



Our FREE workshop is informal, interactive, fun and very informative. We offer various modules according to the requirements of the group, topics covered can include:

- Health, eyesight & medical conditions
- · Highway Code
- · Advice on aids to driving
- Speed and hazard awareness
- Challenges facing drivers today

For many older people, a driving licence is an important symbol of independence. Cars make it easier to go shopping, get to appointments, keep in touch with friends and attend social events - without having to rely on others. While some drivers may be able to continue driving well into their 80s and 90s, it's important for them to regularly assess their driving and make adjustments if necessary. Driving is one of the most risky activities we are likely to do in our lives, and yet once we pass our driving test many of us have no further training. Driving techniques have and do change over the years.

How long do the workshops last?

The workshops can last for a minimum of 45 minutes and a maximum of 1.5 hours, the choice is yours.

Do the sessions take place on set dates? If so, where?

The workshops take place at a location, date and time that suits you. You will need

to provide us with a venue to host the workshop, a community hall, drop in centre or church perhaps?

Triad of Health

I've recently rediscovered a concept called the 'triad of health'; a core concept in many alternative healing professions. It is the supposition that there are three aspects to a balanced state of health:

Earth Corner

Dishwashers or Machines?

Government spokesperson, Allegra Stratton, suggested that people help reduce UK climate emissions by not rinsing their dishes before putting them in the dishwasher, sparking controversy over whether it is extravagant of energy to use a dishwasher at all.

Our house has a dishwasher: my husband. In a small kitchen, he needs no cupboard space and is quicker than a machine. However, since the installation of a dishwasher in the village hall, users may like to know that Radio 4 'More or Less' found that, if used when full, a dishwasher often uses less hot water per item, and hence less fossil fuel energy, than is typical with several manual washups.

The difference does depend on whether the hot water from your tap is heated by oil or gas, electricity, or sunshine (the latter a low carbon option, more likely if you wash up at the sink); and also whether you use the dishwasher long enough to save more than the carbon cost of manufacturing it.

Environmental Impact

It's what goes into the dishwasher that is crucial for nature. Phosphates in detergents tend to reach the watercourses causing a lot of extra algae to grow, which in turn produces toxins that reduce oxygen levels and kill fish and other aquatic life in our streams and rivers. These watercourses, also laden with fertiliser residues, other chemicals and untreated sewage, eventually reach the sea and contribute to ocean pollution which is reducing our main source of oxygen – microorganisms called plankton, which are the bottom of the food chain for all marine life and chief absorbers of CO2.

It's true that some phosphate free dishwasher tablets don't clean well and leave filminess or spots, but Naturaler recommends Ecover dishwasher tablets



and Bio D dishwasher powder. (This takes account of other ecological impacts too eg. packaging, and the fact that some scents include endocrine disrupters.)

Some regret that loading the dishwasher doesn't provide the same social opportunities as a prolonged spell at the sink. My dishwasher and domestic oracle says:

For a hospital kitchen – yes, I can see the point. Possibly for a busy hotel (though Orwell's accounts of washing dishes in Down and Out in Paris and London are classic). But for a family... why else would you have children except to help wash and dry up?

We entertained all the time, and the whole family shared in the process, jigging about to Steeleye Span or Leon Rosselson. Common tasks are the root of socialisation.

Recollecting the old crammed kitchen, steamy marathon washups after village feasts or Harvest supper, though amazingly good spirited and speedy for the quantity of crockery and cutlery processed, I think these sessions won't be greatly missed!


In The Garden

November Gardening

Gardeners are generally optimistic people and November is a good month to order seeds for next year. You can imagine all those wonderful plants thriving in your garden just like the pictures in the catalogues!

Tulip bulbs can be bought and planted now, later than most Spring bulbs. This is to avoid getting the fungal disease, tulip fire.

After such a warm October, you might have delayed moving all your tender plants to a more protected winter shelter. By November however there must be more risk of chilly nights. If you decide to leave borderline hardy plants, such as dahlias or agapanthus, in the ground they might benefit from a thick mulch. This can be garden compost or



simply a heap of bracken held by sticks just to prevent damage from hard frosts.

Electric pumps should be removed from ponds, cleaned and dried and stored ready for next year.

You can still sow green manures on bare ground to benefit the soil. Field beans are very hardy and can be sown up until December.

