From the Rector

Is time flexible?

On Sunday the 27th October the Clocks change from British Summer Time to Greenwich Mean Time. It is quite fun to see those who have missed the time adjustment when they turn up an hour early for Church! It is not so much fun to get it wrong yourself! I have got it wrong twice. Once I turned up an hour early forgetting that the Clocks had Changed. Another year I turned my Clock the wrong way, so making me 2 hours late! It was at that point I learned the mnemonic

"The Clocks spring forward in spring and fall back in autumn"

So I now know which way the clocks go, it is just a case of remembering before going to bed. There is then the task of changing all the clocks. In our house there is at least one clock in every room and then the microwave, cooker, the heating controls and the Car clocks! Remembering how to change the Car clock can be a bridge too far and I wait six months for the clock to come back around to the right time.

So what happens to the hour? The Summer Time Act 1972 originally defined the period of British Summer Time to start at 2 am (GMT) on the morning of the day after the third Saturday in March or, if that was Easter Day, the day after the second Saturday. It was to end at 2 am (GMT) on the day after the fourth Saturday in October. In recent years it has been Changed so as to bring the date of the start of Summer Time into line with that used in Europe. So Summer time is now in force from the last Sunday in March until the last Sunday in October. I had not realised that Easter affected the date of summer time or that it was fixed on the Sunday after the third Saturday. This year 2013 summer time would have started on 24^{th} March but the new rules meant that it started on 31^{st} March, which was Easter Day and fifth Sunday!

When I worked shifts people were very quick to Claim an hour of overtime for the extra hour but were very silent about losing an hour's pay for a shorter nightshift. Time does not stop for an hour or speed up to make up an hour. We just Change the settings of the Clock. What is interesting about time is that although it is a constant it feels different depending on what we are doing at the time. When we are busy time flies by and an hour passes quickly. Two minutes silence on Remembrance Sunday seems to take a long time, an hour of silent stillness is often beyond our comprehension. The bible seems more interested in what people do rather than how long it takes, to get to the place that God desires. Constantly, people wait on God and his timing, which sometimes is measured in years and not hours. It appears to me that God is more patient than we could ever be. We are challenged to see if we are moving closer to God. It is the direction we move in that is more important, than how long it takes.

Letters to the Editor

Neighbourhood Watch Carers

I would like to add my concerns about this proposed scheme to those raised in last month's "Letters to the Editor."

Caring is one of the most disparaged and undervalued jobs around and yet they are the people whom we may all have need of at sometime in the future.

If you look through any paper there are endless adverts for carers yet they are often poorly paid, expected to work on zero hours contracts, and frequently do not even receive the full costs of the petrol they need to get around all their clients. Would you like to spend your days rushing from one person to another often having only 15-30 minutes to carry out essential tasks for them and knowing that if you go over that time you will not be paid? Whilst there are some good employers in the field they are under continual pressure from Councils to cut their costs in order to keep their contracts.

Councils and the NHS are saving by getting rid of their Community Support Workers and health workers and handing the money over to charities, who use volunteers, or private organisations who employ whoever they can get on minimal pay. No matter how good peoples' intentions are these options are simply hiding a growing problem that really needs a national solution.

There are currently not enough volunteers in this area to carry out all the tasks identified as priorities and many of those people are ageing themselves. There is a reluctance of men to undertake what they see as women's work (although many male clients long for their help to come from another man), and not many young people want to engage with undertaking personal care for older people. I am worried that by handing over more tasks to the Neighbourhood Watch the NHS will feel that they have resolved the problem of bed-blocking because they cannot identify care packages so that people can return home, and neighbours who are quite happy to help out on an occasional basis will suddenly find that they have taken on responsibilities that they are not prepared for. Meanwhile yet more services will be cut whilst senior managers will earn their bonuses by claiming that they have "cut costs".

Hearing Aids

Those who use what I call standard type hearing aids, i.e. the one that rest on the top of the ear are probably aware that you can obtain replacement batteries from various sources including our own surgery, thanks to the PPG (Patient Participation Group). However, these types of hearing aids require two other items that need to be replaced fairly regularly. They are the "Dome" and the "Nowax", both of which are attached to the end of the hearing aid that fits into the ear, and neither being available from the surgery or walkin centre. Until now I couldn't see the point in obtaining replacement batteries either locally or from the NHS walk-in centre in Sidwell St. when I still had to go to the RDE audiology dept. to get the Dome and Nowax.

