District Councillor's comments

As we enter the later stages of summer we can say this year that we have had a really good summer – in direct contrast to 2012!

We are grateful to MDDC for the newly erected fence of galvanised steel on one side of the children's play area bordering the car park. I have asked MDDC to also erect a fence at the bottom of Glebelands where the steps go down to the Church Lane. It is certainly needed now and would improve still further this area with the colourful flower border that has been created there.

At the time of writing this I am sorry to say the street lights from the shop to Glebelands on the Yeoford Road have still not been repaired. I will contact Devon County Highways again and remind them of their promise that the lights would be working by August 13th!

The Planning Committee at Mid Devon approved the planning application at Medland Lane at its July meeting, which was arranged earlier than expected. It involves the construction of two farm buildings and a farm manager's house. The Action Group were at the meeting in good number and asked relevant questions and, along with Councillor Mitchell and myself, they spoke against the application. Since the approval was granted, concerns have been registered with Mid Devon Planning over their decision.

On Saturday, September 21st we have our Autumn litter-pick. The various groups, organisations and shows in Cheriton Bishop are all well run – something you should all be proud of, but with the litter-pick, we all need to continue to pull together to maintain the high standard that Cheriton Bishop has shown for many years.

Churchwarden's News.

I am sure that some will have noticed that the churchyard has not been as well kept as usual this year. Due to the weather, the grass grew too long early in the season and then was difficult to get under control again. We also left one area to grow wild as an experiment. In the northern end of the churchyard, between the church and the school, there are many graves with kerbstones which are close together, making it impossible to mow and difficult to strim. The P.C.C. would like to remove the kerbstones, (but NOT the headstones), but is anxious not to cause distress to those who have relatives buried in that section. Most of those graves date from the early 1930s to the 1960s, so are half a century old and the current whereabouts of the relatives is often unknown. If you have a family grave with kerbstones in that section, or know of anybody who does could you please get in contact with one of the churchwardens? When we have consulted with as many families as we can trace, we then have to get permission from the church authorities to change things so it will be a fairly long process.

Do you have problems remembering the times of church services? Does this stop you from coming to church? We are currently considering whether it is possible to have services at the same time each week. As Martin has 4 parishes plus Oldridge and Pathfinder churches we all have to agree and only if a majority of churches want to try a new pattern can we change. As part of the consultation process all the regular members of the congregation are being approached by somebody from the P.C.C., but if you are an occasional attendee and would like us to take on board your ideas please contact one of the churchwardens.

September 14th Devon Historic Churches sponsored 'Ride and Stride'. Details from Janet.

On September 29th, Sunday afternoon, there is an Open Tower afternoon. Starting at 2.30pm the tower will be open for those wishing to climb to the top. Refreshments will be served at the back of the church, and at 4.30pm the church choir will sing a short concert before the bell ringers give us a demonstration of their skills. There is no charge. From the Rector

Letting go and moving forward

As we make the transition from summer to autumn there is sometimes both a reluctance to let go of the possibilities summer brings and an apprehensive acceptance to embrace autumn. It is the same with many other transitions from the familiar to the unknown. If your children move to a different school over the summer holidays, they may be excited by the new opportunities a new school offers, or the thought of the unfamiliar may bring real anxieties.

These transitions in our life situations or in the world around us have to be negotiated; we have no choice. We do not often have the ability to stop them or opt out, we have to carry on. But equally we recognise that the changes themselves are more often temporary, winter will replace autumn and the Christmas holidays will replace the school term. Very few changes will last forever, most will change and change again. For this reason we are constantly growing and learning. It is never a good place to be where we stop growing and learning, because sadly we get left behind. A good reminder of this fact, is to revisit a place we have not been to for many years, it will be familiar but also different. There will be new people we do not know and new buildings that have been built and old things replaced and trees will have matured into greater stature.

I was walking through a park and came across a plaque that said that the tree was grown from an acorn by the primary school in 1904. The tree was large and beautiful and the school children will have grown up and died. I was left to admire its beauty and marvel at the legacy that had been left through it. Those children in 1904 had unwittingly left a legacy for many to enjoy. It is also true that we do not know what will last and what will fade away. It is worth challenging ourselves with what sort of legacy are we leaving future generations.

