I hope you continue to make the best of this wonderful weather in this lovely area of the county.



Update on Yeoford Road Housing Development.

As a villager you probably know that Cheriton Bishop's Community Land Trust has worked



hard over the last few years to find and develop some land for the provision of affordable homes. The end of this exciting project is in sight and the 8 units are due to be completed on 22nd October.

The build is going extremely well, thanks in main to Classic builders and the experience of Hastoe housing association. They have been built to a very high standard, achieving a Passivhaus standard that results in carbon emissions in the order of 20% or less than the normal UK home.

In case you haven't been along to one of our open events, the project, as you can see from the road, comprises of 4 main blocks which house a 3 bed home, 4 x 2 beds and 2 x 1 bed. In theory they could accommodate 20+ people all together. Collectively they will be called Higher Shippon and are Nos 1 through to 8.

Clearly they now need occupants so if you know of any, family, friends or colleagues that might be interested in renting an affordable home please guide them to https://www.devonhomechoice.com/how-it-works

Summary of the Parish Council meetings of 11th June and 9th July.

Cheriton Bishop Parish Council met on the 11th June and the 9th July.

Planning Applications: 18/00755 Certificate of Lawfulness for the existing use of a dwelling in breach of agricultural occupancy for a period in excess of ten years at Thorne Cross Farm: the Council resolved to object to this application as to the best of their knowledge the land was rented to conform to the agricultural tie from 1992 to 2017 and the dwelling lived in by the person carrying out the tractor business. 18/00832 Change of use of land for the siting of a temporary agricultural worker's mobile home at Greenacres: the Council resolved to object to this application. The Council had been concerned for many years about the development of similar locations in the parish. The Council had noted that MDDC Planning seems to have no control of the continuing development once started and do not take appropriate enforcement action. The Council believed that this application if approved would give rise to a similar continuing concern. The Council also questioned the need for the change of use which should only be temporary if granted at all. 18/00547 conversion of the first floor of existing barn to provide additional living accommodation for the house and erection of car port at Sunnyvale, Church Lane: the Council supported this application. 0296/18 single storev extension to east and west elevations at Three Gates: the Council supported this application.

Planning Decision: the Council noted that the following applications had been approved: 18/000533 erection of front porch after demolition of front porch at Old Haldon.

Planning Enforcement: The Council noted that they had not received a response to their letter to the Chief Executive of MDDC which again raised enforcement issues. The Clerk was asked to write again. By July a response had been received but the Council considered it unsatisfactory and the Clerk was asked to write again.

Defibrillator: The defibrillator is now live and Cllr Vooght is arranging training for September. All welcome. Watch out for posters confirming the date. Cllr Vooght is also currently carrying out the required monitoring checks on the equipment and would welcome volunteers to assist with this.

Planters in the Village: Cllr Carter reported that he had obtained the plants and had planted them throughout the village.

New Data Protection Regulations: The Council approved an implementation plan and required the Clerk to carry out the functions of a Data Protection Officer.

Roads and Footpaths in the Village: The Council continue to look at issues that relate to the parish and those raised in June/July were: a sign on the road to Hittisleigh Mill; lorries going through the village; blocked gullies and drains; poor visibility splay at Woodbrook Road; cracked culvert lid; cars parked too close to junctions; motorbikes speeding through the village; overgrown hedge between Cheriton Cross and the village; and the damaged bus shelter. In each case action is being sought and the help of Clirs Coren, Heal (MDDC) and Clir Way (DCC) is much appreciated by the Council. parishioners are reminded that if they see a problem they should report it on the DCC Report a Problem The more people that report the same problem the better!

Autumn Tidy Up 6th October: Cllrs Vooght and Endacott will lead the autumn tidy up starting at 9.30 at the Stone Cross. All welcome. Any parishioners with ideas about jobs that need tackling in the parish please contact the Clerk or Councillors.

30th **Anniversary Acorn:** Cllr Milton would welcome ideas from parishioners about how this could be celebrated next year.





THIS IS IMPORTANT AND WORTH READING -- IT CONCERNS ALL EXISTING NHW MEMBERS AND THOSE WISHING TO BECOME A MEMBER

To refresh everyone's memory about what NHW stands for and the advantages of remaining a member or becoming a new member:

- 1. When insuring your property, NHW scheme is usually taken account of in the quotation issued by vour Insurance Company.
- 2. Receiving information and alert details from the police via the Internet. This is usually passed on by Jean
- Members look out for each other and also keep an eye on what's going on or who's about. In other words we look after one another. This is not snooping in any way, but building stronger safer communities.

