Pavements are swept, kerbs adjoining the road get the same treatment, hedges are trimmed and over-hanging branches are cut back and cleared away.

The system is designed to allow people who register to choose the type of information they would like to receive concerning crime and anti-social behaviour, witness appeals, crime prevention, community events and local good news.

Subscribers will not be notified about every crime or incident that happens in their community. Our aim is to send relevant information where we believe to do so will reduce the opportunity for crime and anti-social behaviour or will help Devon and Cornwall Police solve a crime. - Missing people

- Burglary, theft

HOOPERTON HONEY

During this lovely summer the bees at Hooperton Farm have been very busy. There has been a profusion of flowers of all sorts which has resulted in various shades of nectar being gathered. Some is darker than usual and we think that came from Chestnut trees in the area. Most of it is a lighter shade of gold produced by the abundance of flowers in the fields and hedgerows .

Honey has many health benefits. For helping with hay fever, the more locally sourced the better.

The bees have plenty of stores to sustain them through the winter, and the surplus is available at £5 a 454g (1lb) jar - the same price as previous years. It is on sale in the "shed" in the drive at Hooperton.

PPG Blog for November

Well, we've given you a bit of a break after our edifying full page on GDPR policy back in July! But now we are back with some more news from the Surgery.

eConsult online service

For those of us with internet access, we now have an additional and alternative way of contacting our doctor. There is a new online facility to enable you to ask simple questions of **your own** doctor without the need to make an appointment or phone the surgery. You start the process by going onto the Surgery website: **www.cheritonbishoppractice.co.uk**. A little way down the page you will see a blue box

- click on 'Get Started'

You can ask for specific advice, general advice or administrative advice in addition to checking out symptoms/conditions in the list of topics lower down this page.

When you have decided which type of help you need, click the relevant box and follow the simple stages completing the information requested. You will be asked for your personal details and for details of all your current medication. This then leads you to a box where you can write in your question.

Here are some examples:

e.g. My gout is becoming progressively worse. Would it be ok to increase the dose of my medication and, if so, by how much?

e.g. My back pain has returned, any chance of a physio appointment?

e.g. I need another sick note for work please, up to next Friday.

This then enables your doctor to consider the best step forward for you. Your doctor will respond within 2 working days to your email address or by telephone.

Not only will this help you but it will also hopefully help the surgery and doctors by reducing the number of booked appointments and telephone calls. Let's all give it a try!

And finally, Let's not forget ... The Community Garden

which is available to patients who would like the joy of being outside, maybe a spot of light gardening or just a space for contemplation. The centenary of the end of the World War One.

This year Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day coincide on 11th November. It could not have been imaginable on Monday 11th November 1918 the full significance of the ceasefire at 11 am. There had been several days of negotiation before the ceasefire document was signed at 5.10am just under six hours before the 11am cease-fire. It is reckoned that over 10,000 men were killed, wounded or went missing on the last day of the war. It is a startling reminder of the cost in human lives during the First World War. An interesting fact, for the French soldiers killed on the 11/11/1918, their graves give a date of 10/11/1918. Two explanations are given. The given date 10th November is clearly before the war ended and there could be no dispute over the entitlement to a war pension. Alternatively, the government wanted to avoid the embarrassment of the deaths on the last day of the war. Remembrance Sunday became the National Remembrance Day after the end of World War Two. However, after the 50th anniversary of the end of the Second World War, both Armistice Day and Remembrance were celebrated as a nation. It seems fitting that they should coincide with the centenary.

It was only a couple of years ago that I came across the term 'Thankful Villages'. These were villages where all the soldiers who left the village for the great war returned home. It was thought to be 32 villages, it has now been researched and updated to 52. We might think of these places being able to celebrate their good fortune. The opposite was true, this was actually a source of embarrassment and shame. It is worth remembering that these villages were surrounded by thousands of communities devastated by the loss of young men and fathers, who had made the ultimate sacrifice. The thankful villages appeared not to have sacrificed anything or paid the price. The shame lasted decades, these people could not celebrate their good fortune in the face of other people's grief. These communities, on the whole, had a



self-imposed silence and censorship. Today, we call it "survivors' guilt", we would have some understanding of the guilt and shame they would experience. We also suggest that all the returning soldiers would also experience posttraumatic stress. Those thankful villages would have had to manage two very difficult psychological conditions whilst really being obliged to be thankful or grateful! Surprisingly, there are no thankful villages in Devon, given you would need a small community for a thankful village. There is one in Cornwall, one in Dorset, nine in Somerset.

These thankful villages remind us that although the conflict may be over, the physical, emotional and psychological injuries continue for years and possibly a lifetime. We remember all these people afflicted by conflict. We also need to keep caring and supporting them for years to come. That is why the work of organizations like The Royal British Legion and Help for Heroes are so important and need our ongoing support. Whilst we remember all who died, we need to keep caring for those still bearing the injuries and scars of war.

Snippets From the Classroom and Beyond No 206 November 2018



I don't know if you will recall it, but, during the Bicentennial year of the Battle of Trafalgar in 2005 the arrival and transmission of the news of that great battle was marked by retracing the route that Lieutenant John Richards Lapenotière, the Captain of HMS PICKLE, took after his arrival in Falmouth on 4th November 1805. He was tasked with carrying the dispatches reporting the battle and its outcome from



Admiralty in London. Plaques commemorating his journey were placed along the route at all the sites where he was known to have changed horses for his chaise. The closest one to Cheriton Bishop is in Crockernwell just opposite the erstwhile 'Judge Jefferies' pub. So the news of Trafalgar with the great victory against the combined fleet of the French

and Spanish Navies together with the news of the death of

Admiral Lord Nelson, one of Britain's greatest heroes, must have passed through the village of Cheriton Bishop and one can only conjecture on what the locals must have thought at the time. Nelson was popular throughout the country and his death would have been felt quite deeply by all his countrymen.



It must be at this stage that you are wondering why on earth he is wittering on about Nelson and the Battle of Trafalgar. The actual battle took place on 21st October 1805 and this weekend marks yet another year's passing since the victory. Celebratory dinners and entertainments will be held throughout the land. What a contrast, then, to that other, very sombre, anniversary that we are marking in this year of 2018 - the passing of one hundred years since the armistice marking the end of that awful conflict we know as the First World



War. Years of horrendous bloodshed and hardship made sure that there was nothing to celebrate. This latter conflict really did involve the people of the whole country with a whole generation of menfolk providing the backbone of the fighting services. Very few families were untouched by the lists of casualties that were the result of this horrendous slaughter. Earlier this year, in March, a small production called 'That World War 1 Experience' was enacted in our church. Nothing illustrated more the effect that the war had on Cheriton Bishop than to hear the latest telegrams from the front listing the latest casualties, all to families whose names are all familiar to the rest of us. Interspersed with the news from the front, were the reports of home activities, almost banal by their subject matter. As you will see by notices in this copy of the Parish Newsletter, 'That World War 1 Experience' is being staged for one more performance in our church on 3rd November. I would certainly recommend to all those who can to go and see the production It really does bring home to the audience the effect that that war had on the home front and it adds poignancy to the list of the dead which we read out at the cross

on Remembrance Day every year. There could be no greater contrast than that between celebrating victory at Trafalgar and the commemoration of the signing of the Armistice in 1918. I should, perhaps, add that all the above ramblings are my own thoughts on the subject and I leave it to the reader to interpret facts as they find them for themselves!