We are reminded that one of the things that lasts forever is love. We remember loving acts that we have received for all our lives, often long after that person has died. It is somehow a glimpse of the eternal. It is no wonder that we regard God as both loving and forgiving. There is a sense of both the eternal and endless possibilities as we think of God. I think we need to consider two questions when we deal with change in our lives. Firstly, are we leaving a legacy that enables others to flourish and grow? Secondly, are we being drawn away from God or drawn closer to God? I think in our heart of hearts we know the right answers to these big questions.

Usually we say that criminals don't recognise late summer as not eventful. They make it eventful by cashing in on people leaving windows (and doors!) open and of course, going away on holidays leaving their homes very vulnerable.

The good news is that we have had no reports in our Villages of any criminal activity!

ROAD SAFETY

The objective of Neighbourhood Watch is to try to keep the villages safe and secure. This includes safety on the roads – some will remember we campaigned for a safer crossing at the junction of Yeoford Road and the C50 (the main road). Cllr Coren took the lead on this and came up against a barrier of lack of funds but he did at least get the "SLOW" sign re-instated legibly!

Now we have another "accident waiting to happen". After the main road through the village, was resurfaced recently, the "White Lining" crew did not reinstate the continuous white line between Woodbrook Road and the "traffic calming" going towards Crockernwell.

This now means that vehicles can legally park on both sides of the road, outside Checkers Stores – and they do!! This, in our view, is highly dangerous not only because it is on the brow of a hill, but also it means that traffic "exiting" the shop car park does so "blind". Furthermore, traffic turning right out of Yeoford Road is unsighted too. That is not to mention the speed at which traffic travels in both directions on this section of road.

Cllr Nick Way is convening a site meeting with Highways to hopefully sort this one out.

POLICE AND CRIME COMMISSIONER, TONY HOGG, addressed a meeting in our Village Hall back in May. For those that did not attend, just to remind you that he is the voice of the people in our relationship with the Police – he has the power to translate our opinions, views and priorities into the Police and Crime Plan.

His Annual Report has now been published in which he says "I am fully aware that many people still have to be convinced about how effective the P&CC's job can be, and I am confident that I will be able to prove the cynics and doubters wrong and make a positive difference".

Neighbourhood watch members as carers

In response to the Neighbourhood Watch article last month I'd like to give my view on the proposal/suggestion to give NHW members "carer status".

This small idea is hopefully going to start a debate and bring into the open the very tip of the iceberg of a much larger problem – How can we make a society that properly looks after its most vulnerable members?

It sounds like just another ploy by the Government to duck out of their responsibility regarding the care of the elderly and sick and conveniently dump it off onto voluntary groups. Also, on a practical level it would prove entirely unworkable as, presumably, every member would need to be CRB checked. On a cynical level it would open up all sorts of possibilities for criminals to get in on the act.

I think the Government should stop coming up with wild ideas and get on with planning properly for dealing with the ageing population which is going to grow and become an ever more serious problem as we all live longer.

I would say that their proposal has partly come about as they now realise that in closing so many of our 'cottage' hospitals they are forcing many elderly and sick people back into the community when they actually still need care and help.

Even elderly but relatively able people who want to remain in their own homes rather than move to a nursing home are not adequately covered. My own mother who is 92 and lives on Dartmoor cannot get any daily assistance from Social Services (even though she is entitled to it) because none of their employees will drive up onto the moor. She has to pay privately for the pleasure of being helped to get dressed each morning. I wonder how many people in the country are affected in this way when 'The System' fails at the grass roots level?

Anyway, back to the Neighbourhood Watch and *our* community! My hope is that we can all just keep on being the kind and caring group of people that we are now. Looking after each other when necessary without having to be 'organised' or 'registered' to do it.

And finally, a big thank you to all the people who, over the years, have helped me when I have needed it. THANK YOU.
