## Dartmoor Burial Chamber Unearthed

Archaeologists have unearthed a 'stunning' Bronze Age burial chamber on one of Dartmoor's most isolated hills. Experts discovered a stone-built box, sometimes known as a cist, at Cut Hill during a three-day dig last month.

Radiocarbon dating of charcoal found inside suggests the chamber, used to bury the dead during prehistoric times, is about 3,900 years old.

Dartmoor National Park Authority (DNPA), which led the project, said the discovery had been prompted by reports of a feature being visible in the peat.

### Fascinating

The authority said the find had parallels to the cist unearthed at Dartmoor's Whitehorse Hill in 2011, which uncovered items including cremated human bone, a woven bag and amber beads.

Excavation director and archaeologist Dr Lee Bray said:

"We were all pretty speechless when we lifted the capstone and looked inside.

Not only is the cist bigger than we expected, but it contained multiple pieces of wood that appear to have been deliberately shaped and cut.

This prompts more questions - could the wood have been an object that was dismantled and deliberately placed inside the grave? If so, what was it and who did it belong to?"

Dr Bray said there was every chance the chamber could be found to contain further objects and artefacts once the team explored further.

"It's a stunning discovery with the potential to be every bit as fascinating as the finds at Whitehorse Hill,"

DNPA said the contents of the cist had now been removed for further examination.

### Upsetting News from St Mary's Church

I hope that you have all had the great Summer Holiday wished for, however I now have some sad news.

Between Monday 12th and Thursday 15th August, some of the loose items in the church were damaged.

I hope that the damage was accidental, but in reality it is difficult to comprehend an accident which would snap the wooden stick of the candle snuffer, which has been in the church for approaching 50 years, into three and to bend the brass top. In addition the top of the wooden staff on one of the 'Churchwarden's Staves' has been split. I will post pictures on the Village Website for you decide if it was deliberate.

We also found a pet food box and sachets scattered around in the churchyard.

Two messages please, although it is unlikely that whoever is responsible will be reading this. Firstly, we try to open St Mary's daily to provide a peaceful space for everyone, the risk is that for insurance purposes we will have to lock the church and to only open it for services. Secondly, the items in the 'Food Larder' are free to use by anyone but please do not waste the food, even if it is pet food.

### **Community Allotments Project**

Do you have available land or know anyone who has?



Cheriton Bishop Parish Council is still seeking a landowner to help us provide allotments for local families and individuals. We are looking for an area of at least one acre to rent on a flexible basis. Another possibility might be the donation of a plot of land to the community, named for the donor or someone else as a memorial.

The Council will arrange a contractor – or pay the owner, if preferred – to install a perimeter fence (where needed).



Allotment plots would be approximately 25m x 5m. We will also meet the costs of extending a water supply to the site from the nearest source, if necessary.

We welcome proposals – and we understand that some flexibility may be needed – with the ideal site having the following characteristics:

- Less than 1 mile from the village centre.
- Reasonably level (or at least a consistent moderate slope).
- Reasonably well drained for most of the year.
- Access to a road, with the potential for bringing vehicles on site in the summer, and possible parking off site close by.

The site would be rented and maintained by the Council, with a volunteer committee from allotment holders managing membership, plot rentals and site rules. There would be no permanent buildings erected on site by allotment holders.

## News from the Moor

This month has a bit of a Castle Drogo focus as we have some new things to share with you, if you're curious to find out more about the last castle to be built in England...

#### **New to the Collection**

Castle Drogo has recently been given a generous donation of over a thousand items that have been away from the castle for more than 60 years. These include all kinds of personal objects from a banjo that travelled to the trenches in the First World War, to diamonds and cherished family toys. These items are part of the Nursery corridor exhibition and will be open to the public most days, however, we rely on our fantastic volunteers to be able to open these spaces.

For the first time ever The Study at Castle Drogo has been opened as an exhibition space. It includes items that have recently been conserved, and items that have rarely been on display. The Study will be open everyday until Sunday 3rd November.

Throughout the castle the team will be opening some of the most unique and beautiful cabinets in the collection, for visitors to look inside. The cabinets will be open daily until Sunday 3rd November. If you've ever wondered what's behind the door, now's the time to come take a look.

#### **Volunteer Open Day**

On Friday 6th September the castle will be holding a volunteer open day. If you'd like to find out about what volunteering means at Drogo, come along between 11.30am – 2.30pm, have a chat with the team, join a tour or taster to give you a feel for the different roles you can get involved with. We are particularly keen for weekend and garden volunteers. To learn more, get in touch at *drogovolunteering@nationaltrust. org.uk* or look at our opportunities online.