FREE FIRE SAFETY CHECK

You will be interested to learn that a free fire safety check of your home can be carried out by a technician from the Fire Brigade. To arrange for a visit to take place either tel: 0800 0502 999 OR text: 078 00002 476

As usual certain criteria have to be complied with for a visit to take place, the main ones being - be over 55 years old and living with another person or have children under 18 living with you or over 45 years and living alone. This must be worth a phone call to have an expert from the Fire Brigade to view safety in your home. Of course it would be up to you to carry out any recommendations.

PHISHING WEBSITES

Action Fraud states there have been multiple reports about fake LinkedIn emails. These claim that your LinkedIn profile has appeared in multiple searches and provide links for you to click on, to get more details. These links to websites are designed to steal your personal and financial details. Other fake emails are around purporting to come from Amazon with links leading to a phishing website designed to steal your Amazon login details. As usual always question unsolicited requests for information in case its a scam. Never click on a link in an unexpected email or text.

Any books left unsold are collected by FORCE after the sale, to be sold in their shop in Heavitree.



Cheriton Bishop: A Brief History. Part 2



The picture above shows 'The New Inn' and the petrol station (in front) were added later on the old A30 road in the 1930's sadly demolished to make way for the road widening scheme. Devenish Brewery, in 1915, bought the Inn (next to the old oak tree) and turned it into a pub but objections were raised by residents who objected to another pub in the village and it became a private house named 'Oakstead' where Mr Heard, the local postman, lived.



Early records indicate that in 1869 the landlady of the 'Old Thatched Inn' was Elizabeth Hancock Harvey and her dog Bruce, it was then called the 'Royal Oak'.

In 1935 the Checkers Cafe was built along with the petrol station. The café did an excellent trade with holiday makers in the summer. Vera Scanes in her 'memories of Cheriton Bishop' (published in June 1995) remembered the French onion sellers who pushed their bicycles around with strings of onions and the 'Jonny Fortnight's who called at your door with a large suitcase containing a miscellaneous assortment of sewing needles.

In 1917 it exchanged hands and a Mr Wallace McKay became the proprietor. It was then renamed the 'Oakstead'.

In the 60's a Mr & Mrs Williams ran it as a café and bed & breakfast, and during the summer holidays tourists travelling to Cornwall would stop overnight there. She found that customers liked a drink with their meals and so (according to the records) on the 28th June 1967 they applied for a license to serve alcohol on the premises and at the time it was called the 'Old Thatched Hotel' and both cottages became one building, a pub & restaurant.



On the 12th May 2006 a fire started on the left hand side of the building which gutted the first floor and the roof area. The lads in the village rescued barrels of beer by pushing them across the road.

Today the Old Thatch Inn (as it is now called) is run by its current proprietors, Lance & Simone Marshall, who took it over in August 2016. It is now a grade II listed property. The Old Thatch offers a selection of real ales and meals and organizes a range of activities, including gigs, darts and pub quizzes. The village is now served by a shop, post office, doctors surgery and primary school. There is a café and guest house on the outskirts of the village called the Woodleigh Coach House, towards the A30 near Woodleigh junction. It is thought that back in the older days it was a stop for stage coaches to change horses on their way from London to Penzance.

Further along the road the stone cross in Cheriton Cross described as an ancient wayside cross, similar to those used by the monks of Tavistock to find their way Dartmoor, was originally sited where the present bus shelter stands and was relocated to its current position at Cheriton Cross. It is now known as the 'War Memorial' to the men who bravely gave their lives in the two World Wars. It is not known where these ancient stone crosses originate from but the design is very common in Devon. Crosses carved from stone are commonly used as memorials across Britain and are found not only in churchyards but also beside the road.

Devon crosses are quite different in style from those in Cornwall for example, there are rectangular cross head with chamfering on the shaft and shoulders on the socket stone. There



are very few examples where it can be clearly demonstrated that the cross is in its original location. Unfortunately many had been adapted for use as gateposts, bridges, lintels and troughs, so this stone or granite cross had obviously been removed some time from its earlier position. Most notable that these crosses are located within the Parish, some of the crosses seem always to have been located at the roadside. The obvious Christian iconography has led to the conclusion that these roadside crosses were placed on pilgrimage routes such as main roads leading through to Cornwall. After the two World Wars many villages adopted the style of the Ancient Stone Cross as the pattern for 'Rolls of Honour', this stone cross could have been carved relatively close to where they were erected on Dartmoor.

