Letters to the Editor

Drainage Maintenance

Devon County Council (DCC) invests significant funds undertaking ditch clearance works to drain the water from highways. In the majority of cases, the responsibility for ditch maintenance rests with the adjacent landowner. A series of factsheets setting out the position are available on the DCC website, and a summary to the contents is detailed below.

Ditches & Drains

Ditches on land near the highway which take water from the road are the landowner's responsibility. DCC may sometimes take measures to drain the water from the highway on to adjacent land. If this affects you, you may be compensated for any damage caused.

- Regularly clean the waterways on your land in areas where they drain the highway.
- Check headwalls and grills regularly.

Roadside Trees

Landowners have an obligation to ensure that the trees on their land do not endanger highway users.

If you are unsure if you are the owner, check your property deeds or contact Land Registry.

- Carry out regular checks of trees on your land that might fall onto the highway and arrange for any necessary tree surgery work.
- Ensure that overhanging trees do not cause an obstruction to the normal passage of vehicles.
- Plant trees in hedgerows where they won't be a danger to road users.
- Remember that you might need permission to lop a tree covered by a tree preservation order.

You can report overgrown vegetation which is causing a safety issue on DCC's 'report a problem' web page.

Hedge Cutting

Roadside hedges are the responsibility of the landowner who has to:

- prevent hedges from overhanging the highway and from obscuring street lights and road signs
- clear the road of debris after hedge cutting
- meet the obligations of the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 ensuring that nesting birds, bats and dormice are protected.

If a hedge interferes with safe use of the highway and you do not take action to cut it, DCC can serve a formal notice asking you to remove it.

The Hedgerow Regulations 1997 state it is an offence to remove a hedgerow or section of hedgerow without notifying your local planning authority.

Overgrown Vegetation

Vegetation should be cut back to the minimum required height clearances for roads and footways:

- 5.2m for vegetation overhanging roads
- 2.1m for vegetation overhanging footpaths
- 2.5m for vegetation overhanging cycleways.

Highway Verges

It is an offence to deposit objects on highway verges which could cause an obstruction or hazard.

- Don't leave farm materials on highway verges. Park all machinery off highway verges and away from sight lines.
- Don't place stones on the verge.
- Don't drive on the verges as this may damage easements, ditches and grips and may also harm wildlife and bring mud onto the road.
- Find out if any verges alongside your land are protected for their special wildlife value.

Weeds & Pest Control

When using weed and pest control chemicals near a public road: only use pesticides approved by the Pesticides Safety Directorate, employ trained operatives, or ensure that you and any staff have the correct training. You should always:

- remove harmful weeds from your land in accordance with the Weeds Act
- phone DCC on 0345 155 1004 if Japanese Knotweed is growing on the highway verge. If Japanese Knotweed is growing on your land it is your responsibility to manage; it should not be flailed or mowed as this will cause it to spread.

Mud on Roads

Landowners and occupiers have a duty not to obstruct the public highway, or do anything which could inconvenience or endanger the public. It is an offence under the Highways Act to allow soil or refuse from land next to a public highway to fall, be washed, or carried on to the road. If mud on the road is considered hazardous, DCC will contact you and ask for it to be removed.

As I start the virtual tour of Dartmoor, it's fair to say that the summer has not been without its challenges. At Finch Foundry, the guided tours have been going really well but we then, like so many places, hit some staff shortages and had to close for a few days. Thankfully, as Finch is staying on the booking system, we were able to let people know in advance and those who turned up were still able to enjoy the outside spaces and take advantage of the very excellent local walks, shop, café and pub.

Lydford Gorge

The unexpected highlight and star of the show at Lydford Gorge is the second hand bookshop which opened in April. It is proving to be a big hit with locals and visitors alike and we are very grateful to the lovely people who have turned up with donations of books. The team there are also loving sharing tales of the huge variety of wildlife that call Lydford home and I joined them at the Meldon Wildlife Festival recently which was such a joy to be part of.

Castle Drogo

Finally, to Castle Drogo. It was a bit of a shock to be so busy again! It took us a bit of time to get used to seeing so many people. I would like to say a big thank you to all our neighbours for their patience on the lanes and directing people who have trusted their Sat Nav instead of the evidence before their eyes. Thanks to some very patient people giving directions, visitors have found their way to us and it has brought a lot of joy to be able to share this wonderful place again.

You will soon notice the return of an old friend to Drogo when a section of scaffolding goes up on the south west side of the castle this Autumn. As part of the monitoring checks of the work completed during the 8 year project, we discovered a section of pointing that hadn't cured as required and subsequently couldn't stand up to the Dartmoor weather.

