# **CHERITON BISHOP PARISH COUNCIL**

Cheriton Bishop Parish Council met on the 12<sup>th</sup> February 2018 at 7.30 at Spalding Hall, Cheriton Bishop.

Road Between Hask Lane and Pitton Cross: Cllr Way confirmed that this would be repaired in the next financial year as DCC had allocated money for this.

**Yeoford Road Housing Site:** The Chair reported that there would be a Public Drop-In Session at the Village Hall on the 13<sup>th</sup> March from 3.00 – 7.00 pm.

**Village Spring Clean 14<sup>th</sup> April:** Cllrs Endacott and Vooght reported that the Clean-up would start at 9.30 at the Cross. All are welcome to come and assist, tea and refreshments will be provided. If you would like an area tackled on that day please let the Council know!

**Planning Applications:** 18/00043 is an application for change of use of land and building from agricultural use to use class B8 (storage) and B1 (office). It was resolved that the Council was neutral with respect to this application but expressed concerns about the additional traffic resulting from the business and asked that Planning Conditions might reflect a contribution towards the wear and tear on the road. The Council also noted that it was intended that a second unit be let out and asked that a Planning Condition be placed on the amount of extra movement of traffic as a result (Proposed Cllr Westcott).

17/00444 is an application that has been refused by MDDC. It was to change the use and convert an ancillary storage building to a dwelling at Medland Manor Cottage. The Council had been notified that an appeal had been lodged, and resolved that it did not have anything further to add to its original response.

#### Planning Decisions notified:

17/02007 to erect a two storey extension, single storey extension with balcony over and garage at Little Thorne had been approved with conditions as filed.

0583/17 to demolish two chimneys porch and erection of extension at Three Gates had been refused.

Archiving Village Records: The Council will now store a cabinet containing Village Records at the Village Hall at a cost of £2 per month.

**Defibrillator:** The Council has been awarded a Lottery Grant of £4216 to purchase a defibrillator which will be housed in the adopted telephone box. Cllr Vooght is continuing to work with the Community Heartbeat Trust to take this forward.

#### Roads and Footpaths in the Parish:

Current concerns are: the lorries going down to Hittisleigh Mill and getting stuck; the adoption of the footpath from Hescane Park; and the naming of the new road at the Yeoford site. All of these will be discussed further at the March Council meeting.

# From the Rector

## March Madness ending in foolishness?

The month of March sees several endings and beginnings. It is the end of winter and the beginning of Spring. It is the end of Greenwich mean time and the beginning of British Summer time. The days become longer than the nights. It is the end of the season of Lent; Saturday 31<sup>st</sup> March is the last day of Lent. It feels like there is a big change in March. In reality these are only calendar dates and not observations on what is really happening in nature. A prolonged cold snap can delay the beginning of Spring or a warm spell can accelerate the beginning of Spring; only time and temperature will tell us what is really happening around us. However, the light just keeps on changing and it feels like we are emerging from dark evenings and dark early mornings. We are no longer leaving the house in the dark and returning home after dark. The return of light in the evenings allows us to do things after work in the daylight.

For many people, the end of Lent is not something you notice unless you have given something up for Lent. Then maybe Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> April will be when you take back that which you have given up. I cannot remember when Easter was last on the 1<sup>st</sup> April, I went to look it up and found it was 1956, no wonder I cannot remember it! This year Ash Wednesday coincided with Valentine's day and Easter coincides with April Fool's day. Although I am not sure that there is any real significance to April Fool's day, except a bit of fun at other people's expense. Couple this to Mad as a March hare and Spring takes on a new mad meaning! This year March contains twenty-seven days of Lent, the other thirteen days of Lent belong to February. You can see most of Lent is contained within March. The only break from Lent is in the four Sundays of March. The biggest break in Lent is Mothering Sunday, which is 11<sup>th</sup> March, unsurprisingly this equates roughly to the midpoint of Lent. Mothering Sunday is also called refreshment Sunday. There is a sense of getting half way through Lent and having a day off from Lent to prepare ourselves for the last half of Lent which runs up to the end of March.