Neighbourhood Watch

As the mornings and nights are drawing in and with the clocks going back an hour at the end of October (a daft idea and should be abandoned, this the view of one N W person) we felt a few reminders to safeguard us would not be a bad thing. We have been through these before but another go will do us no harm

Shorter Daylight Days Reminder

With the dark mornings and evenings coming, it is well worth reminding ourselves of safety measures we should take when walking on our narrow roads and lanes.

On dull days, there is more of a risk of an accident involving a walker and a vehicle. Walkers should not wear dark clothing as this merges into the background. Walkers must be seen by motorists and bright reflective clothing in the form of tabards, jackets, armbands, sweatshirts etc should be part of your kit. Children can have additional reflective stripes or material fixed to their backpacks when going to school. Also, walk on the correct side of the road to face oncoming traffic so that you can see that the driver has noticed you and has taken the necessary action to avoid you.

Take great care around school opening and closing times when there could be a lot of vehicle movements. Drivers around these times should also expect there will be walkers on the road and lanes and take particular care.

Burglary Prevent Reminder

- · Don't leave keys in accessible places.
- Lock external doors and ground floor windows and remove keys from the locks on the inside.
- Set the burglar alarm.
- · Keep valuable items out of sight.
- · Draw curtains to prevent internal viewing.
- Use timer light switches and the radio on when leaving the house unoccupied.
- Keep a photographic and a written record of items of value.
- Keep the outside of the house free from items that could help a burglar break in and lock garages, sheds and outbuildings.
- Lock vehicles at the property when not in use and remove any items from view. Lock items in the boot or remove altogether.
- · Toys and bikes should be locked away at night.

The list above only deals with the basic safeguards a person should take to protect their property and goods. It is hoped it will make you more aware of what you can do or should be doing.

Abandoned 999 Calls

The police are reporting that there have been an increase in accidentally dialled and abandoned 999 calls recently. A 999 call which is abandoned before speaking to the operator at the control centre will find the operator then spending time researching the phone numbers and details to ensure there is no risk to the caller and will try to return the call several times. If you dial 999 stay on the line and if it is a mistake say so otherwise they will call you back. All of this takes time with the operator who could have been in touch with a genuine emergency call.

Also keep the phone out of reach of children, lock the phone before putting it into your pocket, talk to children how to call for help in an emergency and that the phone is not a fun thing.

Tool Theft From Vans

This is on the increase with power tools being stolen. Police advise the public not to leave tools and equipment for long periods in their vans especially overnight. To report a theft or if you have information, contact the police on 101. The police website has a lot of information and advice on how to protect tools and equipment.

Livestock Theft

This is of concern with sheep aimed for especially from the open moorland. An idea put forward is for the farmer to put up signs stating when and time his sheep will be moved. If the public come across sheep being moved outside of the time stated, then phone the number on the sign to call the farmer to check or otherwise contact the police on 101.

Always be observant and vigilant and keep your eyes open when out and about

To add to all of this and especially important is to safeguard your finances, yourself and the family when shopping online

Success In The Face Of Huge Challenges

I wonder how much of the Paralympic Games you managed to watch. You will have seen the headlines about Dame Sarah Storey who has won the most medals by a British athlete, an amazing total of twenty-eight medals including seventeen gold medals. I am always in awe of the achievements that are made in the face of severe disabilities.

I was interested in the comments on how participating in sport has many benefits. The obvious one being, growing in physical strength but less obvious are the benefits for mental health and socialising with other people.

We are only too aware of the real damage that isolation can have on us, and we have all had some experience of this during the national lockdowns.

One of the things that you cannot help but notice while watching the Paralympics, is the number of people who compete who have been injured as a result of war. Part of the paralympic movement sprung out of the need to help injured war veterans with their rehabilitation.

One of the pioneering places was Stoke Mandeville Hospital and Stoke Mandeville Games 1948. All the athletes provide great role models for other people to try and to participate whatever their circumstances might be. It is the taking part that really makes a difference.

Remembrance

The month of November is a time when, as a nation, we remember. Remembrance Sunday this year falls on the 14th of November. Due to lockdown last year, it was particularly hard to have the normal services for Remembrance on the 11th November.

It is right that the people that have died in conflicts are remembered. Equally important

are the people who survive and are often physically and emotionally scarred by military conflict. This has been brought into sharp focus with the military withdrawal from Afghanistan and that twenty-year war.