#### **Tree Management**

Out on the estate, the gardens and grounds, the team are getting ready for their annual programme of tree management work which will begin again in September. This is where we check the health of trees, deal with any disease and squirrel damage, and make sure footpaths and key viewpoints are clear. This will start with work in Cod Wood so look out for any diversions.

#### **DEFRA Funding**

We were really pleased to tap into some DEFRA funds, coordinated by Dartmoor National Park Authority, to start improving the visitor experience for disabled people and people with additional needs at Fingle Bridge. The first stage of an accessible footpath into the upstream meadow at Fingle Bridge has been created, reaching an open glade picnic area where accessible benches will be located to enable visitors to connect with nature and enjoy Fingle with ease. This is part of our 'Everyone welcome' strategy, the National Trust's commitment to inclusivity and diversity. We have plans for further work to be completed over the next couple of years as we secure further funding, but this first stage is a good move in the right direction.

#### **FREE Entry Days**

Finally, we have a series of free entry days coming up in September as part of Heritage Open Days. Lydford is open for free on Friday 13th & Saturday 14th September and Finch Foundry on Sunday 15th September. Castle Drogo will have free entry on Wednesday 11th September and the Hydro Turbine House upriver from Fingle Bridge will be open on Sunday 15th September. ### Preserving Memories of Devon Branch Lines

The Folklore Library & Archive is delighted to announce that it has been awarded a generous grant from GWR's Customer & Community Improvement initiative, which seeks to support rail-related community engagement projects.

The money will fund a heritage project focused on collecting and preserving people's memories of Devon branch lines, with particular focus on the Exeter – Okehampton line, which is the first to be reinstated after falling victim to the Beeching cuts of the 60s and 70s.

The Folklore Library & Archive, which is a registered charity, is hoping to record people's recollections about the line, and to digitise and preserve old cine film and photos. The charity is also happy to receive donations or loans of artefacts.

Project manager Tracey Norman said,

"The Okehampton line is unique, as it's the only branch line which has been reinstated so far, and there will still be people living who travelled on it prior to its closure, experienced its loss in 1972, and can now travel on it once again.

We want to capture those special memories, preserve them and make

them available to future generations of train enthusiasts, researchers and historians."

"We'd also love to hear from any railrelated groups,"

"As well as a wealth of fascinating memories, they are also likely to have extensive collections of photos and video footage, which we can assist with preserving, digitising and safely archiving for the future."

The charity is inviting anyone with memories to share about Devon's branch lines, especially Okehampton, to get in touch – passengers, staff, volunteers, drivers, and those who campaigned for the line's reinstatement.




# Tedburn St Mary Women's Institute

Beautiful weather and an interesting day was enjoyed by 23 members of Tedburn WI. We travelled to Sampford Courtenay and ate a very tasty lunch at the New Inn. As always there was much to talk about, catching up on personal and local news. The village is very pretty, very well kept with a lovely old church. Many of us, including me, had never visited before and everyone was very impressed.

We then travelled to Denbrook Wind Farm at North Tawton. We were met at the entrance and issued with Hi Viz vests and hard hats. Health & Safety is paramount.

The 9 windmills are 80 metres high with foundations 5 metres underground to make them <u>stable</u>.



The sails were whizzing round while we were there. 9000 KW of

electricity is generated each year and is enough to fuel thousands of houses.

The environment has priority, and the windmills are re-cycled at the end of their lives. Planting in the field encourages

insects, and bat and bird boxes are plentiful. Maintenance is carried out twice a year, the staff were very informative and attentive.

## **Reflections On Our Service**

In September, Citizens Advice will be celebrating 85 years of providing free, confidential, nonjudgemental advice to anyone who needs it regardless of personal circumstances.

The nature of advice people have sought has moved with the times through World War 2, post war changes, the 'swinging' sixties, and the changing social and economic changes throughout each decade thereafter. Sometimes geography played a big part in the nature of problems that people have asked for help with. For example, during times of industrial unrest there have been marked contrasts to the problems experienced by people in urban, industrial areas compared to people in rural and farming communities.

More recently, the gap between these areas has closed. The cost of living crisis is impacting on people countrywide and people and families across the country are sharing the challenges of coping with rising energy costs and spiralling bills in general.

At this time of year families are also having to deal with issues brought about as children go back to school or change schools altogether. Trying to fund the cost of new school uniforms on top of meeting day to day living expenses puts an additional strain on family budgets that are already stretched.

