### Flag Flying at Cheriton Bishop

After the sad death of Brian, who has been the first and phenomenally able Flag Master in the village (with great help from Pat), we needed someone to carry on the tradition that he enabled.

I stepped in for the interim and then James Hiett came forward and offered to take up the duties, which he is now faithfully fulfilling (initially for a few months to see how it works out with his family and work commitments).

It would be really good if we could have a list of backup people to help out when James, or myself, can't for some reason get to doing it. If you think you would like to help please give me a ring on 01647 24405 and I'll let you know what is involved. It is not a difficult job but it does require a dedication to the process and a feeling for the life and workings of our village!

Perhaps it would be helpful here to go over the reason for having the flagpole and particularly the flying of the green Devon flag.

The flagpole makes, in my mind, the statement that this is a live and cheerful village. It is good to see a flag waving against the background of the Moor when you enter our village from the East, and it makes the War Memorial area a more focal point of Cheriton Cross.

The Union Flag and St George Flag are flown on prescribed days, from a set list of dates, to celebrate national events. Not very many of them - and we can leave some out if they conflict with the Devon flag.

The Devon flag (as we don't have a CB flag) is flown to indicate that on the day of flying there is some event happening in the village that is posted in the Village Newsletter. It's a sort of wake up call to find out what's on, or for a large number of us to jog the memory.

### Election time again!

This month of June will be remembered for its general election on June 8<sup>th,</sup> - the second in just over two years and a complete surprise to most people.

It is funny how election dates do stick in the mind. As I was growing up I remember the winter of discontent 1978-79, the rubbish not being collected and piling up; the subsequent election of Margaret Thatcher in 1979 as the first female Prime Minister; the beginning of the Blair years when he was elected as Prime Minister in 1997; and lastly the predictions of a hung Parliament in 2015 with the Conservative party winning a majority. Added to that we have also had the Scottish Independence Referendum and EU Referendum. It has been a very busy three years in politics. It has been a time of great surprises in elections. The predictions for the EU Referendum and the American presidential election show that the opinion polls are not always a means of predicting the results, especially when it is very close. Elections can produce surprises and unexpected results. It will be interesting to see what emerges from the general election on June 8<sup>th.</sup>

"A nation's greatness is measured by how it treats its weakest members." Mahatma Ghandi.

One of the simple measures of how a society is developing is to look at whether the leadership and ruling people are doing much better than the weakest and poorest, and is the gap widening. It is not that long ago that we had the slogan 'we're all in this together'. There are echoes in the bible when Jewish society was prospering at the expense of the weakest. God judges the people for their neglect of the disadvantaged; the stranger, the widow and the children. It is no great surprise that Jesus champions the cause of the outcast, the poor and the ill. The bible also exposes the weakness of the leaders, who remain human and are just as likely to succumb to temptation; just like you or me. The most famous King was King Solomon, well renowned for his great wisdom and great riches, yet his personal life was much less wise.

The bible illustrates two key issues of government. The first is that we need to be careful of fulfilling human ambitions at the expense of God's guidance. The second is that leaders are human beings and capable of mistakes. The office does not make the person less fallible and more perfect. I do wonder what we shall remember of this election on  $8^{th}$  June 2017? One thing that I shall certainly remember is that Sunday  $4^{th}$  June is Pentecost, the birth of the church in Jerusalem and time when God's spirit empowered the apostles to spread the good news of Jesus Christ. We can pray that, whatever the election result is, those in office may be empowered to work for the good all the people not just for the better off.

Enforcement officers are increasing their work to eliminate nuisance issues such as chewing gum, cigarette butts and dog fouling in public areas. These are costly issues to resolve and the public is encouraged to avoid leaving mess in public areas.

Peter Heal will become the Chair of Mid Devon District Council as of next month.

The second week in May saw Year 6 sitting their SATs. Staff were most impressed by the children's "focus, resilience and determination to do their very best". I don't think the dragons were on the prowl that day. Class 1 have also been involved in cookery when they prepared, cooked and ate what has been described as 'a delicious vegetable stir fry'. Well done Class 1.

In the meantime, Class 2 have been scaling the heights of St Mary's church. As part of their history work, finding out the history of Cheriton Bishop, they spent an afternoon learning about St Mary's and

viewing the village from the top of the tower. Don't worry, none of them tried sky diving. Thanks go to Neil and Alan who conducted the children around the church.

Class 3 have shown that they are budding artists, developing their skills in silk painting. I'm told that the results are lovely. Well done Class 3. Class 4, on the other hand, have been learning about Shackleton and his exploits. They've also been building an igloo – yes, an igloo. It's actually made out of old plastic milk cartons. It has been quite a challenge!!

On the parentage side, the Open Classroom was well attended with the parents sharing their child's books with them. The Parents Forum was most useful in the field of communication, with both attendees ideas and emailed ideas being discussed. So, well done all round.

Moving on to the Dartmoor Railway, and the Dartmoor Rover service from Exeter to Okehampton restarted on 21<sup>st</sup> and will continue to run on Sundays until October. GWR have produced some attractive timetable leaflets for this service. Interestingly, there are two versions, one aimed at passengers wanting to go to Exeter from Okehampton, and the other aimed at passengers wanting to use the trains to get to Okehampton and Dartmoor from Exeter.
