Cheriton Bishop Parish Council Summary of the Minutes

Cheriton Bishop Parish Council met on the 15th October and November 12th

Planning Applications:-

18/01460 Certificate of Lawfulness for the continued use of building as a single dwelling house not built in accordance with planning permission at **The Annexe**, **Polford Cottage**. The Council resolved to object to this application.

18/01680 Erection of 2 storey extension to existing detached garage at Crooked Chimneys Cottage. The Council resolved to support this application with conditions.

18/01633 Outline for the erection of 2 dwellings and alterations to existing vehicular access at Little Mounson. The Council, who had heard from one member of the public who had spoken in objection to the application, resolved to object on several grounds.

18/01685 Change of use of agricultural land for the siting of 3 safari tents, formation of car park and formulation of the site on Land adjacent to **Crooked Chimneys Cottage**. The Council resolved to undertake a site visit and to consider the application at their next meeting on December 10th.

18/01725 Removal of condition relating to agricultural tie at **Thorne Cross Farm**. The Council resolved to object to this application.

Planning Decisions: the Council noted that the following applications had been approved with conditions as filed:

18/00934/5 Erection of single storey extension,

replacement of glazed frame and roof over courtyard, alteration to internal doors, renewal of rainwater goods and porch to east elevation at **Coxland Farm.**

DCC Traffic Regulation Amendment Order: The Council has been advised that a site visit will now take place. Once notified to the Clerk some Cllrs will hope to attend to discuss the proposal with DCC.

Vacancy for Parish Councillor: The Council has coopted Oswald Chung to the Council to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Gill Westcott.

Defibrillator: Cllr Vooght reported that 40+ people and 12 children had attended the session which was very comprehensive. A further session will be planned for the new year. Cllr Vooght hopes to recruit several volunteers to manage the defibrillator.

Autumn Tidy Up 6th October: Cllrs Vooght and Endacott reported that 18/20 people had attended and they were pleased to welcome some new faces to the Tidy Up. Thanks were given to the local farmer who provided a hedge trimmer. All the support, including teas and coffees, was appreciated. **Storing Parish Council Equipment:** The Council has been advised by MDDC that they can not rent the vacant garage as there is a waiting list of tenants wishing to rent it.

Salt Spreader for the Parish: Cllr Endacott proposed that the Council should buy a salt spreader. The Clerk will apply for a grant and look into insurance issues. DCC will advise on choice of spreaders.

Citizens Advice Bureau: The CAB had applied for a grant from the Parish Council but the Council resolved not to support the CAB.

Checkers Store: A notice re the disposal of this community asset has been posted in the village. The Deadline is the 20th December.

Roads and Footpaths: Cllrs expressed continuing concerns that the gullies had not been cleared. Cllr Way and Steve Tucker DCC do a regular tour of the roads in the parish and a Cllr is welcome to tour with them to identify issues for the parish.

MDDC Grass Cutting Charges: These will rise in 2019/20 but the Council resolved to continue to use MDDC for grass cutting.

Snow Warden: Cllr Dicker has been appointed the snow warden and will assist the Teign Valley Practice with their severe weather plan.

Community Land Trust Affordable Housing: Cllr Endacott wished to be assured that the houses were being allocated to those with a local connection, as agreed. Cllr Heal said that he would look into this.

Cllr Coren reported on his work on MDDC Committees including the New Deal for Social Housing. He reported that he had now placed the requested road sign.

Cllr Heal reported on the progress of the Local Plan and the MDDC budget shortfall.

Cllr Way reported on residential homes in Devon for those with Learning Disabilities and the issues facing families that are disqualified from school transport because they lived just inside the qualifying distance.

That World War I Experience...

I will admit to having had some deep reservations about going along to this event, especially having toured the trenches and war graves in Belgium as a teenager shortly after the end of World War 2. Would it be too sombre and depressing? But I am so glad that I did when Chris and Marilyn Brook decided to put on a second performance in our church on November 3rd due to popular requests. Their detailed research into this subject provided the basis for a wonderfully entertaining and thought provoking commemoration.

The following is an apt description of the evening by a visitor to Cheriton Bishop who was present.

"The production was excellent in every respect and it was immediately obvious that a great effort had gone into researching the history of the families who had lost sons in that terrible conflict. It took us all back to those days and gave the audience an understanding of life a century ago.

A key feature in promoting that better understanding was the brilliant idea of reading out in chronological order all the official telegrams sent to the next of kin. Each one was a poignant moment, thrown into even sharper relief by the addition of further information about the fallen soldier and his family. As the production covered the whole of the 1914 - 1918 period, the telegrams were spread throughout the play and this heightened the tension. We can

only imagine what it must have been like for villagers a century ago when they saw the postman clutching a little yellow envelope. Who will it be today? Will he stop at my door?

Another powerful moment was the reading of Dulce et Decorum Est by Wilfred Owen. It was made all the more special by being read just a few hours before the centenary of the death of Owen. It was received as Owen must have intended, expressing his anger and disgust at the pointless and shocking loss of life. Such a contrast to the jingoistic pronouncements from government that led so many men to enlist in the armed forces.

The whole evening was a profound experience for the audience and one that differed from the usual Remembrance Day activities in that it was all about the people. That made it a very special evening, one that everyone present enjoyed and our thanks and congratulations go to all who took part in it."