Part of the Annual Remembrance is the Poppy Appeal and raising money for Help for Hero's and military welfare charities. This fundraising does make a huge difference in the ongoing support of veterans and their families.

It comes as no surprise that the bible tells stories about the people who society has wrongly dismissed as not important, coming good. In fact, in Jesus' life, he goes out looking for those marginalised by society and offers practical help.

Devon County Council

Councillor's News

I have been very lucky with the weather whilst carrying out my surgeries and can only hope it continues, but I am doubtful that I will be able to stand the cold during November to March.

I have not met that many people at my surgeries, and you might think I would be pleased to have received so few complaints. But, my surgeries are more than just getting complaints, and I want to get to know your communities and for you to get to know me. I am more than just a local councillor.

Two areas of complaint that have cropped up revolve around parking. The first is when people park on estate roads because they are too mean to pay the relatively low parking costs in local car parks. I have investigated street parking permits but I have to say that the biggest problem is enforcement. There are too few officers to carry out any meaningful supervision. You may pay for a slot in your street but there is no guarantee that you will keep it. For further information about this topic I would direct you to the Devon County Council website where under Democracy in Devon you will find on page 49 item 593 which deals with the topic.

Parking on pavements is another area of resentment. Driving over a pavement is illegal but unless an officer sees it nothing

will happen unless you are causing an obstruction. By this it means that if a vehicle takes up so much of the pavement that a mobility scooter or pushchair cannot pass then it is causing an obstruction and you should report this to the police on 101. If it is a recurring problem I would advise you to go to the Devon County Council website or www.devon.gov.ukroadsandtransport/parking/pavement-parking. If enough people report the same sort of incident it helps to build up a picture and the officers can then put something in place.

My final thought is to tell you of my locality fund. Each county councillor has a fund of £10,000 per year to spend in their division, that is their area. It is to help local community groups with projects that benefit the area. If you think a group you know of has such a project do get in touch. There are criteria which can be found on the Devon County website if you type in 'locality fund'.

- 8. Village Green to discuss a request to replace the movable football posts and agree associated actions: It was resolved to purchase 2 Samba locking football goals 12 x 6 ft for £99.95 each. Cllrs also discussed the request that the grass be mowed more frequently and that the clippings be removed. Cllrs explained that the current mowing regime (which does not include removal of clippings) will cost around £900 for the current cutting season. As a potential compromise Cllrs considered various ways of cutting the grass more frequently and removing clippings during the school holidays, perhaps involving some self help. To go on the agenda at a future meeting.
- 9. Play Equipment to consider provision of new play equipment for 8 to 14 year olds at Glebelands Play Area and agree associated actions: Cllr Benjamin reported that she had received a quote of £30,679 from Kompan (the company that refurbished the play area in 2021) for the installation of a Kompan Inground Galaxy & Jumper. Cllr Benjamin had also prepared an application to the National Lottery for a grant towards the purchase of the equipment. Councillors discussed the use of \$106/CIL monies for this project. There is just over £9000 in the MDDC \$106/CIL General Fund available to the Parish Council. The Clerk is to check when this money has to be spent by. It was resolved that the grant application should be submitted and that the PC will put at least £5000 of the \$106/CIL fund towards the project (or all that amount if the time allowed for the expenditure of that money is short).
- 10. ROSPA Inspection to agree future dates for the annual ROSPA inspections of the play equipment at Glebelands Play Area: The clerk reported that the last third party inspection was carried out in December 2020, post installation of the new equipment. ROSPA would charge £237 for an annual inspection in December, for which they would make a one-off visit to Devon. The alternative is to arrange a ROSPA visit in March/April, when the inspection will be included in ROSPA's annual visit to inspect many play areas on Devon, for which the cost will be approximately £75. As the equipment is new and is being inspected weekly by volunteers it was resolved to arrange a visit in March/April. Clerk to action.
- 11. Platinum Jubilee 2022 to discuss how to celebrate/mark the occasion within the Parish: Councillors discussed several ideas including: a big lunch/bbq at the Village Green; tree planting; lighting a beacon; and decorating the village. Councillors would like to see what residents would like to do. Clerk to write a piece for the Newsletter asking residents to contact her with their ideas. To go on a future agenda.
- 12. Footpath Posts to discuss the purchase of number signs for footpath posts and agree associated actions: Cllr Wood reported that 16 public footpaths criss-cross the Parish. Each path has a number on the MDDC definitive footpath map but these numbers are not displayed on footpath signs. Councillors agreed it would be very sensible for each sign to have a number. Cllr Wood will research costs and report at the next meeting.
- 13. Devon Parish & Town Council Wildlife Network to discuss appropriate action: Cllr Wood explained how Devon Local Nature Partnership supports Parish and Town Councils to fulfil their statutory obligation to take action for wildlife, a duty which is enshrined in the Natural Environment and Rural Communities (NERC) Act 2006. It was confirmed that the Village Green project had been registered on the DLNP Map which seeks to link up all the local organisations with an interest in nature conservation.
- 14. Climate Change to receive an update on Climate Change initiatives: Cllr Wood reported that the two new benches have been installed on the Village Green. Thanks to Cllr Benjamin, Mark Tripp and DCC for their assistance. The benches need treating with preservative and it is hoped this will be done during the Village Tidy. It was resolved to purchase bulbs up to a value of £100 to enhance the Village Green and Glebelands Play Area. Councillors discussed how to further enhance the Village Green by planting willows along the marshy border.
- **15.** Social Media to receive an update on PC social media activity: Cllr Benjamin reported that the PC FB page now has 121 members. Numbers are gradually increasing and there is a lot of 'cross-posting' with the Village FB page.
- **16.** Roads & Footpaths to receive an update on roads and footpaths in the Parish: Cllr Edwards reported on comments on FB regarding a truck which has been parked in various places around the Parish to advertise a local business. This is not a PC matter and Cllr Edwards will respond on FB.
- 17. Newsletter to receive an update on Newsletter activities: Cllr Edwards reported that the Newsletter team are researching the purchase of a new printer.
- **18.** Repairs & Maintenance to consider any repairs and maintenance needed for PC assets: Cllr Salmon reported that she had inspected the benches at the War Memorial and felt they can be repaired/renovated rather than replaced. The cost to be included in the 2022/23 budget.