A wordsmith not to be missed

Bitten by death


As I travel around the parishes, I tend to listen to the radio. I was particularly curious about the story of the man who had cut off the head of a rattle snake. The story ran for a couple of days and got more and more bizarre.

A Texan required 26 doses of anti-venom after he was bitten by the severed head of a rattlesnake he had killed. He was working in the garden when he saw the serpent and decapitated it. When he picked up the snake's remains to dispose of them, the head bit him.

A snake's bite reflex can be triggered up to several hours after it has died. He was airlifted to hospital where he was treated with the antivenom. More than a week after the incident, the man is reportedly in a stable condition, with some weakened kidney function.

The readings for our Sunday services that same week, were about the garden of Eden and the serpent. God predicts animosity between human kind and snake. The snake will bite your heel and you will strike it on the head. I am not sure I would have the courage to strike a snake on the head. The man in Texas obviously missed the postscript to leave the dead snake alone for at least a couple of hours!

In the story, Adam has a guilty conscience and hides from God because he is naked. God realises that Adam has been disobedient. Adam's response is to divert blame to the woman who had given him fruit to eat. Eve's response is to blame the snake. Both Adam and Eve mirror some of our first responses, to blame others and not to take any responsibility for our wrong doing. It appears easier to shift the blame to someone else. It is often because originally we took the easy way, that got us into trouble. When we are caught out in a wrong, we again take the easy way out to blame others and make excuses



for our wrong doing. Often by doing this we compound our mistakes by lying about them. We often say, 'you are just digging a deeper hole' which becomes more impossible to get out of.

Despite our many short comings we are still assured of God's love for us. I am sure that when we get things wrong, it pains God more than we can imagine. Yet, we are not cast away and removed from God's care and concern. It is more like we shy away from God as we realise how our short comings get in the way of our relating to God. God has already made the first move by allowing Jesus to die for our wrong doings. Forgiveness and restoration become possible if we take the second step, to ask for God's forgiveness.

Perhaps when we get caught in a wrong, instead of lying or blaming others, we should ask for forgiveness and end the cycle of making things worse. It seems sins and wrong doings have a bite long after our transgressions.



Latest update from Castle Drogo

Hi everyone.

I hope you are all enjoying the summer holidays. It has been wonderful to have so many families wandering around, enjoying the glorious views and exploring. We recently hosted Play Day at Castle Drogo with loads of free games and activities on the common. We had over 100 people come along and 90% of those who attended were local which was lovely to see.

We are in the middle of the Big Butterfly Count and the Ranger team have been working with our friends from Butterfly Conservation to undertake surveys in the gorge. Early indications are that this has been a good year for some of our rarer species, including the pearl-bordered fritillary which lives on Piddledown Common. This is especially good to see as the money raised from car park charges has helped to fund habitat management for native species in the Teign valley.

Coming up, we have a brand new offer for local primary schools using the wonderful work of Peter Randall-Page, which is currently on display at the castle, as inspiration. This will be available for September and October and includes exploring Peter's work with one of our brilliant volunteers and then taking part in activities such as print making, line drawing and mark making.

The building work is still marching forward. The focus at the moment is on the North Tower (the

bit that faces you as you walk down the main drive). Most of the stone from the roof level has been dismantled and we are getting ready to dismantle the wall on the east side down to the lowest roof level. It has helped having a run of calm weather, although the heat inside the scaffolding can make you feel like you are in a greenhouse!

I have heard that tree felling work will be taking place in Rectory Woods from early September for 4 – 6 weeks. This area of wood is a plantation on ancient woodland (PAWS) and the thinning work will promote a more natural woodland long term. Walkers will see diversions in place and some of the boundary fences will be temporarily replaced with ropes during the felling work.

Finally, we have a small exhibition on display in the Chapel at the moment which tells the First World War story of William George Arscott, a local lad who was a labourer at Castle Drogo who ended up in Salonika, Greece as part of the Devonshire Regiment. The display includes footage of a performance by Okehampton College students which is incredibly moving. I hope you get to see it.