As we have seen we are making the move into new life in Spring, as we shake off the shackles of winter. The same can be said of the promise of new life with Easter. As we travel through March and Lent, we cannot help but feel the shadow of the cross and death lingering around Jesus and his disciples. It comes to a dreadful climax as Jesus is crucified on Good Friday on 30<sup>th</sup> March. It really appears that death has the upper hand, the disciples and Jesus' followers are despondent and lost without their teacher and friend. Thankfully, the story does not end with death and defeat. It is transformed by God and made good again.

#### **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**



It may be that time in your household when personal finances and options are being considered. A fraudster may cold call out of the blue suggesting transferring all of your pension savings to a better deal or one with guaranteed returns to be considered. The rule is, think carefully about the offer and if you did not ask for the call then hang up the phone as it's likely to be a scam.

If in doubt call Pension Advisory Service 0300 123 1047 or see their website. If you have been scammed call Action Fraud 0300 123 2040. Protecting savings visit The Pensions Regulator website 'Pension Scams'.

Another scam that's going around at the moment is where callers ostensibly from BT OpenReach are making contact with residents. They tell people that every time they log into their computer they are being infected. They ask for passwords to 'help' you access your computer or request bank details for a payment to fix the so-called problem. End the call straight away without giving any information.

Use Telephone Preference Service to try to stop nuisance calls.

A new scam, purporting to be from HMRC, is where a phone caller tells people that they owe large amounts of Tax. They say the best way to pay off the amount is by purchasing digital vouchers and gift cards including Apple's iTunes cards for the amount. Scammers request the redemption codes and you are thinking you are paying off what's owed, but in fact the scammer is going away with your money. Sadly, scammers can use intimidation to try to get the information. Again, end the call straight away.

In this area people have received an email saying they are due a refund of several hundred pounds from HMRC. The scam requests financial details so that the money can be paid into the persons account but what in fact happens is that money is withdrawn by the scammer as they now have account details. The email heading is not correct for HMRC and gives it away.

There is so much financial fraud going on that it is for all of us to be on our guard at all times. We can think we would never fall for a scam but the truth is that the scammers are getting better and cleverer in trying to relieve us of our details and ultimately our cash. Genuine banks, HMRC and other organisations will never contact you by email to request pin numbers, passwords or to suggest moving money to another account. Do not give personal or financial details away. Never click on a link in an unexpected email or text. Uninvited contacts should be questioned and instead you should contact the company using a known email or phone number if you want to check.

Lastly, the Devon & Cornwall Police & Crime Commissioner wants to increase the number of officers by 100 to bring it back to 3000. The Government wants to speed the process up. Usually Government provides 63% of the total police budget, the rest coming from council tax known as precept. The Government would allow a larger increase for precept for 2018/19 by up to £12.00 per year or 23 pence per week for a Band D property. The result would be around £7m additional income to be used for front line policing. Have your say under Policing Precept Poll where there is a link. Other property rating bands would increase/decrease pro rata.

## Who are we? And, What do we do?

We are a group of local people who meet on a regular basis to help to maintain a friendly and positive interaction between the Doctors and Staff in our surgery and all their patients. We can act as a 'middle man' to pass information back and forth and to be a portal for general issues to be discussed and communicated. We are NOT here to take any part in personal or private health issues between individual patients and their doctors. Those should be dealt with directly through the surgery.

From all that your PPG hears, we, the community are very proud and very much appreciate the fact that our practice has the OUTSTANDING status awarded by the Clinical Commissioning Group, and that they are second in the UK for accessibility. I constantly hear comments such as 'I wouldn't move because of the service our surgery offers'. 'My family and friends can wait anywhere from 3-14 days for an appointment'. 'The doctors and nurses here are wonderful'.