Beginning this autumn, a team of Stonemasons will undertake the repairs of this section. The remedial work comprises the raking out of the joints in the defective areas to a depth of 75mm and then repointing in two coats of hydraulic lime mortar. It is projected to take 8 – 12 weeks to complete and extra care will be taken over the cure of the mortar after it is placed to ensure the issue isn't repeated. Access to the inside of the Castle will not be affected and we will remain open throughout October.

Earth Corner

Can You Really Affect Climate Change?

While the UK is chairing the COP26 climate talks in Glasgow in December and our diplomats are cadging other nations to raise their ambition, many feel that as individuals we've no chance of doing anything to slow down the changes.

Perhaps this sense of helplessness suits the companies spending vast sums lobbying governments against climate action, or for delay till, say, 2050.

In the face of failing harvests due to drought in East and South Africa, floods and wildfires, we can in fact make a difference.

Three ways to act on the climate crisis are:

 Talk to others. Climate change is a vast issue to face on ones own. There's too much uncertainty, grief about what we are losing, worry about the future our children/ grandchildren will inherit, to be able to bear this alone. We need to talk to people we trust, learn and plan action together. It's great if this can involve neighbours, though for some, online groups and organisations may be the first to look for, whether it's Friends of the Earth, the Conservative Environmental Network, Greenpeace, XR, or the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England (CPRE).

Whitestone took on this challenge in the Climate Action Day in their Parish Hall, the first Saturday afternoon in September. Table stalls and displays gave plenty of scope for chat and questions, on gardening for wildlife, home energy, re-use & recycling, travel, fashion and fabrics and more. Of course, the liveliest area was the hatch for tea and cake but – doesn't that go without saying?

- 2) We can use the democratic rights we have in this country – some people don't have them, so we have to use ours. Write to your MP. It is fine to write quite a short letter to tell them that you are concerned about climate change, and ask for more urgent action. (Even the government's own Public Accounts Committee said there isn't yet a plan to reach their stated carbon emissions targets; more details from **transitionexeter.org.uk**. UK stands more chance of convincing others if we walk our talk.)
- 3) Reduce our own footprint. Less effective than the other two but important because we watch each other. No one size fits all. We have different needs, different mobility, capabilities, different kinds of houses, financial and geographical situations – so we must look at what we can do not what we can't, and support each other to find what's right for us. Some things can only be changed once in a while – for example when we replace a boiler, buy a new car, do building repairs.

- the school eco-team,

- wildflower edges at the Village Green


In The Garden

The Autumn Tidy-Up

An autumn tidy up of the garden can be done gradually. If the fallen leaves are dry enough, the easiest way of clearing them up and turning them into good compost is to use your lawn mower. Any green foliage on perennials can be left but if it is starting to show signs of mildew, then clear it away.

Seed heads are a valuable source of food for birds during the winter. If you leave too many however, you might get a forest of seedlings next spring. I love both fennel and teazels but have to be ruthless so that they don't take over the whole garden!

When your runner beans have finished, cut them off at ground level rather than pulling up their roots. This is because they are part



of the legume family (along with peas, sweet peas and broad beans) which return nitrogen to the soil through their roots. Anything planted in the soil next year will benefit from this.

The foliage of pumpkins and squashes will

probably have mildew

on it by October, so clear it all away. Cut the fruits with a good length of stem. This will harden, like the skin, and protect the fruit from rotting.

Rather than leaving the soil bare, you can sow a green manure whilst the earth is still warm. A typical mixture contains grazing rye and winter tares. The roots break down heavy clays and prevent soil being eroded during the winter. They grow quickly and fix nitrogen in the soil and provide cover for wildlife. I am sowing some in my raised beds which often look rather bare in the colder months.

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Message from St. Mary's

Is Time Flexible?

On Sunday the 31st October, the clocks change from British Summer Time to Greenwich Mean Time. It is quite fun to see those who have missed the time adjustment when they turn up an hour early for church! It is not so much fun to get it wrong yourself. I have got it wrong twice. Once I turned up an hour early forgetting that the clocks had changed. Another year I turned my clock the wrong way, so making me 2 hours late! There is the task of changing all the clocks. In our house, there is at least one clock in every room and then the microwave, cooker, the heating controls and the car clocks!

So what happens to the hour? The Summer Time Act 1972 originally defined the period of British Summer Time to start at 2am (GMT) on the morning of the day after the third Saturday in March or, if that was Easter Day, the day after the second Saturday. It was to end at 2am (GMT) on the day after the fourth Saturday in October.

In recent years it has been changed to bring the date of the start of Summer Time into line with that used in Europe. So Summertime is now in force from the last Sunday in March until the last Sunday in October. I had not realised that Easter affected the date of summertime or that it was fixed on the Sunday after the third Saturday.