Family holidays can no longer be taken for granted and keeping children active and engaged throughout the summer break is challenging on many levels. It can also cost money. One of the first things that we do at CA TNMWD is run a benefits check to see if additional funding is available and if so, advise on how best to go about claiming it and, if needed, helping with that claim.

Schools, by and large, are far better in touch now and many have excellent arrangements in place selling second hand uniforms. Recognising that just about everyone is feeling the pinch one way or another, increasingly people are reaching out for whatever help they can get – hopefully without shame or embarrassment.

Here at CA TNMWD, we listen to people's problems – often a big step helping people to move forward. Sometimes people can find their own way forward having accessed information on our website *www.citizensadvicetnmwd.org. uk*, but we also recognise the fact that people very often need the reassurance of personal help, reassurance and guidance whether that be via our AdviceLine **0808 2787 999** or via a face to face meeting.

The problems may have changed over 85 years, but the fundamental ethos remains the same.

# Neighbourhood Watch

We hope that you all have had a great holiday and remained safe and well with no nasty experiences to spoil things.

#### Theft

By the time that you read this you may know that the village shop was broken into during the early hours of Friday 16th. A stolen car was used to break the bottom panel of the door with the only thing apparently taken were a quantity of Vapes. It is understood that this has happened previously to another shop where Vapes were targeted.

Also very recently in our area, a large trailer was stolen even though it was well hidden. However, the thieves knew of its whereabouts and broke down a field fence and when they reached the road they left the field gate open in their rush. Fortunately there were no animals in the field.

It is thought there are persons going around looking for items whether on farms or on private property which can be taken. It is understood that a drone is also being used to identify where suitable items are.

These two occurrences illustrate that thieves take no account of how much damage, cost, worry or inconvenience is caused to the owners providing they get what they want.

#### **Impersonation Scam**

NW has mentioned this before. Here is a reminder about trying to protect yourself:

- 1. Your bank, building society or police will never ask you to transfer money to a 'safe account', ask for your pin, password or passcode.
- 2. The bank will not phone you to ask you to approve a payment. Only approve payments that you have made yourself.
- 3. Contact your bank or other organisation directly using a known phone number or email address.
- 4. Don't give remote access to your computer or devices or to install software, following a cold call or unsolicited message or text.
- 5. Don't approve a payment in a mobile app that you did not make, by registering beforehand for biometrics within the app for extra security.

To report a fraud or scam, call **159**, **101** or **999**.

#### **BT Digital Voice Switch Over Project**

BT are providing small drop in events to help reassure the public about the digital voice switch over. They are targeting rural areas who are likely to have missed similar events in towns and regions. NW have been asked to set up these events with recruited volunteers who have been trained. The switch over rollout is known to be causing concern, especially being left 'cut off' in the event of a power cut and with only poor mobile coverage. It is hoped that the NW drop-in events will help to reduce many of the worries.

#### Amazon

With purchases increasing on line, scammers are more than ever trying to take advantage of 'Prime' membership with unexpected emails, calls and texts from impersonators claiming to be from Amazon. These could refer to a change in membership or expiry or may ask for verification by providing personal or payment information. To avoid being scammed, visit Amazons 'Message Centre' on **Amazon.co.uk**. To confirm your Prime membership log into your Amazon account. If you think a contact has not come from Amazon then report it to them at amazon.co.uk/reportascam.

#### Burglary

Protection and taking a little bit more care of your property against this type of offence can easily be carried out. Report any suspicious activity such as individuals or vehicles you may see around. Thieves often target addresses during the hours of darkness. A burglar alarm sounder on a property is a deterrent as are motion sensor light/s and doors with doorbell cameras. Keep vehicle keys well out of sight and not near the inside of an external door.

Always if possible park your vehicle within your property boundary or better still within the garage. A car tracker can be installed, or some vehicles have this device already fitted. If this is the case, download the software to your mobile phone and learn how to use it.

#### Lets Talk

The police are supporting a programme which aims to help parents and guardians understand more about the challenges young people are facing today, including drugs, alcohol and mental health. The free toolkit and sessions are available by visiting the 'Lets Talk' section on Safer Devon website to access the toolkit and register for the online sessions.

#### Safety

Always be observant & vigilant and keep your eyes open. We are all encouraged to report a crime, any suspicious behaviour or vehicles around. It is up to us all to do our part and be on our guard when we are out and about. Report any findings to the police.

