Public Participation: To receive public comment on items on the agenda. A maximum of 10 minutes is allowed for this item.

A representative from Devon Air Ambulance gave a presentation repotential night landing sites in the parish and responded to questions from Cllrs

Minutes of the Cheriton Bishop Council Meeting held on the 8th April 2019: To approve and sign as a correct record

It was **resolved** to approve and sign the minutes as a correct record (Proposed Cllr Tripp; Abstain Cllr Wood) **Co-option of Councillor:** The Clerk to report

The Clerk confirmed that the Council could co-opt at the June Council meeting

Devon Air Ambulance: To discuss a night landing site in the parish Following the presentation by DAA it was agreed that Cllr Dicker would speak to the relevant landowners and report back to the June Council meeting

Report from the Chair: To consider a report from the Chair. For information only The Chairman thanked Cllr Vooght for all his work as Chairman of the Council

Report from Councillors: To consider reports from Councillors. For information only Cllr Dicker referred to parking issues within the parish were cars parked on pavements were blocking visibility splays. Cllrs agreed to talk to relevant parishioners about this matter to see if it could be resolved. Cllr Vooght raised an issue of apparently abandoned gas bottles.

Report from Cllr Coren and Cllr Penny (MDDC): For Information Only

Cllr Penny introduced himself to Cllrs and said it was a pleasure to be at the meeting. Cllr Coren reported that the Head Of MDDC enforcement did not work on Mondays and so could not attend a Council meeting. 



Dr Clunie's Half Everest Challenge, collecting for Acorn

On the 3rd of August, to celebrate his 54th birthday Dr Jason Clunie will (attempt) to cycle Bridford Hill 54 times: 27 of them up and 27 of them down. In statistics this will be just a touch

over 54 miles. The uphill 27 miles will be at an average gradient of 9% (maximum 20%) and encompass a vertical gain of just under 4200metres. Hence the Half Everest Challenge, (the total height of Everest is 8850metres). Those of you who know Bridford Hill might know that its not an easy climb and so doing it 27 times is at best difficult and tiring and at worst downright silly. So if you feel its appropriate please give generously for this invaluable local

Can you help?

The newsletter has been contacted by Mrs Joanne Taggar who would like to find out if anyone locally can help her fill in her family tree. This is her request:-

I am an novice doing family tree research on behalf of a friend. Three of us will be travelling to Devon in mid-November 2019 hoping to visit places of significance to the Gosland (Goss) family. The areas of interest are Cheriton Bishop, Hittisleigh and Colebrooke.

In Cheriton Bishop I am researching John Gosland (Goss) who was born there on 7 March 1770. His parents were Thomas(born in Hittisleigh on 28 February 1744) and Grace (née Snow) born in Colebrooke on 13 July 1744. His grandparents were John and Elizabeth (née Leakey) Gosland and Zachariah and Elizabeth (née Burnel) Snow.

John Gosland (Goss) married Sarah Dart from Colebrooke on 9 February 1796 at Colebrooke. Their son William Goss was born in 1811 at Colebrooke and died in Victoria, Australia in 1857.

We would appreciate any local information about places of interest or stories from those time periods, particularly if they relate to any of the families above. Kind regards

Planning Applications By Emma Benjamin

Thinking of making an adjustment to your property? Then you may well need planning permission from your District Council. There are certain things you can do without planning permission as many properties benefit from permitted development rights; these can include having a single storey rear extension of up to 3m off the rear wall on an attached house or 4m on a detached house. You could even extend as much 6m and 8m respectively, depending on the designation of the land on which your property stands. Building control input will still be required for such a project. You can read all about permitted development rights online at the government's planning portal: https://www.planningportal.co.uk/info/200187/your_responsibilities/37/planning_permission/2

Some properties may have had their permitted development rights removed so you should check with the Council in the early stages of your scheme. Equally well, if you are in a conservation area or live in a heritage asset (listed building) you will need both planning permission and conservation approval. Conservation areas are meant to be of historic importance and worthy of protection by the use of planning controls, therefore, permitted development rights to extend or alter properties within these areas is curtailed. The need to seek permission for works done within a conservation area extends to outbuildings, walls, fences, hedges and trees too (as well as any trees outside of the conservation area which are protected by a tree preservation order). For example, all trees within a conservation area with a trunk diameter of at least 75mm and measuring 1.5m above ground level are subject to protection, including trees that are part of hedgerows. When planning a drastic change, if you are in a conservation area, you need to give the council six weeks' notice of your intentions. This gives them time to consider whether your proposed works are necessary and appropriate for the conservation area. It is a criminal offence to lop, top, cut down, uproot, wilfully damage or destroy a protected tree unless the Council has permitted the work. If you deliberately destroy a protected tree or damage it in a manner likely to destroy it, you could be fined up to £20,000 if convicted in a magistrate's court. For other offences you can be fined up to £2,500. You will also normally have to plant a new tree if the tree was cut down or destroyed.

