Summary of the Parish Council meetings of 10th September

Planning Applications: 18/00934/5 Erection of single storey extension, replacement of glazed frame and roof over courtyard, alterations to internal doors, renewal of rainwater goods and porch to east elevation: the Council resolved that it was neutral in respect of this application.

Planning Decisions: the Council noted that the following applications had been approved by MDDC: CLU18/00755: CLU for the existing use of a dwelling in breach of agricultural occupancy for a period in excess of 10 years at Thorne Cross Farm.

18/00832: Change of use of land for the siting of a temporary agricultural workers' mobile home at Greenacres.

18/00547: Conversion of 1st Floor of existing barn to provide additional living accommodation for house and erection of car port at Sunnyvale.

18/01050: Certificate of Lawfullness for the proposed erection of garden studio at 2 Glebelands.

Dartmoor National Park Authority had given permission for the following application with conditions as filed: 0296/18 Single storey extension at Three Gates. The Authority had also refused permission for 0131/18 Farm Workers Dwelling at Jervis Farm.

Defibrillator: Cllr Vooght reported that the Defibrillator Information session was on 27th September in the Village Hall.

Whiddon Down Farm Shop Revised Planning Application: Two members of the public attended the Council meeting to speak against the application. Cllr Milton had attended the Drewsteignton Meeting that had considered the revised application and reported on the objections raised by the 60 people who attended. Councillors were concerned that they had not been advised or consulted about this revised application. The Council resolved to object to the application on the same grounds that they had objected to the previous application.

DCC Traffic Regulation Amendment Order: The Council had been consulted about a proposed traffic amendment order for a no waiting area in the parish. Cllrs were astonished to find that they had not been consulted previously or alerted to the recent site visit by Highways. As far as they were aware no local people affected by the proposed order had been consulted including the Village Hall and the Surgery. Cllrs felt the proposed order would not solve the problem but just move it elsewhere. Cllr Coren who is a member of the HATOC Committee that issued the consultation said he was not aware of this proposal and agreed to take up the matter. The Clerk was asked to write to HATOC to confirm the council objected to the proposal.

Vacancy for Parish Councillor: Cllr Gill Westcott has resigned from the Council and the September meeting was her last meeting. Cllr Vooght thanked her for all her hard work for the parish. The Clerk will put up a Notice of Vacancy on Sep 11th. If there is no request for an election the Council will be allowed to co-opt a person to the vacancy. The Clerk will put up notices about this. Applications should be sent to the Clerk.

Autumn Tidy Up 6th October: Cllrs Vooght and Endacott will lead the autumn tidy up starting at 9.30 at the Stone Cross. All welcome. Any parishioners with ideas about jobs that need tackling in the parish please contact the Clerk or Councillors.

Storing Parish Council Equipment: The Council is considering renting a lock up garage to store Parish Council equipment.

Crediton Town Council Building: The building has been sold and the Town Council has to move out. The Council considered requests to support a petition and to write to MDDC in protest but declined to do so as they did not think they had all the facts and because the decision was made.

Devon Air Ambulance: Cllrs provided details of a local landing site that could be considered.

Clir Coren reported on some current enforcement issues. He referred to MDDC no longer using landfill. He said some people still did not recycle and Clirs suggested ways of tackling this for Clir Coren to take back to MDDC.

Gardening jobs for October ...

- Mulch the Veg patch. Farmyard manure is best for this task.
- Prune tall shrubs such as buddleja and lavateras to about half their height
- Prune climbing roses and get them tied in before autumn gales pick up.
- But don't prune your hedges yet! Hedges are full of berries, nuts and seeds which sustain our wildlife through the winter. Early March is the best time for hedge trimming.
- Clear fallen leaves from lawns but leave some in the borders for overwintering beatles and bugs.
- Raise the height of your lawn mower's cutting blades and mow less frequently. Grass cut too short over the winter will not stand up to the poorer weather conditions, and will be more likely to become infested with moss and weeds
- Tidy your garden pond and remove submersible pumps to store them over the winter
- If you're planning to move any shrubs over the winter, start preparing the new border now
- plant containers for winter colour, think heathers, evergreen shrubs, and cyclamen.
- Cut back perennials that have finished flowering to discourage diseases
- · Lift and divide perennials between now and spring
- Plant tulip bulbs and spring flowering bulbs
- · Empty your compost bin and use the compost for mulching or digging in

And then sit back and enjoy the changing season!


Doctor Peter Whitehead will give us a talk on emergency first aid particularly focussed towards walkers on the Moor and in other exposed and remote areas.

Peter is currently working in the emergency department at Nottingham Hospital and is a keen walker, indeed many will already have met him on some of our walks.

He has recently returned from seven weeks in the Amazon rain forest as a medic on expeditions, and this year he has walked to Machu Pichu; on the glaciers in Iceland; and kayaked on the Norwegian Fjords.