## Breathe Yourself to Sleep

It's 2:30am in the morning. It's warm in bed, it's quiet and dark outside, and the people of your community are sound asleep and happily snoring... except, it seems, for you. You are wide awake thinking about 'that thing that happened' or 'that thing you forgot to do', or 'that thing you need to do'. And this goes on until 5am... Mind whirring; not switching off; and thoughts going around in circles.

This is not uncommon! There can be complex and multiple reasons why this can happen, and the regularity of this happening varies from person to person. I am not a sleep expert, but as this used to regularly happen to me, I would like to share a practical breathing and visualisation technique which allowed me to drift back off to sleep.

- Close your eyes and visualise a square, in a colour of your choosing, in your mind.
- Visualise tracing or drawing the edges of the square: start at the bottom left corner, move up the left side to the top left corner, go across the top to the top right corner, go down the right side to the bottom right corner, and then go across the bottom back to the bottom left corner. Repeat a few times.
- Now, add your breathing to this visualisation:

when you draw the left side of the square and along the top, breathe in a deep breath for 4 seconds. When you draw your square down the right side and along the bottom back to the beginning, breathe out for 4 seconds.

- Continue breathing in this way: breathe in for 4 seconds up the left side and along the top, then breathe out for 4 seconds down the right side and along the bottom.
- Continue with the practice keeping the coloured square clear in your mind, and always keeping your breathing gentle, comfortable and not strained.

This technique can produce a relaxing & stressreducing response in the body and can keep the mind focussed and concentrated so it's not flitting between lots of different thoughts.

I can't guarantee it'll work for you, and this technique may not be for everyone, but perhaps give it a try the next time you find yourself awake when you want to be asleep to see if it makes a difference.

# In the Garden

# New Planting for September

We have been lucky, in the West Country, to have had some cooler, wetter weather this summer to keep our gardens fresher.

Herbaceous plants are still luxuriant in their growth and full of colour, whereas in some summers, and even some places in Britain, gardens are now tired and looking past their best.

Cut back summer flowering perennials such as geraniums and day lilies. Japanese anemones will fill the gaps and if you have dahlias in pots, these can be placed to give a boost of colour where you need it.

### Shrubs

From September, you can sensibly buy new shrubs and perennials and plant them without so much risk of losing them to drought. If it is dry, pour plenty of water into the planting hole before you plant your new shrub, and give it a good mulch after watering it. The plant will still be growing and so will settle in well before winter.

Any shrubs in containers will have needed feed during the growing season. Now, however, you should stop feeding to prevent plants producing tender young shoots that will be damaged by frost and winter winds.



Towards the end of the month, if the soil is damp, you can move shrubs around without doing too much damage to their growth. Some perennials, such as asters, can be lifted and divided if they have finished flowering.

As our autumns seem to get warmer and milder, this process can start later and continue through the winter if conditions are right.

Enjoy the rich autumn colours in the warm and gentle waning light of September.

# Message from St Mary's

### All Change

The month of September sees many changes taking place. The most obvious is the move from Summer to Autumn.

We see the nights drawing in, by the end of the month there is more nighttime than daytime. For many people, the loss of daylight paints a rather gloomy picture for the next few months.

As we lose the warmth of the sun the temperatures start to drop. I particularly notice that nights get much cooler. I lived in Macclesfield several years ago and we would get a frost early in September, a reminder that Winter was not far around the corner.

The equinox also signals the highest tides in the year and often the storms come in off the Atlantic Ocean around this time. This means that the sea looks even more powerful and threatening.

For many people, the academic calendar plays a large part in their lives. For people who work in schools, colleges or universities or students who go to learn, September marks the beginning of another year. This also has a big effect on people's families as suddenly there are many tasks to be done and remembered in the morning before going to school.

When I was at school my Mum would write reminders on bits of paper and put them in my cereal bowl at breakfast. However good your system of organisation is, you still sometimes have to endure the terrible feeling of forgetting something important and having to suffer the consequences.

There is also a real sense that days seem to get longer, you have to get up earlier to be ready, you get home later and you have work to do for school.

The things you want to do often have to wait for the weekend or even the holidays.

It can feel that you have little control over what you do. Interestingly, the seasonal cycle is slowing down in terms of light and warmth while the learning and developing cycle is rapidly increasing. It should not come as a surprise that there will be quite a tension between these opposing forces.

As we look for help when we struggle with our daily life, we can turn to God.