When planning an extension or alteration to your property, bear in mind that there are other bodies who may need to be consulted about your proposal too, the Highways department for example. If your scheme creates a new access from your property (or replaces an existing one) the Highways Department will be consulted on the scheme. Often, you'll find their response may be that 'standing advice applies' and information on what this advice actually is can be found online. It is worth noting, however, that there are specifications regarding a new access onto a public highway. For example, it needs to meet the road straight on and not be at an angle and it should adhere to the sight line requirements for both up and down the road to maintain the safety of pedestrians and vehicles using the road. Also, you should still be able to turn a vehicle on your property so that you are driving forwards on to the road and not reversing out which clearly could be dangerous.

If unsure you should always contact the Council planning department for advice which they will generally dispense via a return phone call or email. For a more detailed and personal response, you can apply for pre-application advice from the council. The council encourages discussions at an early stage of development planning and states that doing this is likely to result in a good quality and acceptable development. To apply for pre-application advice you will need to fill out a form and pay a fee to the council. If you feel you'd like to comment on someone else's planning application (and do remember you can support an application as well as object), you should ensure your remarks are pertinent to the application only and not about another property, or about the person making the application and others associated with them. If you are signing a letter or petition created by another person, read it very carefully before putting your name to it. Are you certain the contents are factually correct? Are the points solely about the application and are you sure they do not defame the character of the applicant or anyone else? Remember your comments are put online by the Council and as such are published in the public domain, therefore they could be open to libel accusations and consequent legal action. Mid Devon District Council created a useful document explaining how to comment on planning applications which can be found here:

Specifically relating to the above point, the document states that comments must not:

- Contain any personal names, please use words such as applicant, neighbour etc.
- Contain any material which is defamatory of any person.
- Contain any material which is obscene, offensive, hateful or inflammatory.
- Promote discrimination based on race, sex, religion, nationality, disability, sexual orientation, or age.
- Be likely to deceive any person.
- Be threatening, abusive or invade another's privacy, or cause annoyance, inconvenience or needless anxiety.
- Be likely to harass, upset, embarrass, alarm or annoy any other person.

Top Gardening Tips!

Lots of plants are sending out fresh young shoots at this time of year. You can take advantage of all this energy and vigour by taking cuttings and growing new plants. These are called softwood cuttings as the growth is still soft and flexible and hasn't yet hardened into woody stems.

First, make sure that your secateur or knife is very clean and sharp. Then find a shoot which doesn't have a flower bud on it and cut about four inches off the tip. This will help to keep your original plant strong and bushy as well as providing you with useful cutting material. If it is impossible to find a non- flowering shoot, then nip out the flower bud. Next, remove the lower leaves and also the growing tip, as it is likely to wilt anyway. Ideally, collect material when the weather is cool and put it in a plastic bag to keep it fresh.

If you are going to put the cuttings on a windowsill, a small pot is probably most suitable. Fill this with free draining compost; a multipurpose compost mixed with grit, perlite or vermiculite is fine. Firm the compost and

as the cuttings are soft, it is a good idea to make four or five holes to push the cuttings into. They seem to grow best around the edge of the pot. Then, cover the pot loosely with a clear plastic bag to allow light in and maintain moisture. You will find you have to shake the condensation off the bag every day but within a few weeks they should root. Keep the pot on a cool windowsill out of too much direct sunshine. It is a good idea to add a label to make sure you know what you have grown!

A few tips for staying safe this Summer

- Fresh air flowing through the house is lovely at this time of year, but it is important to keep your property safe and secure.
- Don't leave valuable items in reach of open windows when you're indoors.
- Shed and out buildings should be well secured. Check your insurance policy to make sure that these are covered. Put tools, toys ladders and steps away over night.
- Keep external doors and windows locked even if you just are in the garden,
- Ask a friend or neighbour to visit whilst you are away for any length of time, water plants and take the post away from letter boxes. Much better have the post kept at the post office until you return.
- Setting your lights and/or radio on a timer is a good idea.
- Use your curtains to restrict views into your property or even better use blinds, nets or similar.
- Stop the delivery of parcels whilst you are away.
- Secure your garden by locking rear entry gates and ensure your walls and fences are not easy to climb over.
- Leave a key with your neighbours so they can check on your property.
- Unplug all electrical devices not required to prevent a short and to reduce your energy usage.

ALARMS

If you have an alarm system make sure it is serviced regularly. If it starts to go off irregularly you should have it dealt with. Otherwise it is likely to be ignored by people which is no help to you and can become a nuisance. Remember that insurance companies usually take into account the alarm system when quoting for the buildings cover premium and will require it to be maintained on a regular basis.

