Solar Panels Opportunity

The Fuel Poverty Campaign takes on board that while many in financial stress can't afford to heat their homes, they also want energy produced in a way compatible with a liveable future. It undertakes casework and campaigns both for more green energy and for more home insulation that cuts bills and fair tariffs for small users.


If you're thinking about installing (or installing more) solar photovoltaic (PV) panels, now's a good time to check out the opportunity to be part of Devon's solar panel bulk buying scheme 'Solar Together'. Solar panels are a good investment, saving money on your electricity bills, and they also help reduce CO2 emissions and create a sustainable future.



Besides producing cheaper electricity for home use, solar panels can be combined with storage systems to allow flexibility in the time you can use the energy generated. Many Devon homes have an awkward roof, are listed or in a conservation area – but groundmounted arrays are also possible if you have space.

Register Now

Until October 5th there's a oneoff chance to join the bulk buying scheme. Mid Devon is one of the local council areas participating in the Devon Solar Together



project. Residents are eligible to register their interest for free.

With a large potential group of buyers, the scheme will then seek the best price possible for panels from installers that are vetted for quality and service.

Households registered will then receive a personal recommendation for a solar panel system, with a cost estimate including installation and extended warranties. You're then free to choose whether to go ahead and install the panels.

Emissions Reduced

We have all heard how carbon emissions reduced dramatically during the height of lockdown. In Devon, emissions reduced by 23% at the peak of the lockdown restrictions. But, these reductions often came with the caveat that emissions would rise again once lockdown had eased. Although this has proved true in some cases, a new study suggests some of these savings could continue.

New analysis by the Carbon Trust found that more than half of the emissions reductions experienced during April and May have persisted as lockdown conditions have eased, with carbon emissions by mid-August remaining 14% lower than at the same time the previous year. A poll commissioned by Lloyds Banking Group suggests that some of the emissions reductions sparked by the lockdown could be here to stay.

A third of UK adults said they are more likely to take action to reduce their carbon footprint now than they were before the pandemic.

Just over 40% of respondents said that they now intend to limit travel by car, compared to just 31% before the pandemic, the YouGov survey found.

In The Garden

Preparing for Frosty Nights Ahead

October is a month of change in the garden. There can be glorious sunny days which highlight the splendid blooms of Cannas and Dahlias. But we know that there could be a frosty night which turns them all black and mushy. You have to be prepared to protect tender perennials or take them inside but we want to enjoy them for as long as possible.

Leaves will be falling and they should be regarded as precious compost material. They can be put into wire mesh containers or plastic bags pierced with holes. Last year's leaves might be ready now, as a light crumbly leaf mould, to spread around Spring flowering plants.

It is a good idea to net over ponds so that not too many leaves fall in and start silting up the water. Clear away any dead or yellowing foliage on the water plants before winter and remove excessive pondweed.

October is an ideal time to plant new trees and shrubs. The soil is still warm enough to promote root growth but should be damp enough that you don't have to keep watering. You can buy bare root plants from October, especially useful if you are planning a new hedge. These are cheaper and easier to transport. Most plants should be planted at the level they were in the soil or pot. Both roses and clematis however, need to be planted deeper, about 15cm,(6 inches) below ground level. This helps to prevent roses producing suckers and gives clematis a chance to recover should it succumb to clematis wilt.

Lift and divide perennials now. This can rejuvenate old clumps and gives you good plant material to put elsewhere in your garden or give to friends.

By the end of October you will probably have to lift Dahlias. Cut off the growth, shake soil off the tubers and place them upside down in a dry place. I then cover mine with fleece if cold threatens.

If you are storing apples, remember to only try and keep perfect ones with no bruises or blemishes. They will then remind you of your autumn crop deep into winter.

The Woodland Trust is offering everybody in the UK the chance to plant a tree. They're giving away hundreds of thousands of trees to schools and communities.