Next year 2022, summertime will start on 27th March which looks like the EU rules. Interestingly, the EU parliament has voted to scrap the clock being changed altogether! We will see if that happens.

When I worked shifts, people were very quick to claim an hour of overtime for the extra hour but were very silent about losing an hour's pay for a shorter night shift. Time does not stop for an hour or speed up to make up an hour. We just change the settings of the clock. What is interesting about time is that although it is a constant it feels different depending on what we are doing at the time. When we are busy time flies by and an hour passes quickly. Two minutes of silence on Remembrance Sunday seems to take a long time, an hour of silent stillness is often beyond our comprehension.

The bible seems more interested in what people do rather than how long it takes, to get to the place that God desires.

Constantly, people wait on God and his timing which sometimes is measured in years and not hours. It appears to me that God is more patient than we could ever be. We are challenged to see if we are moving closer to God. It is the direction we move in that is more important than how long it takes.

So What Does A Counsellor Do?

Sometime after the elections to county a local resident asked me what a County councillor does. I replied it was very much the same as for a district councillor or even town or parish councillor. In the first instance we have to attend meetings, until recently these were all on Zoom but now fortunately they are face-to-face.

Secondly, and perhaps more importantly, we receive the complaints, problems and comments of local residents and do our best to deal with them. These I receive as e-mails, phone calls or even face-to-face. The advantage of an e-mail is that I have a written record and something that I can forward to the relevant officer. One of the advantages of being councillor is that you have easy access to the relevant officer. I am not a magician, I do not have a magic wand but the fact that I can contact by telephone or e-mail officers in Mid Devon and Devon County means that problems are more likely to be resolved.

As those of you who read my newsletter will realise I give up two hours or so every Saturday to hold a surgery in one of the five parishes that are in my division. I finished a complete cycle in July and August but now need to make a few changes in order to improve customer contact.

Crediton will remain on the town square on Saturday 2nd October. I shall be in Cheriton Bishop outside the Young Farmers building at 9.30am on the 9th October and then move on to the village hall in Yeoford for 11.15am. The 16th October will see me as usual in Sunnymead play area, Copplestone and on the 23rd, I shall be in the Methodist Church Hall in Bow and not in the Bow Aquatics. I feel the church is more central and there is parking in the village hall car park opposite.

The new query from several residents concerns the number of people parking on the street and taking up residents' places. They have asked me to look into resident parking permits. I have approached Devon County Council and it seems that the best route is to apply with some information to your parish or town council. I have to say that this is not a free service and there is no guarantee that even if you pay you will have a car park space in your street. Because of a lack of personnel, police enforcement is virtually impossible. I shall pass the information to parish clerks.

The last thing to appear in my inbox was a rumour that Devon County Council are thinking of changing the status of disabled parking bays, not those on the highways but the concessionary parking spaces on estate roads. It seems that they are looking at making these mandatory so that you can only park in them if you have a blue badge and the right to park in a particular parking bay. When I have more information I will make this clearer because it is a dramatic change.

Play Equipment to consider provision of new play equipment for 8 to 14 year olds at Glebelands Play Area and agree associated actions: Cllr Benjamin reported that she had received a quote of £30,679 from Kompan (the company that refurbished the play area in 2021) for the installation of a Kompan Inground Galaxy & Jumper. Cllr Benjamin had also prepared an application to the National Lottery for a grant towards the purchase of the equipment. Councillors discussed the use of \$106/ClL monies for this project. There is just over £9000 in the MDDC \$106/ClL General Fund available to the Parish Council. The Clerk is to check when this money has to be spent by. It was resolved that the grant application should be submitted and that the PC will put at least £5000 of the \$106/ClL fund towards the project (or all that amount if the time allowed for the expenditure of that money is short).
- 10. ROSPA Inspection to agree future dates for the annual ROSPA inspections of the play equipment at Glebelands Play Area: The clerk reported that the last third party inspection was carried out in December 2020, post installation of the new equipment. ROSPA would charge £237 for an annual inspection in December, for which they would make a one-off visit to Devon. The alternative is to arrange a ROSPA visit in March/April, when the inspection will be included in ROSPA's annual visit to inspect many play areas on Devon, for which the cost will be approximately £75. As the equipment is new and is being inspected weekly by volunteers it was resolved to arrange a visit in March/April. Clerk to action.
- 11. Platinum Jubilee 2022 to discuss how to celebrate/mark the occasion within the Parish: Councillors discussed several ideas including: a big lunch/bbq at the Village Green; tree planting; lighting a beacon; and decorating the village. Councillors would like to see what residents would like to do. Clerk to write a piece for the Newsletter asking residents to contact her with their ideas. To go on a future agenda.
- 12. Footpath Posts to discuss the purchase of number signs for footpath posts and agree associated actions: Cllr Wood reported that 16 public footpaths criss-cross the Parish. Each path has a number on the MDDC definitive footpath map but these numbers are not displayed on footpath signs. Councillors agreed it would be very sensible for each sign to have a number. Cllr Wood will research costs and report at the next meeting.
- 13. Devon Parish & Town Council Wildlife Network to discuss appropriate action: Cllr Wood explained how Devon Local Nature Partnership supports Parish and Town Councils to fulfil their statutory obligation to take action for wildlife, a duty which is enshrined in the Natural Environment and Rural Communities (NERC) Act 2006. It was confirmed that the Village Green project had been registered on the DLNP Map which seeks to link up all the local organisations with an interest in nature conservation.
- 14. Climate Change to receive an update on Climate Change initiatives: Cllr Wood reported that the two new benches have been installed on the Village Green. Thanks to Cllr Benjamin, Mark Tripp and DCC for their assistance. The benches need treating with preservative and it is hoped this will be done during the Village Tidy. It was resolved to purchase bulbs up to a value of £100 to enhance the Village Green and Glebelands Play Area. Councillors discussed how to further enhance the Village Green by planting willows along the marshy border.
- **15.** Social Media to receive an update on PC social media activity: Cllr Benjamin reported that the PC FB page now has 121 members. Numbers are gradually increasing and there is a lot of 'crossposting' with the Village FB page.

