Crockernwell News

Just to follow up on a couple of items raised recently ... We asked if anyone who was concerned about speeding vehicles in Whiddon Down and Crockernwell would be prepared to join a Community Speed Watch scheme. We do need at least **SIX** volunteers and although there has been a response in Crockernwell others are needed. The Council are aware of a lot of concern because of the complaints we receive regarding this subject, so please, this is an opportunity to help **YOUR** community and the more volunteers, the less work for each person at the end of the day. Please take care at the entrance to Whiddon Down Service Station it appears that ESSO have not repaired the road surface despite saying they would do it within a month.

The planning application for the proposed link road at Whiddon Down came up for discussion and it was good to see parishioners at the meeting and able to give the Council their views as well as Daniel Lee from Renewable Energy Systems who are building the Den Brook Valley wind farm and are going to pay for the link road. After discussion the Council have supported the application with the following observations: The radius of turn for vehicles travelling west to east should be improved, some form of traffic calming should be introduced for vehicles travelling east to west entering the village if no roundabout at the junction is built, some form of pedestrian footway should be provided on the North Tawton road entering the village, brown tourist information signs should be provided indicating village facilities especially the public house. This was a brilliant example of where the Parish Council could use the Parish Plan as evidence of parishioners views (82% of Whiddon Down residents and 60% of the parish thought some action should be taken).

The honesty boxes in the car park and toilets at Drewsteignton have now been put in place and have been emptied for the first time; contrary to popular belief there was actually some money in them and not just shirt buttons!!

As you probably know Turnpike Road has been used as a short cut for many years in spite of its 'Access Only' legal designation. Drewsteignton Parish Council are delighted to let you know that the road will be physically closed on 13 September.

From the Rector

Harvest Time

As summer draws to a close my mind turns to the Harvest Festival in the Church. The tradition of celebrating a good harvest must be as old as human kind. There is something quite magical in a harvest, in so much as the return is greater than the initial investment in seeds. The produce bears no relationship to what is sown. From a single dried up seed comes a plant with fruit so sweet and delicate. It seems quite mysterious that the remnant of last year's dead fruit can create such a youthful and fruitful plant.

In this creative force of nature we start to look for the work of God. As we look at the cycle of sowing, growing and harvesting we realise that the overwhelming creative force comes from God. All we manage to do is aid or impair that growing process. It will come as no surprise that our notion of harvest comes from the Jewish faith. The Feast of the Tabernacles was a celebration of God's gift of the harvest. A tenth of that harvest was brought to the temple as an offering, or the produce was sold and money presented at the temple instead. The idea was that the first fruit, the best, was kept for God and offered to Him.

If we look at what we learn about the process of harvesting there are several clear themes that emerge from the bible. Firstly from the parable of the sower; *where* the seed is sown dramatically effects the chance of harvest. The seed sown on a path, or on rocky ground or among the weeds is doomed to fail. We as the labourers are called to prepare the way for the seed to be sown. We need to remove the rocks and weeds that get in the way. The second theme is the type of seed we sow. In the parable of the wheat and the tares (a weed that looks like wheat, thought to be darnel), the seed sown is sabotaged by the enemy. The wheat and weeds spring up and workers blame the owner for the poor seed. They are ready to weed out the wrong plants but the owner stops for fear of uprooting the good. The owner shows great patience and does not rush in and do more damage. At harvest time the good wheat and weeds will be sorted out. The weeds are then discarded and harvest gathered together. We are reminded of the importance of being like good seed and being fruitful. That fruitfulness brings great joy and it is no wonder we look to God to give thanks for the harvest.

Dive into those Hedges!

How about a great Summer activity, suitable for all but the very youngest, that gets you out into the fresh air, close to home and, most importantly, free?

The countryside around Crockernwell and Cheriton Bishop is criss-crossed with lanes and footpaths edged with hedges that may date back hundreds, or even thousands, of years to our Bronze age ancestors and, by using a simple system called "Hooper's Law" after the scientist who devised it, it's possible to date most hedgerows.

All you will need is a relatively quiet, traffic-free stretch of lane or, even better, a footpath, a tape measure and a small bag to put leaves in.

Keeping a careful watch for any traffic measure off 100 feet of hedge putting a marker (a stone, chalk mark or twig) where you begin and end, then work your way along the hedge taking a sample of leaf from each type of tree or bush that you find. You only need one leaf for each species. Count how many different examples you have and then multiply the number by one hundred to get an approximate age for the hedge, eg.six different types of leaf multiplied by one hundred will mean that the hedge has been in existence for around six hundred years so it was planted in about 1400A.D.

You can try looking up historic maps to see if your field is shown there as an ancient field or manor boundary, or identify all the different types of leaf you gathered and then look up when those varieties of tree and shrub were first introduced into Britain.

Devon has more miles of hedgerow than any other County, many more than 800 years old, and those round enclosures on the Moor can be thousands of years old so it can become a source of endless fascination.

Cheap, simple, and a way to learn about our surroundings.What more could you want?