I raised this point with our PPG and after a few helpful telephone calls by them the audiology dept. at the RD&E are posting the required items direct to me and have said that for any future requirements just to phone the audiology dept. and they will send the required bits on.

I would assume that this will apply to anyone who has an NHS type hearing aid and I am most grateful to Cheriton's Patient Participation Group for arranging this and making life just a little bit easier.

I'm sure that the school has already extended a warm welcome to the new children who have just joined. The weather during most of the period was smashing, wasn't it? Now it's time to get back to the learning!

Also new to the school are Miss G Denford and Miss V Tearle who will be teaching Classes 1 and 3. I'm sure you will enjoy your time at Cherry B ladies.

Class 1 sent a congratulatory card to the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge before the summer holiday, on the birth of their son, Prince George. They have received a thank you card from the proud parents.

Looking at the new term ahead, I'll remind you that the Whole School Topic is My Life. After School Clubs will be held on four afternoons of the week, covering Dance, Multi-skills, Netball and Soccer. There are also two clubs at lunchtime on Wednesdays. These cover a Book Club and a Games Club. There certainly cannot be any moans about 'nothing to do', can there? Physical exercise has already started with swimming lessons at Crediton for Class 3.

What about other activities during the term? The annual Jeans for Genes Day is on 20th September when the school will be holding a non-uniform day and, for a fee, the children can come to school wearing jeans. This supports the charity Jeans for Genes which helps research into genetic disorders in children – very worthwhile. Children grow so fast that quite often they will have grown out of some item of clothing before it is worn out. Let's make use of it before we throw it away unnecessarily.

Last month I started reminiscing about Cheriton Bishop when I first settled here and I got as far as 'The Cottage' along towards Four Cross Ways. I neglected to mention that there was no Scout field on the right in those days. The bungalow on the right after The Cottage was in existence then but there was no further building on the road to the crossroads. If I now turned back and retraced my steps to Cottage Cross past Croft Cottages on the left and followed the sign to Frog Mill, with the school playground on the right, I would come across Pinecroft, a one-time cider house, and Vine Cottage before meeting the start of Dabby Lane which bore straight ahead at Wild Orchard. The main lane turned left there down past Blackaday and on down past Horselake Farm surrounded by its orchards. It seems a bit of a mess these days with seemingly uncontrolled building there.

Of course, there was no dual carriageway there then and Venbridge Hill dropped down to Venbridge House. This is where the local surgery was held by Doctors Bullen and Miller, if I remember correctly. I think Doctor Miller covered the move to the surgery by the Village Hall. It used to be quite a trek to the surgery then but, of course, the doctors would come out to see you if there was any kind of a problem getting to them.

The lane carried on past Venbridge House up to Drummer's Well where it turned sharp right round the cottage called Drummer's Well. This had been two cottages at one time. It's a great shame that it was knocked down and replaced by the current edifice. Upper or Higher Mounson was the next farm on the lane. I seem to recall that the farmers name was Wilson and that he had moved his farm, lock, stock and barrel down from Scotland by train. Cattle wagons still existed on the railways and I believe his livestock and equipment were all delivered via Yeoford station – on the main Waterloo to Plymouth railway line. From Upper Mounson the lane made its way in a zig-zag fashion down the hill to Frog Mill.

Retracing my steps up to Cheriton Cross, it was quite clear that there were really two settlements here, Cheriton Bishop and Cheriton Cross. Up at the Cross, after negotiating the road around the New Inn, Checkers Café, shop and garage could be found. Checkers was a bit ramshackle in those days. John and Barbara Moore, who ran the shop for Bert Frost, lived in a green caravan behind the building. There was an access road, a public right of way (it should have been) that cut off the dangerous corner for pedestrians where the Yeoford Road met the A30.There used to be a paraffin pump at the Exeter end of Checkers. I suppose I can remember that because, since I couldn't drive and didn't own a car, I wasn't interested in where the petrol pumps were.

The workshop was down the slope beneath the café and coped with quite a lot of local trade. On the opposite side of the road was Moorlands Garage which had the contract for rescuing vehicles from the M5 when it first opened. Moorlands, of course, was where SAS operates from now. If we followed on down

the A30 to Crockernwell we'd find the 'Judge Jefferies' (I think that's the spelling!)which was quite a large building for a pub. Beyond that lay the pleasures of the 'Bay Tree Motel and the 'Crow's Nest' – but enough of that, it's time to try and tax the old memory banks to dig out a few more memories. I hope any of those who were around in those days will correct me where I stray from actuality.