#### So how can we help each other?

DNA has two meanings in the world of health professionals -

DNA = the building blocks of life; the carrier of genetic information

but it also means

DNA = Did Not Attend, Did Not Arrive, Did Not Appear for a booked appointment.

This second meaning is the main cause of a massive amount of wasted time, energy and finances in the NHS, which has a bump-on effect on the care of all of us.

Here are Cheriton we have our own difficulty with this problem and it is mainly with Physiotherapy Appointments. We are blessed to have an on-site physio who attends at Cheriton Bishop for 2 sessions a week on a Wednesday. The waiting time for these appointments is about 6 weeks and we have a neverending list of those needing treatment. Unfortunately, there is a high percentage of DNAs despite our sending text messages *and* giving a phone call prior to each booked appointment.

So PLEASE, if you or anyone you know has a booked appointment that you do not need any more or that you cannot keep for some reason, then it is extremely important that you are kind enough to free it up for someone else who is in need. Thank you so much for your help with this.

#### \*\*\*\*\*

The Dispensary is one of our greatest assets, and to save time and money we have:

## Helpful Tips from our Dispensary

• Don't forget **to bring some cash or your debit/credit card or an in-date exemption card** with you whenever you come to the doctor or to collect medication. We can't let you have prescriptions without one of these.

• **Always check** your medication before you leave the building when you collect a prescription – there is a seat just inside the door to the dispensary at Cheriton, which is ideal for this. Do you have everything you need? Do you have anything you don't need? Do you have anything that should not have been given to you? The dispensary cannot re-use ANY medicines that are returned once you have taken them away. They all have to be destroyed because of prescribing rules.

• **Acute** medication is what we call any medicine that is not on a repeat prescription printout [for example antibiotics, even though you may have had them at a previous time]. The dispensary cannot give

you these medicines unless you have spoken to a doctor and the doctor will then let the dispensary have the necessary paperwork to issue them to you. There is not always a doctor present on site, particularly on a Friday afternoon so if you think you might be going to need some medicine that is not a repeat then please try to contact reception earlier in the day. Also, we may not have these items in stock. Items that have to be ordered in can take a day or so to be delivered – we are a dispensary not a pharmacy! Please don't ask us to do the impossible! [If all else fails there is always Docs on Call at the weekends and they would, if necessary, issue a paper prescription for you to take to a chemist.]

I do hope this article has helped you to understand a little of the working day in the life of our practice. We, as your Patient Participation Group, will endeavour to bring you some news from the practice on a regular basis. If there is a subject you think we can maybe help with, please do not hesitate to get in touch with myself or any of the group members, whose contact details can be found below.

In the meantime I leave you with information of yet another great service that is now available at our surgery at Cheriton Bishop – The CAB.

# No 199 March 2018



Well, it's half term, isn't it? This has meant that I have had no silly worries about finding a parking space in the lane when I come home at 'the wrong time'! Such a simple thing can make life so much more acceptable. At lunchtime today I walked up to the shop and back – didn't even use my walking stick – and it really looks as though nature has moved into a higher gear and into spring. Right, on then to school matters: I mentioned Year 5 and their Forest School Sessions. They had their last session on 29<sup>th</sup> January and the mantle was taken up by Year 4 on 30<sup>th</sup> January. Class 2 have taken the topic 'Down Under' quite seriously and have been working away making boomerangs, yes, boomerangs, from artrock. They decorated the boomerangs with an Aboriginal design. They were going to have a test throw in early February. I wonder if they performed correctly and came back to the thrower? Their next task in their Down Under topic was more study of Australia and the production of Anzac Biscuits. OK, hands up all those who know what the initials

A N Z A C mean? All those who said Australian and New Zealand Army Corps can pat themselves on the back. They formed a large percentage of the British Empire forces at the Gallipoli landings during WWI and suffered horrendous casualties.

I digress. At the end of January, the school purchased a set of pedometers. What on earth would they be for, I hear you ask. Well, on a trial basis, Class 3 have been using them to find out, and increase, the number of steps taken during their Daily Mile. The maths side to this venture includes the calculation of the total number of steps taken and the average number of steps per child! The other classes will be doing their own calculations in due course.