In my humble opinion, Cheriton Bishop excelled themselves in paying this sincere tribute to the memory of those locally who made their final sacrifice for our nation. Lest we forget Betty Shepherd

Jobs for the Garden in December

This might not be the most appealing time of year to venture into the garden but there are always jobs to do! If you feel like some fresh air and exercise, leaves can be collected to make valuable leaf mould. Even if you don't have a dedicated compost bin, you can rake them under a large bush or tree and anchor them with some soil.

> Another rewarding job is to clear foliage from the lower stems of bamboo. This reveals the beautiful bright canes, often green or bright yellow. If you have a silver birch you could scrub the trunk to reveal startling white bark which is a striking feature of winter gardens.

You might however rather stay indoors, so don't forget how valuable plants are in the home. NASA spent millions of dollars experimenting with plants for spaceships so we know that certain plants are particularly good at purifying the air. Our homes are full of air pollutants which plants can absorb. Chrysanthemums are colourful and effective air cleansers, as well as the good old Spider Plant. Ficus are often seen in offices for good reason. The Peace Lily is an excellent and beautiful cleanser, as is Dracaena, the Dragon Plant. Incidentally, the red juice of this plant was traditionally used to colour violins!

REMINDERS TO START OFF WITH

It is assumed that by now all interested people who want to be a member of Neighbourhood Watch have registered. See October Newsletter. If by chance you have not and would like to be a member please contact Jean - <u>01647 24586</u>.

Devon and Cornwall Police are encouraging all members of our community to sign up to their Alert system. To do this type into your Internet search bar the following https:// alerts.dc.police.uk/Join This is a two way messaging community system operated by the police and helps them to connect with the communities, tells people what is happening in their area and allows them to respond directly with any information forwarded.

Scams continue on relentlessly with new ones being invented, the aim being to try to take money off us. So do not give them the chance by remembering these rules: Your bank or the police will never

- Phone or contact you out of the blue and ask for your pin or banking password, even by tapping them into your phone keypad.
- Ask you to withdraw money to hand over for safe keeping. Ask you to transfer money to a safe account for fraud reasons even if they say it is in your name.
- Send someone to your home to collect cash, pin, cards or cheque books.
- Ask you to purchase goods using your card and hand it over for safe keeping.

Be on your utmost guard to these types of requests.

Thefts of power tools from vans is taking place. Owners should remain vigilant, secure their property and report any suspicious activity to the police. Better still is not to leave any equipment in the van over night with a sign saying just that.

Unexpected fake TV Licensing refund emails are about. Do not click on links provided in the email as these lead to phishing websites designed to steal personal and financial details.

CLOSER TO HOME

With the nights drawing in and the dark early mornings, please take extra care when out walking or jogging in our unlit or poorly lit lanes. Help drivers to see you by wearing high visibility reflective clothing and reflective attachments to bags and back packs.

A burglary over the Christmas period is not what any of us want or at any time for that matter. Lock your home external doors and windows at all times even if only going out for a short while and the same goes for outbuildings and sheds. Don't advertise presents in the home where they can be seen from outside. Set the alarm if you are out for a long while or are away. Always put purchases out of sight in the locked car boot and not on the seats. This also applies when delivering or collecting anything. Hide your pin number when withdrawing money from cash machines, note that no one is watching or is close and if you think the machine has been interfered with do not use but report it to the store or bank.

We all need to be vigilant, observant and keep our eyes open to what's going on.

The Nativity Play

The part of the preparations for Christmas. Yet, we come to the nativity with mixed feelings. Perhaps, we have been involved in the production of the nativity play, all the children are off sick and we are not sure how we are going to manage! Maybe we look back with fondness and remember a time when we were playing an important part like Mary, Gabriel or a King, and it made a great impression of us. On the other hand, we may be emotionally scarred by not being given a leading role and had to settle for a minor role like a donkey or a sheep and still resent the person who got a better character. I guess many of us might have missed out on the whole thing and it is either a source of relief or a great sadness.

Putting aside personal involvement, I guess most of us have seen several nativity plays and have different memories of them. They often range from very simple with very young children to very accomplished with both adults and children. They can be set in a traditional way or a more contemporary way, yet we recognize the same underlying story. It is often a personal connection that makes one play stick in our minds. I always think of my father in law, as one of the kings in splendid robes bringing gold as a gift. The story often has amusing dimensions, some intentional and some unexpected. There must be a huge catalogue, characters dashing off to the loo, or really not getting on with their fellow actors, or spotting a parent and being completely absent in the middle of the play. The grumpy innkeeper, who has no room at the inn and would rather be safely tucked up in bed usually makes for a colourful character.

Yet, behind the happy outward story, there are some quite painful truths that are easily forgotten. Mary and Joseph were travelling home yet there is no welcome or mention of the family to help out. It was Mary's first child, she would have been very afraid of what was about



to happen to her. There is no mention of a midwife to help with the birth. Complications with births were life-threatening events for both mum and baby. When you understand some of the dangers involved and social isolation, the celebrations of the safe arrival of the baby and mother doing well resound from heaven to earth. The shepherds witness it first hand and are moved to find out more. The people of the East see a star and travel to find out more of what has happened.

If you see a nativity play this year, will it be just like a Christmas decoration that is got out every year and put away for the rest of the year? Or like the shepherds and wisemen will we be drawn into the story and be able to give thanks to God for Jesus Christ, who lived like us?
