 30 MPH zone is causing concern. This is particularly noticeable on the main C50 road, Yeoford Road, Church Lane and the road down from Four Cross Ways to the School. Vehicles include a number of cars, heavy lorries and some of the farm traffic. We would point out it is not all traffic. On the Yeoford Road cars parked on the road at the surgery can be the first thing to slow traffic down for instance.

Police in the past have carried out speed checks but seem always to pick a time later in the day when traffic is lighter. Perhaps the '20 is plenty' signs will have an impact when erected !! In the past we tried to get the police to train up villagers to use speeding apparatus and report to them the results. This was not taken up by the police so perhaps the time has come to have another go.

Yeoford Road 30 MPH sign being repositioned nears Coxland Farm where the painted SLOW sign has worn off could make a difference, plus a slow restriction detail installed on the road. Similarly move the 30 MPH sign up towards Four Cross Ways on the lane down to the school. Our roads are narrow generally without verges or paths and vehicles must slow down before there is a very serious accident. Heavy vehicles seem to be getting larger and the lanes and roads in our area were never meant to be used by these.

Burglary

As this is being written I have received a report of a burglary in our area. Items stolen include diesel and the cans to put it in. So do lock up and safe guard your property.

Scams

There is no let up and they keep coming. Two people in our area have received the following: A phone call from a company warning of faults in lofts in the area. They are highly qualified in this particular 'field' they say. The phone was put down before the caller could say what the 'field' was.

The second scam was an email claiming to have come from BT which stated that from 12th June, BT will be in full compliance of EU's new copyright directive Article 13. It requests a follow up link to accept their new terms of service.

Both are scams so please do not click on anything, give passwords or information of any kind. Do not engage with any tradesman or professional you have not asked to call you or who is not known to you.

More on scams

Scammers are making phone calls saying they are the HMRC and that the person owes tax or other

duty for a period in the distant past. Prosecution or legal proceedings are mentioned and the person can avoid this by making an immediate payment by bank transfer or iTunes gift card!! Genuine HMRC will always contact you by letter in the post first and may follow up with a phone call quoting a reference number on the letter. They will not demand immediate payment or payments via cards or iTunes gift cards.

Fake 'Talk Talk' emails are going around that state that the persons 'Talk Talk' account is in credit and they're owed a refund. As has been said before, do not click on the links or attachments in these fake emails and never respond to messages that ask for your personal or financial details.

Another scam which you may have heard of is from people claiming to be a police officer or bank official. People are told there is fraudulent activity at the bank and instructed they should withdraw money for safe keeping and assist the police. People may also be told their cards have been compromised and that money should be withdrawn for safe-keeping, or to purchase expensive items, or that they should hand over their cards to the 'police'. A courier can often visit a person's home to collect money, goods and cards. Ask yourself for whose safe-keeping? And who will benefit?

Just remember your Bank or the Police will never phone requesting personal information, asking you to withdraw or transfer money, or send a courier to your home to collect items.



Churchwarden's Ramblings

This edition of the Ramblings is largely concerned with the church organ. The organ was installed at St Mary's in 1950-51 and at that time positioned in the Lady Chapel, and was moved to its present position in 1965. It has been maintained and is tuned each year but the organ builder we use is finding that it needs increasing amounts of work done each year as parts wear out and the pneumatic action becomes more unreliable.

The PCC has taken advice and has decided to refurbish the organ and to replace the pneumatic action from the keys with an electric action, the total cost of the works is likely to exceed £29,000. This is a considerable amount of money and the decision has not been taken lightly; we will be seeking grant aid but will also rely on local fundraising and support to ensure that the organ will still be playable and be at St Mary's for another 67 years.

We will launch our major fund-raising on the evening of Saturday 14th September when Andrew Millington and Gordon Pike have kindly offered to perform an organ and choral recital, this will be a wonderful opportunity to hear good music played on

a very fine instrument. Andrew is the former director of music at Exeter Cathedral.