Across the UK, schools and all sorts of community groups including resident associations, sports clubs, parish councils, scouts, guides and many more are eligible. The organisation doesn't have to be officially registered, but it must be a not-for-profit. You could even set up a group for the purpose of planting, but you must be not-for-profit. is willing to take on the planning, planting and care of the saplings.

They offer a wide variety of trees depending on the type of space you have to plant your trees. Some of the categories include: Hedge; Copse; Wild harvest; Year-round colour; Working wood; Wild wood and Urban trees.

Current applications are for trees to be delivered in March 2021.

Church Messages

Autumn Colours

As I write it is still very dry and hot and some of the trees have yellow leaves, or have lost their leaves because there is a shortage of water. Nearly all of us are enchanted by the vivid reds and browns that emerge from the leaves. I know several people who travel to forests to see the Autumn colours. For many years I wondered how the trees knew when to shed their leaves. I always assumed it was something to do with a fall in nighttime temperature. The trees sensed it was getting colder.

Apparently, it is 'Photoperiodism', that is the tree responds to the length of daylight. I always marvel at the complexity of nature and how so often what appears to be simple is a complex mechanism perfectly suited to its task. As we watch the leaves changing colours, we are witnessing the tree shutting down for winter. The leaves are slowly dying as the water and nutrients are being withdrawn.

The beauty I notice in the leaves happens more subtly in spring with fresh green colours, and more vibrantly in autumn with yellows, oranges and reds. At both these times, a rapid change is occurring before our eyes, and the eyes notice that change. What we witness is the ability of the tree to sense the amount of daylight and respond appropriately.

What is less apparent is what happens between spring and autumn, as the tree is in constant leaf. I am reminded that while things remain pretty much unchanged we take little notice.

When change happens rapidly we are often surprised or shocked by it. Yet if we remember the tree, it measures the daylight each day and acts accordingly. The problem is when things do not change much, we often forget to do the important things and take things for granted.

For me, I forget to say thank you or how much I value someone precious. Then when things change rapidly it is too late to do the things you should have done. Often there is no chance to make it up.

When I read in the Bible that people become comfortable, often their need for God diminishes and He becomes irrelevant. Unsurprisingly they quickly drift into trouble and expect God to rescue them. The teaching of the Bible is that a constant relationship with God should shape our everyday existence.

The cycle of boom to bust is not a good model and to expect God to be the one who gets you out trouble, free of charge, is not realistic. When things go wrong there is always pain and hurt which are never easily overcome or forgotten.

If we return to the trees and their measurement of daylight. We quickly realise that the light of the Sun is pretty much constant. What changes is the proximity and angle of the earth to the Sun and that determines how much light the tree receives and how it should respond.

If we make the parallel comparison, God is constant. What changes is how close and to what extent we are turned towards God.

God can only work with what we allow Him to do in our life.

Proposed Reform of the Planning System

The government is proposing reforms to streamline the planning system and make it easier to engage with digitally (but ending notices on lampposts). It suggests:

- housing allocations according to a set formula where they are most needed. (One estimate is that allocations to Mid Devon would increase substantially.)
- local plans with their own design guides on which the public can comment; these would be made more quickly and allocate enough building land for ten years
- allocating areas for 'growth' (where development is automatically permitted), for 'development' (where it is automatically permitted for some uses) and 'protected' areas where applications have to be made for individual development as now.
- Section 106 contributions from developers would be replaced by an Infrastructure levy for roads, community buildings, affordable homes, council services etc.
- In the short term, developments less than 40-50 houses would not need to provide affordable homes

In areas designated for 'growth' and for some building in areas for 'development', local

councillors and individuals could not influence the granting of outline planning permission for building; this would be automatic as long as proposals agree with the Local Plan; they would be able to comment on the detailed plans.

The Parish Council will respond to the consultation. Let us know what you think!

Recycling Small Electrical Items

Did you know you can now put out small electrical items for recycling?

Mid Devon residents are now able to put out small electrical items, also known as Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE), with their kerbside recycling boxes.

Along with cardboard, cartons, mobile phones, ink cartridges and toners, old electrical items no bigger than the volume of a plastic carrier bag can be placed in the green recycling box for collection, or by its side if space is limited.