As we look at the Bible, we often see people struggling against forces that seem to be working against them. There is great assurance that God works with us as we struggle. What is very interesting to me is that often the bible wants us to learn and develop ourselves to deal with our struggles.

As we look at the life of Jesus a great part of his work was teaching people about God and how to align themselves with God's way for the world.

We are encouraged to keep growing and learning, not just as young people, but throughout our lives.

When we stop learning, we start to give up on living. It is worth remembering every day is a school day. What are we going to learn today?

- 3. Public Discussion: Nothing raised.
- 4. PLANNING APPLICATION/S

Ref no. 24/00900/FULL. Thorne Cross Farm, Cheriton Bishop. Erection of extension to B8 storage units. Following a discussion the council saw no reason to object and supported the application unanimously.

#### 5. PLANNING DECISIONS APPROVED BY MID DEVON DISTRICT COUNCIL

Cheriton Bishop Village Hall. Replacement of shed with a pre-fab garage.

- 6. Cheriton Bishop Parish Council meeting 17th June 2024 to consider the approval of the minutes as a correct record. Approved unanimously by a show of hands.
- 7. To receive reports from MDDC Councillors. Nothing to report.

#### 8. To receive a report from Devon County Councillor F. Letch (DCC) - for information only. At a meeting concerned with public health, children's health from 0 to 19 years was discussed. Pre-natal and early months of childhood are well catered for with all young children seen at home by the age of nine months. 29 libraries in Devon have weighing facilities so that parents can go and weigh their baby and have an accurate check on progress. Some libraries also have 0 to 5 years groups. With my new role as chairman of the Corporate Infrastructure & Regulatory Services Scrutiny committee, I will be looking at changing our highways maintenance contract, looking at policies for motorhome owners and having an eye on the budget.

Because of the constant number of complaints about potholes, overgrown hedges and poor road surfaces, I have been investigating the county council's website and looking, in particular, at highways and reporting problems. There are 16 headings for problems that you can report. I urge people to report and to keep the reference number of their complaint and if nothing has happened in a reasonable time, let us say 10 days, do contact me with the reference number so that I can pursue it for you.

#### 9. To consider a donation request from the primary school towards a school pantomime trip.

# Devon County Council

## **Councillors Report**

It seems to me that there are two very distinct roles to being a councillor. The first is to represent the people of my division by listening to their problems, complaints and observations and acting to resolve them. This I do by meeting people casually in the street, in the shops and also by holding surgeries in Crediton, Copplestone and Bow.

I receive a lot of correspondence through e-mails and always ask people to include my right to forward in their missive. I also get telephone calls but much prefer people to then reiterate their point in an e-mail as I then have a written record and something that I can pass on to the correct officer. As you all know, my contact details are easily available.

The other side of the role is to attend meetings where we learn a lot of information, which we can pass on and also question a lot of the decisions made by the executive. I have been to several very interesting meetings recently. Two of them concerned the railway.

We are lucky in Crediton to now have a half hourly service to Exeter and £18,000 has been spent on our station. Passenger numbers on the Tarka line are up to 800k, an increase of 50%.

The railway company is also looking at the impact of crossing the railway lines for those with mobility challenges. They are also thinking of a way of increasing the number of disabled parking spaces on the south side of the station which at the moment only has one.

I was quite surprised in another railway meeting to learn that a cow on the line near Cullompton cost 800 minutes of disrupted services and 13 cancelled trains. It seems that trespassing on railway lines is a frequent and costly event. On a positive note, 40 train drivers are being trained along with 60 railway staff. There is to be an upgrade of rolling stock on our line but no date as yet.

At a health care meeting I was pleased to note that people in Mid Devon live on average just over one year longer than the rest of Devon and Devonians live a year longer than the national average.

We also have a lower percentage of drug-related deaths at just 22 in Mid Devon. But even in this we cannot take much comfort. Mid Devon's suicide rate is easily the lowest in the county.

I attended the first Cabinet meeting under the new leadership. The most interesting item was the launch of the corporate plan 2024/25. There are five proposed corporate priorities in the action plan.

- 1. Secure better outcomes for our children through working with key partners.
- 2. Develop an investment plan for our road network. I'm sure we all look forward to that!
- 3. Improving and modernising our processes through digital solutions. I'm not sure that I understand that.
- 4. Working with citizens 2024/25 focus on highways and transport. This may well tie into option number two.
- 5. Building relationships with partners to facilitate improved and targeted community services.

These are clearly noble aims and I am sure that the relevant scrutiny committees will keep an eye on the executive's progress.