A thief has been operating in the area

By the time you read this they may have moved on or hopefully been caught. However, there have been several incidents of theft over the last few weeks in Cheriton Bishop and on towards Dunsford. The thieves have taken possessions and stole two dogs. I am delighted to inform you that both of which were tracked down and have been reunited with their owner. It seems that a white transit van with yellow and red chevrons on the rear doors is involved, Reg No : DU09 WHJ. If you spot this vehicle please report it to the police on 101.

Now something for the benefit of the village

At the May Parish Council meeting, a representative from Devon Air Ambulance gave a presentation regarding potential night landing sites in the parish. A Councillor is now exploring the details with the relevant landowners and is due to report back to the Council. There is a long way to go to sorting things out but the village would now seem to be a step closer to having this important facility.

Distractions in supermarket car parks

Recently in a supermarket car park in Exeter a lady was loading her shopping into her car when she was approached and distracted by a man asking for directions. He or an accomplice stole her purse and later her bank cards were used at cash points and in shops. It is thought the thieves had watched the lady at the check out type in her PIN number. So if you are approached in a supermarket car park, keep a very close eye on your bag, purse and goods and don't become distracted. Get into your car and drive away safely.

Do take great care when paying for goods with a card. Be very careful to conceal your PIN numbers in large stores, in any store, shop, fuel station, restaurant or at an ATM machine. Make sure that no one is watching you, is close to you or looking over your shoulder when typing in your PIN number.

Virgin Media

For customers of Virgin Media, please be aware of a scam that's going around. Apparently fake emails purporting to be from Virgin Media are being sent out. These threaten the recipient with 'automatic disconnection' due to 'invalid billing information' The links in the email lead to genuine looking phishing websites that ask for account details and other information.

If you receive an email from Virgin Media or from any other organisation for that matter, do not click on the links or attachments to messages that ask for personal or financial details. Delete the email, it's a scam. Similarly if receiving an 'out of the blue' phone call which does not sound right **hang up, it's a scam.**

This may help! After a nuisance call, dial 1572 and BT will in future redirect calls to junk voicemail.

CREDITON COMMUNITY BOOKSHOP



The long summer academic holidays are often a source of envy for people who get only four to six weeks off during the whole year not just over the summer period.

We are often drawn to make a comparison between our lot in life and how we perceive others are faring. It is interesting to me that I often seem to notice that people are doing better than me or having an easier time than me. I seldom think to myself that I am very lucky with what I have, and have to do. To my shame, I easily forget that there are so many people around the world just or only just existing, whilst I live a very comfortable, easy and safe life.

This year the end of the Easter season, Pentecost, slips into the second week of June. It is almost halfway through the year. It is more mid-summer rather than the end of spring and the beginning of summer. It changes the feel of this year, particularly as we had a hot Easter Sunday with record high temperatures. You might be mistaken in thinking Easter was a summer event! Yet regardless where Easter sits, early or late, warm, hot or cold it is surely a reminder that God is working for us without us asking for help. It is often the case when we acknowledge that we need help that then we can really change. Our world is changing all the time and we still need God's help to change us and others.

Latest news from Castle Drogo

Hi everyone

All is going well at Castle Drogo with the weather making it possible for the builders to catch up on some of the time they lost during the cold snap. It has been wonderful to welcome visitors back to see the Drawing and Dining room in full glory and the gardens have been full of colour.

This year presents some exciting opportunities in research as we are looking to start an oral history project. We'll be recording the memories of those associated with, or with memories of, Castle Drogo in the past, from the early days or in more recent years. If you have any memories, or know someone who might have, and is willing to talk to one of our trained interviewers, then please get in touch. You can find out more about the project in the Rayners' Room in the castle where there is a place for people to record their contact details, or please email: <u>oralhistorycastledrogo@nationaltrust.org.uk</u>. We are really looking forward to hearing the memories from people.

I wanted to let you all know as soon as possible that we will be closing Foresters track for around 1 month in mid-June. Foresters Track is a permissive bridleway running on the South side of the river between Fingle Bridge and Whiddon Deer Park. There will be an alternative route for those wishing to do a circular/ longer walk, or for those cycling or on horseback. However, the public footpath on the north side of the bank (fishermans path) will remain open and provides the most direct route to avoid the closure, but only on foot.

The closure is to allow over 200 metres of major track repairs to take place to fix erosion caused by the river Teign. The resulting track surface should make the path more accessible for all users, and improve access for our own work operations, as well as reinforcing the river bank. The timing of the work is to take advantage of minimum water flow within the river and all works should be completed by the summer holidays. The track will be entirely shut at all times including weekends due to the risk of falling rocks and unstable surfaces.