For further interest he is currently studying for a Masters in extreme medicine at Exeter University. He also lectures on advanced life support to other Medics.

He has kindly offer to talk about some of the risks we face and how to treat and prevent them. Additionally we will have a selection of safety equipment on show and advice on what to carry and how to use it.





Misreading the signs

When I am passing signs sometimes I misunderstand what is being communicated to me. This week I have driven past the crematoria in Exeter. There was a new sign advertising something at 11am in September. I had passed the sign before I could fully read the rest of it. I thought it was strange that they were advertising free slots in September for funerals at 11am. I wondered who would benefit from this information. I could not imagine anyone thinking it was a good time to die because there was free space for a funeral! Nor could I imagine someone who was recently bereaved feeling a great sense of relief that there would be space at 11am in September for a funeral. I thought the whole thing rather strange and even a little sinister. On my way home I passed the same sign and I realised it was advertising the annual remembrance service in September; a time to remember those who have died in the last year. It made much more sense than my first wrong impressions. Yet, we often have to make quick judgements on very little information and often we make quite good decisions on very little information. Although like me, it is all too easy to go down completely the wrong path with a little imagination and get it spectacularly wrong.

Jesus sometimes tells his disciples to look at the signs of the times and to respond directly to them. In Jesus' time, people were looking around at what was happening in their culture and society and feeling worried that things were not quite right. There were concerns around national identity, an occupying army and that people were being unfairly treated. If we were to look at the signs of our times then the list of worries would not be too dissimilar. I think perhaps I would want to add anxieties and loneliness to the list. I wonder what is your



reading of the signs of the times and what is worrying you about them. Jesus would urge us that part of reading the signs of the times would be an acknowledgement that working with God would offer hope rather than despair. Yet God is not able to transform our world in isolation. It is more of a cooperation in which we become part of the solution rather than spectators hoping that someone else will sort things out. It is easy to say that the problems are too big and anything that we might try and do will have little or no impact. In one way we are right, in isolation it is hard to make any difference. However, when people work collectively then things can start to change.

Being able to read the signs is just one part of it. What will we do with the information? Will we moan and grumble to anyone who will listen? Or will we find something we can do in the hope of changing our world for the good. Is this not the very same thing we hope God will do, but with us helping.

On the Dartmoor Railway, the summer Sundays-only trains from Exeter have come to the end of their timetable and heritage services are beginning to ease off. There is one more 'Cream tea' special to go but October will eventually see the end of services until the Christmas trains start running again.

Latest update from Castle Drogo

Hi everyone.

As I write this update, we are just reaching the end of the school summer holidays. It has been super busy at Castle Drogo and it has been lovely to see so many people enjoying themselves. I have particularly loved the 2 outdoor theatre performances this summer – Hound of the Baskervilles and The Railway Children. It was great chatting with so many local people at these events too so hello to all of those I managed to catch up with.

You may remember me writing about a drama, music and history project I was doing with Okehampton College as part of a national project called 'Away From the Western Front'. This is now in its final phase with a small exhibition on display in the Chapel which tells the First World War story of William George Arscott, a local lad from Drewsteignton, who was a labourer at Castle Drogo who ended up in Salonika, Greece as part of the Devonshire Regiment. The display includes footage of a performance by Okehampton College students which is incredibly moving. It will be in the Chapel until the end of September so I hope you get to see it.

Finally, I have heard that tree felling work will be taking place in Rectory Woods from early September for 4 - 6 weeks. This area of wood is a plantation on ancient woodland (PAWS) and the thinning work will promote a more natural woodland long term. Echoes of Wartime

A unique Anglo German theatre production, called *Echoes of Wartime*, will be staged in Crediton this October to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War.

The show is based on true stories about people from Crediton and the German town of Fulda (the town in central Germany where St Boniface is buried). Nowadays the towns are closely linked by a strong



bond of friendship. But during the Great War of 1914-1918 they were mortal enemies.

"We want to discover and share the similarities as well as the differences between the experiences in Fulda and in Crediton during the First World War", said Anthony Richards, Artistic Director of the project. "We've heard much about the fighting in trenches, but our interest is in the impact of the war on ordinary people living in our two towns at an extraordinary time."

The production is the result of three years collaboration between the Devon-based

theatre company Common Players and two companies in Fulda, Theatre Mittendrin and FTF Theatre.

Much of the research for the project was done by local writer, Mary Stephenson, who delved into

archives and read diaries and newspaper articles in both Crediton and Fulda, to learn about the experiences and thoughts of real people during the war.

"Both the English and Germans believed that God was on their side," said Mary. "Amazingly I discovered that the German national anthem at the outbreak of WW1 shared the same tune as our own."

A core of professional actors from both countries will be joined by local performers and musicians, including students from QE Academy, to present a theatrical event involving drama, music and dance. It will be performed first at Crediton