- 16. Roads & Footpaths to receive an update on roads and footpaths in the Parish: Cllr Edwards reported on comments on FB regarding a truck which has been parked in various places around the Parish to advertise a local business. This is not a PC matter and Cllr Edwards will respond on FB.
- 17. Newsletter to receive an update on Newsletter activities: Cllr Edwards reported that the Newsletter team are researching the purchase of a new printer.
- 18. Repairs & Maintenance to consider any repairs and maintenance needed for PC assets: Cllr Salmon reported that she had inspected the benches at the War Memorial and felt they can be repaired/renovated rather than replaced. The cost to be included in the 2022/23 budget.

- **20.** To receive a report from the Chair (for information only): On behalf of Cllr Milton the Clerk reported that he had again asked DCC to resolve the long-standing problem with the very noisy drain cover outside 3 Acer Terrace.
- 21. To receive reports from Councillors (for information only): Cllr Edwards reported that she has taken over responsibility for Community Speedwatch. Cllr Westcott reported on plans to meet with a local environmentalist and that gradual progress on Parish Wildlife Wardens is being made. Councillor Wood thanked the 2 volunteers who have come forward to help with the weekly inspection of the Play Area.
- 22. To receive a report from Clir Letch (DCC) (for information only): Clir Letch reported that his monthly surgery in Cheriton Bishop is now held at the bus stop on the C50. There is plenty of money left in his DCC Locality Fund and he encourages community groups who need support to apply. Clerk to put information about this on FB. Residents do from time to time contact him about vehicles parked on pavements and when they do so he informs the relevant officer at DCC. DCC has put aside £1.4 million for road repairs, in particular repairing the sides of roads where they have fallen away. If anyone is aware of places where that has occurred could they please send photos to him (*Frank.Letch@devon.gov. uk.*) Cheriton Bishop, Bow and Copplestone all have problems with speeding traffic. One idea is for the three parishes to purchase jointly a Vehicle Activated Sign. Some funding might be available from the Locality Fund. To go on the October agenda. Covid 19 numbers in Devon are now reducing.
- 23. To receive a report from MDDC Councillors (for information only): Cllr Coren reported that he had been contacted by a parishioner regarding moving the 30 mph signs on the Yeoford Road further out of the village. He has previously contacted DCC about this but DCC had not agreed to move them. Clerk to write to Cllr Letch setting out the reasons for them to be moved and Cllr Letch will forward the email to the DCC officer. Cllr Coren has been told that a MDDC officer will be inspecting the garages at Glebelands (which are in a poor state of repair) during week commencing 4th October.
- 24. Correspondence/Clerk's Report (for information only): Robin Scott, the new Academy Head of Cheriton Bishop Primary School, has been in touch and plans to attend the October PC meeting to meet councillors and introduce himself.

Bunny Homes, a South West based house builder will be attending the next PC meeting to explain their proposals for developing the land off Church Lane. They will also be holding a public consultation in the village which is planned for week commencing 18th October. During week commencing 4th October Bunny Homes intends to write to all village residents and local businesses to invite them to the consultation. To go on the October PC agenda.