7<sup>th</sup> February saw Years 1 and 2 taking part in the Multi-Skills Festival joining the other schools in the Crediton area at Queen Elizabeth School. The children got involved in a *'wide range of activities from volley-ball to dance, batting skills to balancing'*. It was great fun and the children acquitted themselves well and were very well behaved.

Class 1 became medieval Kings and Queens for the day on 9<sup>th</sup> February. I've seen a photograph of them dressed in their finery and they really look an imposing lot. As well as dressing up they got involved in cooking, dancing and playing medieval games. Active history in play! Well done to the parentage who, I am quite sure, had a lot to do with the making of costumes.

In the meantime, Class 3 have been learning all about volcanoes. There was a purpose behind this activity. They built a volcano then, using their science skills, they created an explosion! *"This then fed into their literacy work on explaining how things work."* This is all fascinating stuff.

Now, let's look at the calendar. The first thing to note is The Big Schools' Bird Watch. During this week all the classes will participate and start the week by making bird feeders. Later in the week each class will be given the opportunity to spend an hour watching the birds around the school, reporting on what they have seen. Hopefully there will have been sufficient donations of birdseed to carry through this project.

Now here's something a bit different. Classes 1, 2 and 3 will be Junk Modelling. Class 1 making Tudor houses; Class 2 didgeridoos; and Class 3 making skeletons. Parentage are asked to supply the following junk to fit in with the requirements of the classes:

Class 3 - cardboard, egg boxes, yoghurt pots, tubes etc

It will be most interesting to see the outcome of the Junk Modelling!!

The month of February ends with Book Week and on 1<sup>st</sup> March the children will be dressing up as characters from books. This normally produces some fairly imaginative portrayals of such characters!

We finally seem to be heading towards Spring. It is lovely to see snowdrops in the garden and daffodils starting to appear. We are very excited about a new art installation in the Library this year inspired by the incredible architecture created by Edwin Lutyens when designing Castle Drogo. This feels appropriate as we are now in our final year of building work.

We have just completed a wonderful First World War project in Drewsteignton as part of the Devon Remembers Heritage project. We had such a lovely warm welcome from many people when we hand delivered copies of original WW1 postcards – even being invited in for tea and biscuits! It may have been helped by our original costumes of postman and postmistress. It was wonderful to see so many people from Chagford History Society at the talk and display that took place on 29 January. It really was a very moving and poignant event, finishing with the Chagford Bell Ringers completing 100 peals of the church bells. I must confess to getting a bit misty eyed.

We have another First World War project underway at the moment too, which is part of a national project called Away From the Western Front. We are now busy planning for another year of archaeology. There is so much going on.

We have changed the dates of our Moistown dig so that we do it all in one go instead of spreading it out and doing a week in spring and two weeks in the summer. We decided that putting up the tents and then taking them down twice and covering and uncovering the trenches twice wasn't a good use of time and energy so we will be digging from the 30<sup>th</sup> June to the 25<sup>th</sup> July. This also covers the Council for British Archaeology festival on the 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> July, for which we will be doing our bit. As well as the opportunity to have a look around our site and find out more from the exhibition, there is the chance for visitors to have a go at digging. We have a small group of people now starting to work on the thousands of finds that we have, mostly pottery sherds. We have to do a crash course in how to identify the different types of pottery. We have found some pieces dating from the Saxo-Norman period and quite a bit of later medieval as well as the ubiquitous blue and white ware! So have a lot to get our heads around. Of course, we aren't the only ones doing archaeology and we hope to have some involvement in work that will be going on in the National Trust estate at Fingle Woods. Information will be out on that later in the year on the Castle Drogo website and the Woodland Trust website.

Finally, this year is Ace's 21<sup>st</sup> birthday, so we will be having a party in July to celebrate that.