- **20.** To receive a report from the Chair (for information only): On behalf of Cllr Milton the Clerk reported that he had again asked DCC to resolve the long-standing problem with the very noisy drain cover outside 3 Acer Terrace.
- 21. To receive reports from Councillors (for information only): Cllr Edwards reported that she has taken over responsibility for Community Speedwatch. Cllr Westcott reported on plans to meet with a local environmentalist and that gradual progress on Parish Wildlife Wardens is being made. Councillor Wood thanked the 2 volunteers who have come forward to help with the weekly inspection of the Play Area.
- 22. To receive a report from Cllr Letch (DCC) (for information only): Cllr Letch reported that his monthly surgery in Cheriton Bishop is now held at the bus stop on the C50. There is plenty of money left in his DCC Locality Fund and he encourages community groups who need support to apply. Clerk to put information about this on FB. Residents do from time to time contact him about vehicles parked on pavements and when they do so he informs the relevant officer at DCC. DCC has put aside £1.4 million for road repairs, in particular repairing the sides of roads where they have fallen away. If anyone is aware of places where that has occurred could they please send photos to him (Frank.Letch@devon.gov. uk.) Cheriton Bishop, Bow and Copplestone all have problems with speeding traffic. One idea is for the three parishes to purchase jointly a Vehicle Activated Sign. Some funding might be available from the Locality Fund. To go on the October agenda. Covid-19 numbers in Devon are now reducing.
- 23. To receive a report from MDDC Councillors (for information only): Cllr Coren reported that he had been contacted by a parishioner regarding moving the 30 mph signs on the Yeoford Road further out of the village. He has previously contacted DCC about this but DCC had not agreed to move them. Clerk to write to Cllr Letch setting out the reasons for them to be moved and Cllr Letch will forward the email to the DCC officer. Cllr Coren has been told that a MDDC officer will be inspecting the garages at Glebelands (which are in a poor state of repair) during week commencing 4th October.
- **24. Correspondence/Clerk's Report (for information only):** Robin Scott, the new Academy Head of Cheriton Bishop Primary School, has been in touch and plans to attend the October PC meeting to meet councillors and introduce himself.
 - Bunny Homes, a South West based house builder will be attending the next PC meeting to explain their proposals for developing the land off Church Lane. They will also be holding a public consultation in the village which is planned for week commencing 18th October. During week commencing 4th October Bunny Homes intends to write to all village residents and local businesses to invite them to the consultation. To go on the October PC agenda.