- 9. Vacancies for two Councillors to consider the applications received for the two vacancies: After consideration of the applications which were both very worthy it was resolved to request Emma Benjamin to join the Parish Council as a Councillor. Clerk to arrange co-option at the October meeting. As he is a relatively new resident of the parish it was resolved to ask Toby Ball to attend the next meeting as member of the public so that he can get to know the Parish Council before consenting to co-option. Clerk to action.
- 10. First Aid Course to consider whether to run a First Aid course for local residents: Cllr Milton reported that 10 people have indicated that they would be interested in attending a First Aid Course when it can be arranged and Covid-19 restrictions allow.
- 11. Mid Devon Local Plan and new settlement area for Cheriton Bishop: to discuss Cllr Wood reported on the Mid Devon Local Plan which was adopted by MDDC on 29th July and covers the period 2013 to 2033. The Plan sets out where development, including new homes, shops, schools, employment and infrastructure can take place and which parts of Mid Devon will be protected. It identifies a piece of land off Church Lane in Cheriton Bishop for the potential development of 20 dwellings. The Parish Council is not aware that any applications to build on the land have been made. It may be that no applications will be made but if they are local people and the Parish Council will be able to comment. More details of the plan can be found on the MDDC website: https://www.middevon.gov.uk/residents/planningpolicy/local-plan-history/
- 12. Traffic Speed and Noise in Cheriton Bishop and on local roads: to consider next steps. The Clerk reported on further contact from a parishioner regarding excessive traffic noise and speed particularly on the old A30. Information has been received from the PCSO and the police have carried out some checks but these were not at times when the problem usually occurs, which is on weekends. Cllr Way (DCC) will contact the Highways team at DCC to make enquiries about what can be done. Clerk to update parishioner.
- 13. Cheriton Bishop Handbook and volunteers list: to consider whether to compile Cllr Wood offered to write a handbook for the Parish Council, which would contain information about Parish Council business and property and could be used as a reference guide for Councillors, particularly those who have newly joined. It was resolved that this would be very useful. Cllr Wood to action.
- 14. DCC Local Outbreak Management Plan to consider the role of the Parish Council and any action to be taken: The Clerk reported that she had attended a Devon Communities Together Focus Group which aimed to support community preparedness and awareness around the DCC Local Outbreak Management Plan. Clerk to liaise with Cllr Salmon regarding Cheriton Bishop Support Group.
- 15. Proposed planning reforms to discuss the proposed reforms and their implications: Cllr Westcott summarised the Government's recently announced Planning for the Future Consultation which proposes reforms to streamline the planning system and make it easier to engage with digitally. Cllr Westcott to write a short piece for the monthly Newsletter to inform parishioners and ask for comments before the Council responds to the Consultation. Clerk to put on CB Facebook page.
- **16.** MDDC & Mid Devon Town and Parish Charter to consider the Charter and whether to comment upon it: The Clerk reported that the Charter is due for review. Councillors will contact Clerk if they have any comments. The consultation period ends on the 30th September.
- 17. Climate Change to receive an update on Climate Change initiatives: Cllr Wood reported that she had attended a Climate Change Conference on transport. This focused on what parish communities can do to reduce CO2 levels. It was resolved that Cllr Wood will put together a proposal for an initiative involving the Parish Council, school and the PTFA to encourage local children to walk to school when possible.
- **18. Devon Air Ambulance (DAA) Landing Site to receive an update/consider next steps:** Cllr Dicker reported that DAA had not given an update on progress. He had spoken to the owner of the potential site but he also had no news. Clerk to contact DAA.
- **19. Dual Use Bins to encourage recycling:** to consider registering an interest with MDDC to upgrade existing bins. It was resolved to register an interest. Clerk to action.

- **20.** Scheduling Parish Council activity to consider the use of a year planner to assist with planning and achievement: It was resolved that a year planner would be very helpful. Cllr Wood and the Clerk to action.
